### OVER 145 IN THIS YEAR'S CAST & STAFF

Next Tuesday night at 8:15 Humboldt State College's 1943 student show will open for its first night in the college auditorium. After its second and third performances on Wednesday and Thursday nights, the Humboldt Hilarities should be established as one of the looked-forward-to traditions of the county.

In all, 146 students will participate in the production, which will run approximately 2 hours and 30 minutes. The entire show is divided into three parts, with intermissions of 5 and 15 minutes between them. Through the efforts of the committee in charge and the cooperation of several Arcata housewives, it has been made possible for coffee to be served during the second intermission.

With its "War Effort" theme, the plot of the show will be the tracing of the lives of a group of Humboldt boys and girls from the time of Pearl Harbor and through the subsequent changes brought about in their lives by the war. This will be done in twelve student written acts, both serious and humorous, with a preponderance of humor. In these acts, and in separate scenes, will be original music, singing and dancing novelties, and a special interpretive number done by the Modern Dance class.

Continuity this year will be handled through a new medium. Instead of last year's "old-timer," Les Brazelton, who came out in front of the curtain and introduced the acts through his reminiscent ramblings, introductory scenes have been written for performance on a specially constructed smaller stage at the side of the auditorium.

Among the shorter acts are the first, or "Co-op" scene; the satiric, "Three Little Angels of Peace" act; "Guadal Patrol," on the darker side of the picture; the comic "Rumor" act; the turnabout "Army Life," the "Quick Black-outs" novelty series; the rather serious and sentimental "Reverie;" and "Women In Industry," in which the war plant situation is carried to its most laughable conclusion.

The three biggest scenes will be the concluding ones in each part. The gay and colorful South American Scene will end part one; a South Sea Island act featuring authentic Hawaiian dances concludes part two; and the sparking Stage Door Canteen with its novelties and entertainment, part three. Following is the finale in which the entire cast appears on the stage and takes part in an original verse choir number entitled "The Yanks Are Coming." The national anthem will mark the end of the show.

Morale is made up of a hundred and one little things—things that we can do everyday to contribute just another fraction of an inch toward the building of that big V for victory. I wonder if anyone of us has actually thought out a schedule or a program by which he can contribute the maximum effort to further victory and still do justice to his own immediate job.

It is obvious that the various channels through which we will direct our efforts will be varied because of the variety in our abilities in our work and in the courses we are taking. The first thing to do is to start right here at Humboldt, now, to work seriously so that each of us can become what he is planning to be, get out into his position and do as well at the job as our brother or cousin is doing flying a plane over the Pacific.

But that's not enough. That's doing our job and doing it well, but we need more than that. We need—and when I say "we," I mean Americans, here at Hum-

boldt and everywhere, free people all over the world—we need to cooperate to a man with every effort the government makes to unite the country. We need to buy every ten-cent war stamp, not that we can afford, but that we can scrape up. Nothing, no matter how trivial it may seem to us, is too insignificant to offer. There are any number of war-time projects we can enter, activities such as helping the Red Cross roll bandages or take care of patients, releasing men for service by working on farms, knitting blocks, 96 of which make a warm afgan for a wounded soldier, attending nursing courses such as the ones Mrs. Hunter teaches here, or doing plane-spotting or air-raid work.

In short, we need to pull together—everyone of us—to eliminate the wasters of time, and grumbles and hoarders who are, so to speak, sabotaging our war effort, and to form one big undefeatable team. We've done it here at Humboldt in the form of the Student Show—a project in which all the members are working toward a single goal namely, to put on a great show; everyone doing his bit, no matter how small and not worrying about the individual credit. If we can accomplish a project like this in our own school and make it a success, then let's use this as a miniature working example of what we can do as a nation.

## WITH THE ARMED FORCES

(A letter of special interest to all who know and love Humboldt comes to us this week from Pfc. Thurston Womack, more often called "Doc" by his friends. Doc is now in Australia, and the following is part of a letter recently received from him by President Gist.)

"Although I've seen very little of this country I can see much evidence of its newness and infancy. It appears to be hard-working and independent. The people are quiet, courteous, and capable. In my American eyes there is much to criticize, but I am a guest here and a good guest should not criticize his host or his host's property.

### ON NATIVE LITERATURE

"I have made a few rather feeble attempts to discover a native literature. I have been unable to discover any such thing as yet. I found a small volume of verse using the Aussie soldier—the Digger—as a subject. It is written in a style comparable to Robert Service. As far as I could discover there is nothing Australian about it—that is, Australian in the sense that Sandburg is American. There must be, however, a native literature. I will continue to look for it. If there isn't any such thing I'll be very much surprised. There is much to be written about this country.

### IMITATIVE

"There is a tendency here to be imitative. They show, almost exclusively, our movies. The Aussie girls attempt to dress and do their hair like our movie queens—without much success. They dance to American dance tunes. Can you imagine "I don't Want to Set the World on Fire" with an Australian accent? They do, however, retain a certain vigor and originality in their language. I know Mr. Hicklin would be interested in their wealth of slang. It is even more varied than the long list of American slang we studied in Mr. Hicklin's English Language course.

(After further comparing Australia with Humboldt, Doc goes on to say:)

"Humboldt—no sweeter memories than those. The sweet, cool smell of the mornings. The blue haze over the town. The halls of the college with its sounds of young, vital voices. The friendly faces and friendly greetings. The stimulating freedom in the classroom. The informality. The inspiring relationship between the faculty and students. Looking up at redwoods that stand in back of the school. The solitary walks up thru the woods. The walks up thru the woods with a friend. The time for reverie and contemplation. A good bull session in the dorm. Murf's good music and counsel. John's impish looks and wit. A romp on the beach on weekends. Spring in Humboldt (it must be spring there now). Poised, cool rhododendrons; massed, fragrant azalea; nodding, roadside lupin. The winding roads thru greenness. The weathered fences and houses and barns. The smell of damp sawdust and freshly split wood. The smell of wood fires. The sharp, almost antiseptic smell of bruised twigs of lowland fir.--And a thousand more memories.

"Keep Humboldt, Mr. Gist, for us to come back to. Those of us who love her. Humboldt has done much for me. It can do more."

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## Rules For Hilarities Are Posted On Bulletin Board

Through the cooperation of the Humboldt Motor Stages, Inc., it has been made possible for a bus to be on hand to take the students in the show home on each and every night of the dress rehearsals and show. It has been emphasized, however, that the buses are of only a limited capacity, and all students who can are urged to bring their cars.

The dress rehearsal for the first half was held last evening, and the next is tomorrow, Thursday evening, from 6:30 until 10:30 for the second half of the show. On Monday afternoon, April 12, classes will be dismissed and there will be a complete rehearsal of the entire show from 12:30 until 6 o'clock. Students who do not know where their acts come in are urged to check the bulletin board.

Students wishing to see the show should attend the Thursday rehearsal because they may not see the show Monday.

The following rules have been laid down for dress rehearsals and the show:

- Boys dress in Room 7.
- Girls dress in Room 11.
- Get your costumes from the storage room upstairs back-stage. Return your costumes to the same room after each rehearsal and performance is over.
- Keep your clothes in orderly array in your respective dressing room.
