

Well I'm in training now at U. S. Naval Hospital Corps School and is it good duty except for the fact that we live in tents. The chow here is super. I'd tell you what we eat only you poor starving civilians would drool all over this paper and blur the ink. We live eight men in a tent but I expect to have a tent to myself soon as already one of our buddies has gone to sick bay with scarlet fever, and I'm the only one who has already had it so I guess I'm immune. That's how good Humboldters are!

We are living on the site of the Panama-Calif. Exposition of 15-16 and San Diego Fair of 35-36-all types of beautiful building here. We live in what was formerly "Palm Valley" only now it's called "Pneumonia Gulch" (because so many catch pneumonia here I guess.) Each building is of a different architectural structure . 


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Underground War!
