Humboldt Hits Goal In Bonds

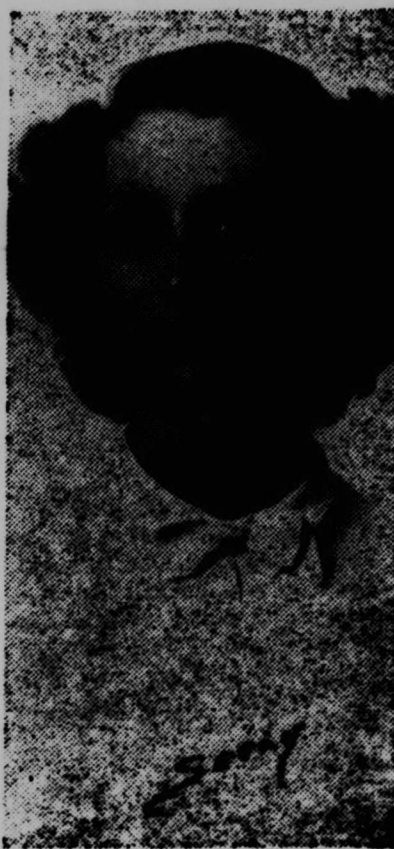

Everyone attending must bring a present. Plans include a program with faculty and students taking part, refreshments, and Christmas decorations.

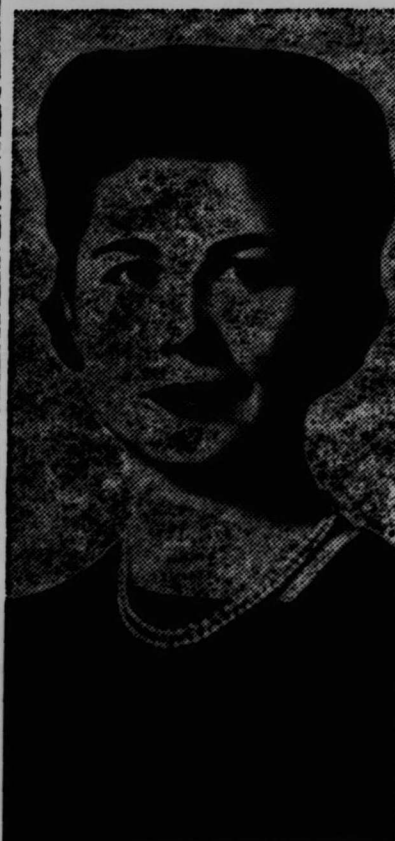
This informal party is attended by the whole school, and is one of the most enjoyable functions of the year.

First of all, let us remember that it was a group of "little sons of heaven" across the sea that started this war—not the American-Jap who farmed that acre of ground in Petaluma, or ran an egg ranch in Hayward. We hate the Japs for their merciless treatment of our own service men and women. But can we hate the Jap who has been an American citizen for over thirty years here in the U. S.?

I think that we should lend every effort to help the Japanese in this country rehabilitate themselves to just living conditions. We must remember that they willingly left their homes to live in filthy concentration camps. We must remember that many of them fought overseas in the American forces. We must remember that they are American citizens.

We do not hate the Americans of German ancestry—why should we hate the Americans of Japanese ancestry?
