Student Union Planned for HSC

Dr. Homer P. Balabanis recently visited Fresno State College for the purpose of inspecting their student union and to aid in planning a post-war union for Humboldt. He also visited San Francisco State and inspected the architect's plans of a proposed student union there.

Dr. Balabanis spent a day and a half drawing plans for a proposed student union at Humboldt and inspecting the building at Fresno State, which is the only state college having a student union concentrating all of the student body activities.

Humboldt's building will include a co-op store, a lounge and social hall, offices for the Lumberjack and Semperviron staffs, offices for the student body, AMS and AWS officers, committee rooms, and facilities for extra-curricular activities. It will be designed to be the center of social life at Humboldt.

As soon as the architect's plans are completed, they will be posted in the hall.

Nothing Can Be Done For Them

The airplane spun like a kite in the funnel of a cyclone. A tail of smoke marked its path in the sky, ending bluntly in the ocean. The blaze that had been its body died as the salt spray extinguished its life. A black, genie-like cloud camouflaged the death scene: plane and crew.

Nothing can be done for them. The first landing force met the fusillade with futile defiance. Enemy fire tore through them. Bodies lay disseminated, half-buried by the wet sand, trampled by the feet of the second landing force.

Nothing can be done for them. The enemy had taken the island; two snipers remained hidden among a protective cluster of ugly boulders. Some of the guttural voices of the exalting victors were fatally silenced by rifle fire from the boulders. Bullets barked and whined from the little rock fortress; men dug blandly like frightened gophers into the gory brown sand. A throw that might have placed in the Olympics quieted the disturbance from the rocks. Portions of the dislodged rock crumpled; a final shot rang out—unaimed; promising.

Nothing can be done for them. The fifth depth-charge found its target—our submarine. The sub accepted the blow with gallantry. It surfaced; in an instant it rolled over and took the life within it downward.

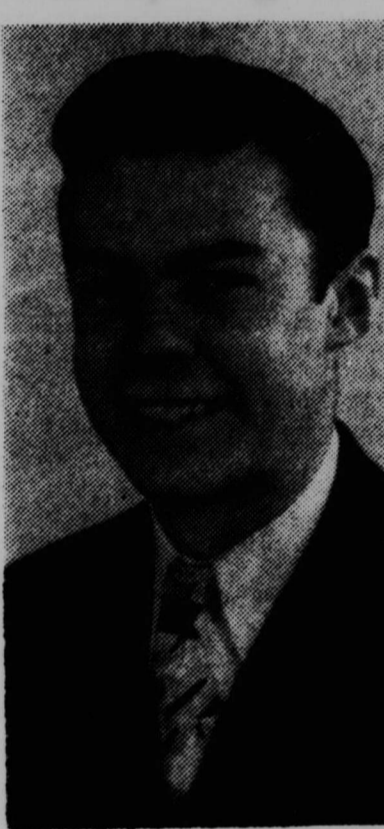
Nothing can be done for them. They are helpless, the "killed in action"; and we are helpless to help them. Nevertheless, that is not usually the case—even in war. There are thousands who need help, need help desperately. You are the source and resource of their existence. You are! You are their hope, their fighting chance after the battle. You are there—helping them when they need you—as they need you—represented by the American Red Cross. There is nothing ethereal about the Red Cross; it is real and living. But its reality and life depends on you. It's unstinted, unrestricted aid, whether in morale or surgery, depends on you.

You cannot go to their stretchers; you cannot reach them tangibly; therefore, you must give so that the American Red Cross can be there, when and where. It will reach them if you fulfill your duty.

No, they, the "wounded in action," would not ask for your contribution if they were able. When they would, they are not able. This is neither drama nor request; it is a COMMAND: GIVE TO THE AMERICAN RED CROSS!!!

Contributing to the Red Cross Drive is one way of aiding those fellows overseas. What are YOU doing about it???

Consequently a schedule has been worked out whereby each and every girl—with her roommate—including the Misses Stoner and Bennett) wash the pots and pans on their given night.

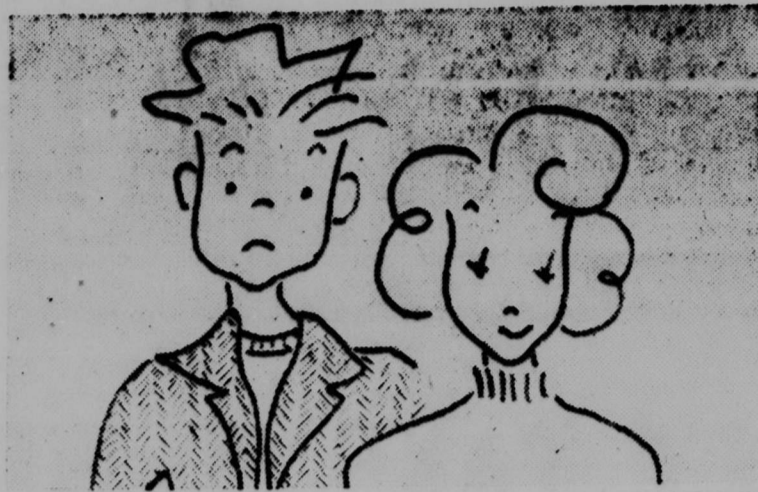
To top it off—the money earned from this is put into the treasury of the group.
