Well, I went on into the co-op with them while they had a cigarette and a cup of chocolate to warm themselves up. "Bill Farber's in Australia," I heard Gillie say, "I had a letter yesterday." "Did you? I heard from Murf Saturday. A V-mail letter clear from Hawaii." That was one of my O. P. friends. I thought of the Humboldt boys in the Armed Forces to whom I write, and from whom I receive letters. Jim, Chet, others—especially the two from whom I won't hear again. That's the hard part, but many are facing it, and I guess I can too.

I couldn't help but think, looking at the posters of the Marines, the Navy, the Army, lining the walls of the co-op, the still left up Workday poster emphasizing the fact that "This year women must take over the men's jobs on Workday!"—I couldn't help but think that Humboldt State College had certainly undergone a change.

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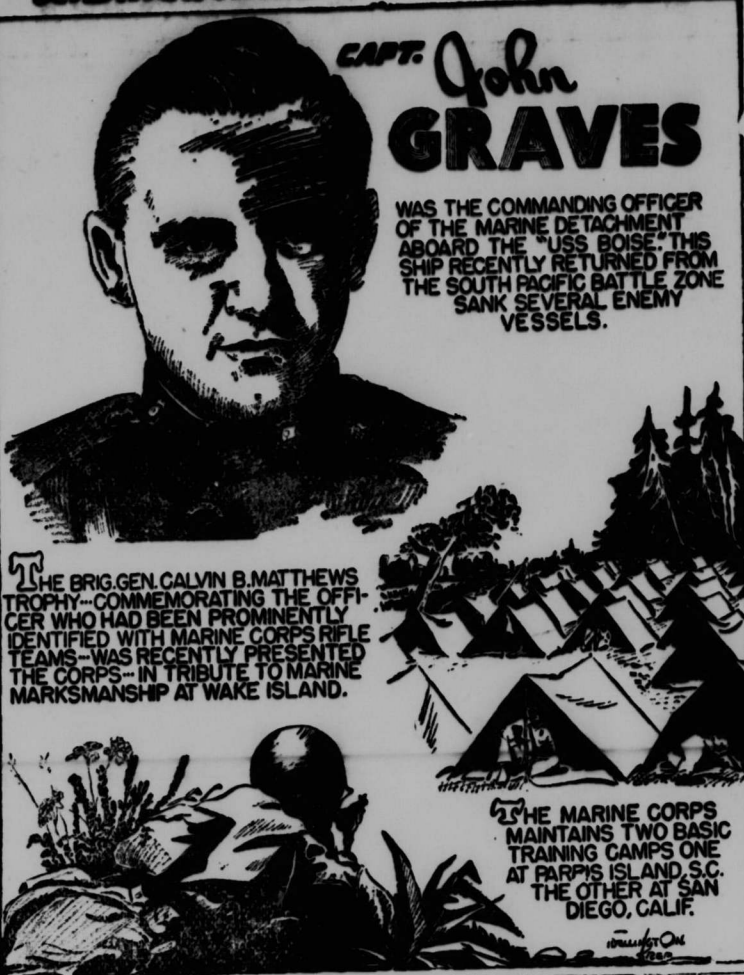

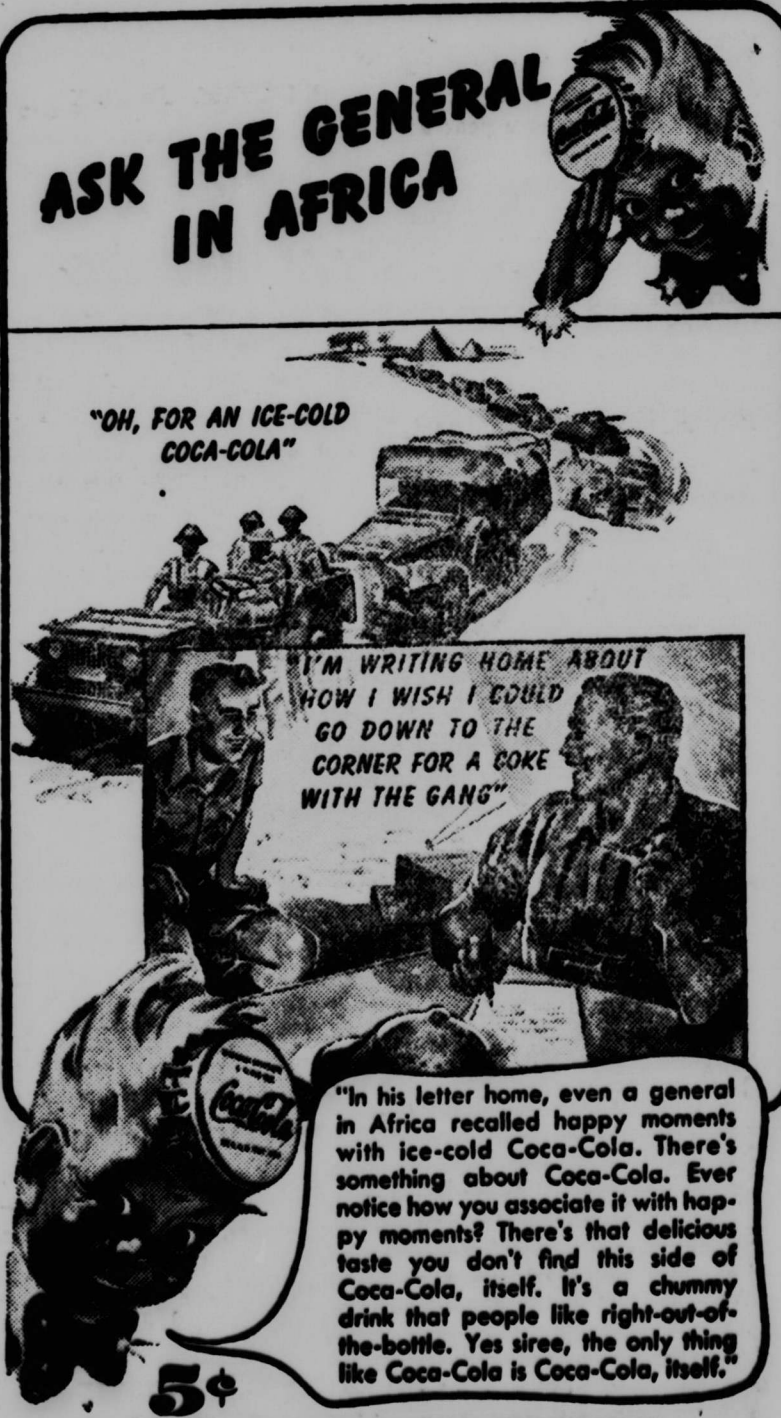
Footnote.

DR. HART SPEAKS ON AIR AGE AT ASSEMBLY HERE

Dr. Hart of the University of California spoke on Air Conditioning America at the assembly Thursday, May 27. Dr. Hart stressed the point that our world is rapidly becoming one of three dimensions, due to the great strides we are making in aviation. America will have to alter its thinking in many ways in the future to prevent the destruction of our social, political, and economic institutions.

Another idea brought out by Dr. Hart was that we will likewise have to alter our ideas of isolationism and nationalism. The world will be too small and we will be too close to other sections of it to consider ourselves apart.

SOLUTION

The solution for the rearrangement in the future is the air conditioning of the youth of the nation. This is being done at present by weaving air education into every subject, grade and school in America. Pre-flight training is being added to the curriculum of high schools all over the country to meet the war situation.

CORPUS CHRISTI, Tex., May 28.—William Channing Lee, son of Mr. and Mrs. W. Lee, Roseville, Illinois, graduated May 12 from the Naval Air Training Center, Corpus Christi, and was commissioned an ensign in the U. S. Naval Reserve.

He is a former student of Humboldt State College, and received his preliminary flight training at the Oakland air base. While at Humboldt he starred in basketball, football and tennis.

North Dakota. He has been a member of the Economics Department faculty at Fresno since 1930.

He will teach a class in Contemporary Economics Problems, which will afford students an opportunity to become familiar with the complex economic problems which must be faced in the war and post-war periods. Of similar import will his course in The History of American Monetary System, which will be a three weeks course offered for only one unit of credit.

Summer session will start on June 21st and run until July 30th. The tuition fee will be \$25 for six weeks, or \$5 a week for less than four weeks. For students who enroll for less than three weeks the fee is five dollars per unit.
