Lumberjacks To Battle Southern Oregon Twice

Coach Joe Forbes' Humboldt State College Lumberjacks, after absorbing a pair of nip and tuck beatings last Friday and Saturday nights at Chico, will attempt a comeback this weekend when they will collide with the Southern Oregon College cagers from Ashland in a two game series in the college gym.

The invaders from the north recently upped their stock when they copped a two game series last weekend to the Oregon College Wolves from Monmouth, the same five which battled Humboldt here Monday night.

Preliminary games for the Southern Oregon games will find the Lumberjack Junior Varsity meeting the Fort Humboldt American Legion post Friday night at 7 p. m., while two teams from HSC intramural leagues are scheduled to lock horns in Saturday's opener.

MEET FORTUNA TONIGHT

The Lumberjacks who suffered a 77-65 defeat at the hands of the Berry's Toggery five of Ferndale in their Humboldt County Independent League opener last week, will face the strong Fortuna Merchants combine tonight on the Fortuna High hardwood as Independent League play rolls into its second week.

In the rough and tumble Independent League curtain raiser last Tuesday, which saw four Lumberjacks and one Ferndaler leave the game via foul route, it was the great shooting of the veteran Ferndale workhorse, Franny Givins, which paced the Cream City cagers to their double overtime victory. Givins tallied 29 points to lead the scoring while Gene Moses and Darrel Brown were high for the Lumberjacks.

Holliday to Be New Dean of Men

Appointment of Jay N. Holliday as acting Dean of Men at Humboldt State College has been announced by President Arthur S. Gist. Mr. Holliday succeeds Dean George E. Murphy, who has resigned to accept a position in the east. Murphy will leave February 1, and Holliday's duties will begin with the opening of the spring semester on February 3.

Holliday came to Humboldt in November as the Veterans Vocational Counsellor, and has been serving in that capacity not only for Humboldt State College veterans but for all of northern California. He has had varied training and experience which give him special fitness for his new assignment here. He is a graduate of the University of Southern California where he received his bachelor's and master's degrees in education. He has also studied at Western State College of Colorado, University of Nebraska College of Medicine, and the University of Colorado.

He has taught at Brawley Junior College, where he served as vice-principal and dean of men and as instructor in geology and psychology, and at Reedley J. C. as publicity director and instructor in psychology. In the Los Angeles city schools, he served as critic teacher for UCLA and U. S. C. in the high schools of that city.

During the war, Holliday was a Captain in the Army, serving as counselor in an army hospital for a year, and thereafter as inspector and supervisor in counselling for all army hospitals.

Mrs. Holliday has also accepted a position on the college faculty as an assistant in mathematics.

High School Dramatists To Hold Festival Here

Seven Northwestern California high schools will gather at Humboldt State College on Saturday, January 18, for the first program of the resurrected Dramatic Festival. The Festival, originated in the early 1920, was disbanded over a decade later, and its rebirth marks the culmination of plans laid by Don W. Karshner nearly six years ago. Karshner, head of Humboldt State College Department of Dramatics, announced that the high schools participating will be South Fork, Fortuna, Ferndale, Eureka, Arcata, Del Norte, and possibly Weaverville.

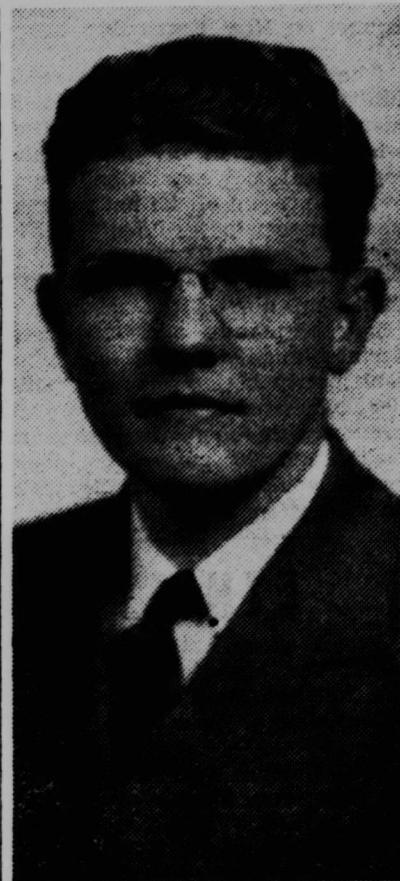
The high spots of the day's activities will include four one act plays, a play reading presented by the HSC Chapter of Alpha Psi Omega, National collegiate honorary dramatic society, a presentation by the HSC Dramatic Department on the elements of college level play production, an afternoon dance, and a luncheon and dinner. Eureka high school will present the tragic one act play, **Submerged**; South Fork High school, **Mooncalf Mugford**, a serious fantasy; and Ferndale, the farcical play, **The Charm Racket**.

In the afternoon, there will be a dance, featuring Don Wilson, and the Humboldt State Collegians at the Danish Hall for the high school delegates and the college hosts and hostesses. Representatives of the various college organizations have been working to assure the high school students, of which nearly two hundred are expected, an interesting and informative day. The Alpha Psi Omega, Associated Men Students, Mu Epsilon Psi, P. E. Club, Women's Athletic Association, Spurs, Knights, Freshman Class, Student Teachers, YMCA, Conservation Unlimited, and the Men and Women of Nelson Hall have offered their services for the day.

The planning for the Festival was started in 1941 by Karshner, and after being shelved for the war years, was offered to a group of high school dramatic directors at the Annual Teacher Institute last fall. Subsequent meetings held to complete the planning, were attended by Mr. Robert Nossen of South Fork Union High School, Mr. H. E. Keeney of Ferndale Union High School, Miss Elizabeth Abraham of Fortuna High School, Mrs. C. E. Martin of Eureka High School, Mr. Jack Paul and Mrs. Nell Murphy of Arcata Union High School, Miss Jane Ross of Weaverville High School, and Don W. Karshner, Ted Delay, John Van Duzer, and Miss Kate Buchanan of the college faculty.

Where is that spirit that used to be so much a part of Humboldt State. It is your duty to support your Lumberjacks.

The second night's play was nearly a repetition of the opener, with the Green and Gold cagers trading basket for basket during the opening half and finally going into a 25-24 lead at the intermission. But Tipton came back strong in the second half to send the Wildcats into a lead which the Humboldters could not overcome. Gene Moses, HSC center, was high for the locals with 19 points.

The two teams will meet in a return series on the Humboldt floor January 24 and 25.

A study of the Humboldt State enrollment figures shows that HSC is no longer primarily a teacher's college, since only one-fifth of the students here are preparing for teaching. Pre-professional with 34 percent of the enrollment, and liberal arts majors also with 34 percent top the list.

Another breakdown of the figures shows that only 47 seniors, 66 juniors, and 106 sophomores
