Laughter never stops when reading Betty MacDonald's "The Egg and I." It's her own story of a move from her home in Seattle to a "little place in the country," meeting riotous difficulties involving backwoods life, baby chicks and especially, the egg.

"One Nation" is not light, but we put away comic books when we entered College, didn't we? In it Wallace Stegner and editors of Look Magazine present the story of America's "minority races," who en toto actually comprise the majority of we Americans. This is no plea for tolerance. 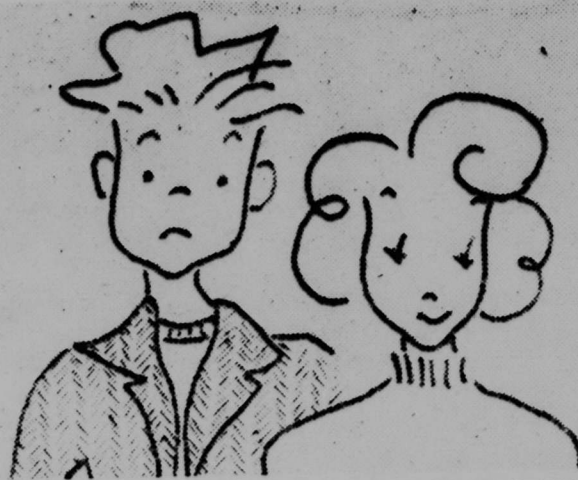

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General MacArthur Receives Emperor Hirohito



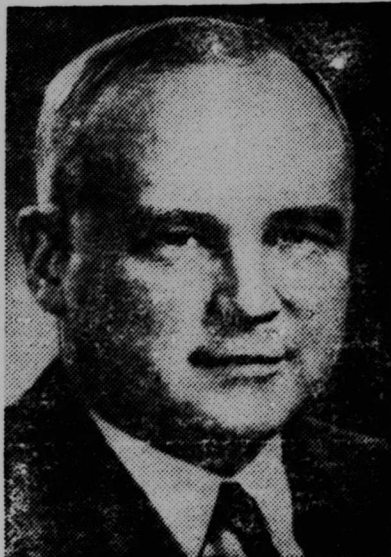

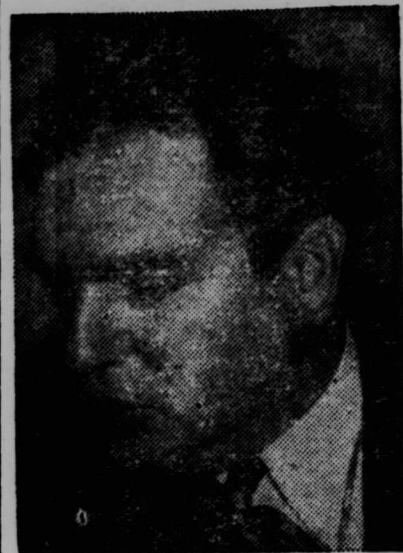
