Three New Seismographs To Be Installed Here

Installation of a seismograph station at Humboldt State College was announced last week following a conference between Dr. Perry Byerly, head seismologist at the University of California, and Dr. Harry MacGinitie, chairman of the division of natural sciences at HSC.

MacGinitie will direct the installation of the new seismographs, one of the latest and most sensitive devices for measuring the intensity of earthquakes yet developed, which is expected to take about six months.

Three Springnether seismographs made in St. Louis will be installed in a special room in the basement of the college. One will measure the north-south motion of the earth, one will measure the west motion, and one the vertical motion.

A concrete pier is to be constructed in the room which will house the seismographs. This pier will be sunk to bedrock and the instruments will be installed on top of the pier.

The seismograph station here will be the second in operation in Humboldt county and the eighth in a chain throughout northern California. The station at Ferndale has been in use for a number of years, and others are located at the University of California, Fresno State, Stanford University, University of San Francisco, Mt. Hamilton, and at Mineral, Mt. Lassen.

UC seismologists are especially interested in the Humboldt county region, due to the large amount of seismic activity which occurs in this area, which lies at the northern end of the San Andreas fault zone. Most of the activity takes place offshore.

The new station will aid in helping to locate the center of many earthquakes off the Humboldt coast. It will be a high frequency station for picking up the smallest earthquakes, but will be regulated so not to pick up movements caused by the ocean surf and the swaying of tree roots during a heavy storm.

Dayton Murray, junior student at Humboldt State who has been prominent in campus affairs, was appointed to the student executive council by Len Conry, president of the HSC associated students, to fill the vacancy caused by the graduation of former council member Chuck Waters at the end of the fall semester. The appointment of Murray was ratified by the council at a recent meeting and was then passed by the student body last Thursday.

Norma Conti Wins Queen Contest

Norma Conti was crowned Sweetheart Queen of Humboldt State College by Harold Tupper, president of the Class of '50, at the first annual Sweetheart Ball held last Friday night in the Eureka Municipal auditorium.

The coronation of the queen at midnight provided the climax to the dance which was acclaimed as the biggest and best formal affair ever presented by a Humboldt State College group.

Preceding the coronation ceremonies, the grand march was led by President Arthur Gist and Mrs. Kenneth Bailey, wife of the dean of students. The participants in the grand march then formed a half circle around the throne which was placed just in front of the stage. Miss Conti and her two maids of honor, Peggy Allen and Eleanor Brannock were lead through the arch in the middle of the floor up to the small semicircle in front of the throne by their escorts.

The maids of honor were each presented with a beautiful bouquet by Dr. Harry MacGinitie and Prof. Ted Delay of the Humboldt faculty, then Miss Conti was lead to her throne by Tupper who placed a lovely floral crown atop her head.

The male quartet of Chet Bosch, John Gasser, John Heller, and Don Stephens then sang a selection in honor of the queen, "Let Me Call You Sweetheart," following which the queen and her attendants were presented with gifts and Miss Conti was given the huge cake baked especially for the queen.

March of Dimes Quota Topped

Announcement was made last week that Humboldt State College would undoubtedly top its \$150 March of Dimes quota by a considerable amount in the drive which was scheduled to end last weekend.

Although all money collected in the drive had not been counted, by last Friday HSC had collected \$125, and this sum did not include money taken in on sale of tickets for the radio which was given away at the Arcata Firemen's Ball last Saturday night.

In the Political Science 51 class last Thursday, a total of \$57 was collected by Alene Beers and her assistants, Red Hunt and Jim Walsh, who staged a quiz program in which tradition was reversed and the audience and contestants paid instead of the sponsors.

McClure Heads Assembly Group

In order to raise the standards of the assemblies at Humboldt State, a new assembly committee has been organized under the chairmanship of Dan McClure which will edit, schedule, and if they deem it necessary, censor any and all assemblies which are presented here.

Among the requirements which have been set up by the committee are that all programs to be presented before the students body be rehearsed at least three times before they are staged. The students executive council has authorized the assembly committee to cancel any program if it does not conform to the standards set up by the committee.

The purpose of scheduling all assemblies is to avoid the jamming of assemblies which has always occurred in the past when they are put off until the latter part of the semester, causing a large portion of them to be given in May instead of being spread out during the semester. The assembly committee also hopes to meet with the leaders of the clubs and organizations on the campus in April to arrange the program schedule for next fall.

Mary Tiffany To Appear In Auditorium Concert



Two young artists, Mary Tiffany, modern dancer, and Tillie Dieterle, pianist, will appear in a modern dance concert to be given by Mu Epsilon Psi, HSC music fraternity, and the modern dance group in the Humboldt State College auditorium next Tuesday night, February 25, at 8 p. m.

The two girls are now making their concert tour of the Pacific Northwest, appearing at universities, colleges, and clubs. In a way, the girls are pioneering in their field. They do all of their own dance creations and arrange their own music, then practice until the dance becomes a "living sketch."

Miss Tiffany departs from the usual sombre tone of the modern dance, and includes in her "sketches" such comedy numbers as "Voices of Spring" and "The Body Beautiful," where the agonies of the reducing female are humorously burlesqued. There are the serious dances also, such as "When Young" and her impressive selection of "In Memorium." She received her training in New York in the Neighborhood Playhouse, and has appeared in New York musicals and motion pictures.

Miss Dieterle is both a concert and popular pianist. She arranges all of the music for Miss Tiffany's dances. She received her training at the University of California at Los Angeles under Arthur Schoenberg, and previous to the tour was solo pianist at the Biltmore hotel in Los Angeles. During the war, she played for the movie

stars at the Hollywood Canteen, for officers clubs and hospital shows where her traveling co-worker also appeared.

Miss Tiffany does all of her own choreography, designs her own costumes, and does nearly all of her own sewing. Both of the girls are college graduates, but Miss Tiffany had to return to UCLA for a postgraduate course in psychology in order to have a place to practice when the stage shortage became acute.

Tickets for the show are on sale at the White House and Bledsoes in Arcata, and at the White House and Mathews Music in Eureka. General admission is \$1.00 and 65c for students.

Every now and then a stereotype method of thinking sweeps the nation. For instance, when Lawrence Tibbett was singing on the Hit Parade, it was, "oh yes, I think he's a very good singer, but I don't think he should be singing popular songs." Later it was the Pall Mall episode, and others followed. Now — eight months after Kathleen Windsor published Forever Amber—it is:—"Nothing but a sensation writer—no artistic writing—no good."

As is always the case, the majority of the people are not well qualified to render such opinions. In the case of Windsor's Forever Amber, they are probably half right; but to dismiss her writing with a wave of the hand on the thinking of someone else is an injustice. I wonder whether the writer of Book Shelf has ever read Forever Amber. Or probably he has overlooked the many fine descriptive passages—the account of the black death for one, or the superb character delineation of the "nurse" during the plague. If you are to dismiss her on the ground of sensationalism, then we must dismiss Flaubert for his Madame Bovary; Boccaccio for his Decamerone; Defoe for his Mall Flanders. Oh woe, oh woe, that college book reviewers should be so severe.

SF State Dumps Humboldt Twice

The fast breaking and sharp shooting tactics of the San Francisco State College basketball team proved more than the Humboldt State five could cope with last weekend as the Lumberjacks dropped the first two games of their eleven day tour to the Golden Gaters in Kezar auditorium by scores of 63-42 and 59-57.

In the opener game of the series played last Friday night, the Gaters ran off with the ball game in the second half as they fast broke the tiring Lumberjacks practically off the floor. The game was hotly contested throughout the first half, with the San Franciscans holding only a four point, 32-28 lead at halftime. Darrel Brown paced the Humboldt cagers with 12 points.

Humboldt came back stronger on Saturday night to nearly knock over the highly rated Gaters, who recently almost upset the University of San Francisco Dons. With Brown, Jack Newman, and Claude Eshleman leading the way with 19, 18, and 14 points respectively, the Lumberjacks came within an ace of victory.

The score was knotted at 57-57 with only 30 seconds remaining in the game, but then Jim Rathgen of the Gaters broke loose to receive a long pass from teammate John Burton and send a lay in through the hoop for the winning tallies. The final whistle blew before Humboldt could get the ball back into their own court.

Coach Joe Forbes' charges continued their tour this week with games in Los Angeles against Pepperdine, Occidental, and Chapman colleges. Humboldt will wind up their tour this Friday and Saturday nights at Davis where they will meet the Cal Aggie combine.
