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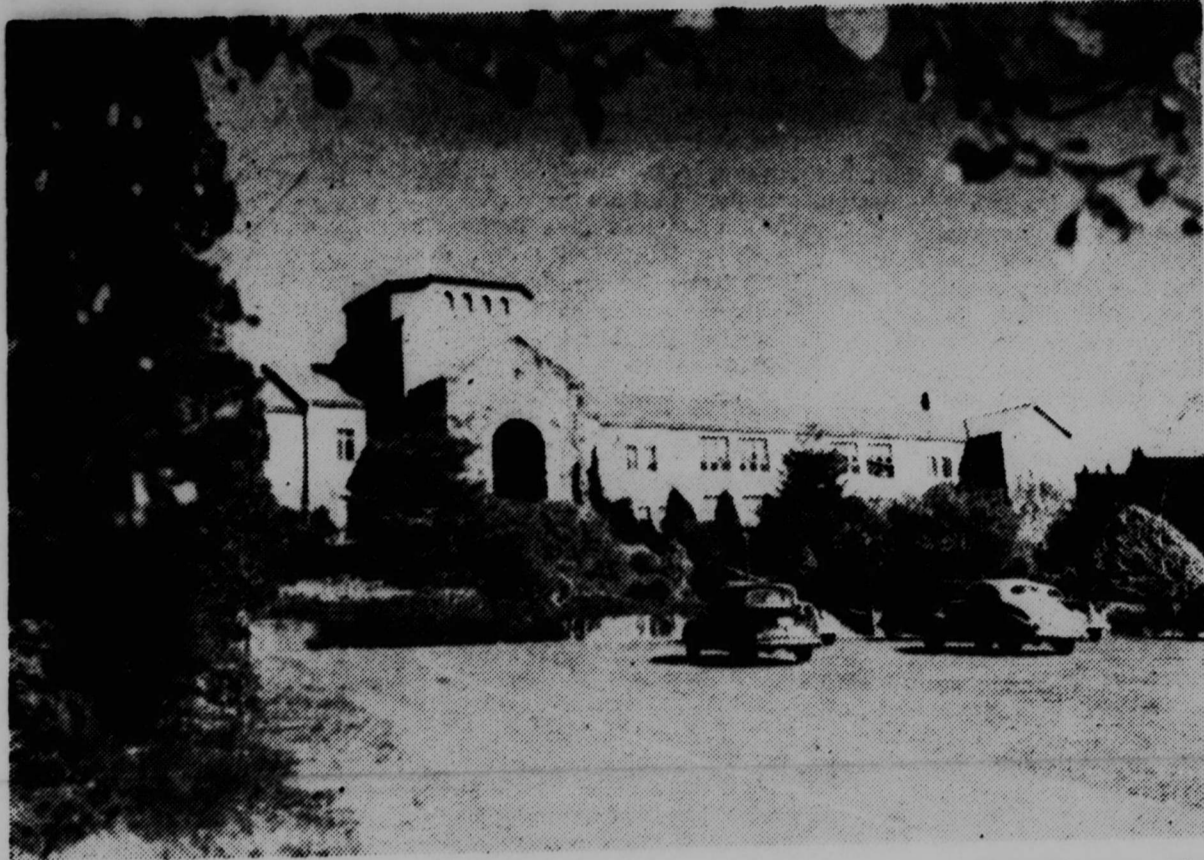
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Humboldt Organizations

First of all, and certainly the most important organization, is our Student Body. It consists of all of those who possess student cards which are usually purchased during registration period. The

holder of a student card has full rights to the Lumberjack, the Semper Virens, and all sport enterprises and student body dances. Marshall Rousseau is our student body president.

Our honor societies are the Chi Sigma Epsilon and the Rho Sigma (Sophomore honor society). Your college grades, if they are good, give you the right to join these societies.

The college "Y," a Christian organization for college young people meets in the small dining room of the cafeteria every Thursday noon. Any individual may join the "Y" as it is inter-denominational. Helen Ribiero is president of this society.

The men's and women's associations are groups consisting of any students who wishes to join. The Men's association, headed by Neil Frost, is open to all men students who wish to join. This is also true of the women's association, headed by Franny Oldridge.
