### Griffith to be Featured Speaker at Honor Assembly

Harry Griffith, director of teacher training at the College Elementary school and formerly director of normal schools and teacher training in Japan when stationed there as a major in the army of occupation, will be the featured speaker at the Honor Assembly to be held tomorrow afternoon by Rho Sigma, sophomore honor society, and Chi Sigma, upper division honor society. The assembly will be held in the auditorium and is scheduled to begin at 1 p. m.

Also included in the program will be the reading of the honor roll for the fall semester by Dayton Murray of Rho Sigma, the awarding of the house trophy to the house on the campus whose members compiled the highest honor point average for the fall semester, and the announcement of pledges to Rho Sigma and Chi Sigma.

Special numbers on the program will be selections by the male quartet of Chet Bosch, John Gasser, John Heller, and Don Stephens. Stephens will also sing a solo selection.

Melba Jo Turner, president of Chi Sigma, will preside over the ceremonies. Members of Rho Sigma are in charge of the decorations for the auditorium.

### Eight New Profs May Be Added To Faculty

The budget of Governor Warren as submitted to the state legislature makes allowance for the addition of eight more faculty members to the Humboldt State College faculty, it was announced this week by Dr. Homer Balabanis, dean of arts and sciences.

Tentative plans are being made to assign these eight to the fields of secondary education, physical science, home economics, physical education and health, English (journalism), economics and business administration, psychology and sociology.

Beginning next semester, plans call for a development of a minor in journalism, with the administrator of the journalism curriculum assisting the staff of the Lumberjack in expanding and improving the paper.

### New Organization Formed On Campus

Latest organization to be formed on the Humboldt campus is the Newman club, a nationwide group with chapters in 150 colleges and universities throughout the country. Advisors for the HSC chapter are Ted Delay, Miss Addie Goodin, and Bill Jackson.

The Newman club is made up of Catholic students and about 30 members now belong to the organization.

Eddie O'Donnell was elected president of the club, Bob Oliveira was named vice-president, Gloria Simmerly is secretary-treasurer and Norma Sprague social chairman.

Activities which are planned by the Newman club include both social and discussion and study groups. The next meeting will be held on March 13 at 7:30 p. m. in the Social Unit. Regular meetings are held once a month.

### A Cappella Choir Plans Easter Tour

Tentative plans for a six day tour to San Francisco during Easter week have been laid by the Humboldt State College A Cappella choir. Leaving Arcata Friday, March 28, the 35 members and director Leland Barlow will journey to the bay city, making several public appearances en route. Plans are being completed for performances in San Francisco and a radio broadcast over radio station KSFO.

### Alpha Psi Wants Dance Theme Ideas

Alpha Psi Omega, Humboldt State dramatic society, announced last week that suggestions for a theme around which will be built the annual Costume Ball will this year be left to the student body.

Phyllis Peugh, in charge of selecting the theme for the dance, stated that a box will be placed in the front hall this week. She said that any suggested themes should be placed in the box by March 12.

The dance will take place April 25, and will feature the coronation of the Campus Queen, who will be selected in a student body wide election. The Alpha Psi Omega queen contest is the original Humboldt State queen contest, with candidates being sponsored by campus organizations and living groups, such as dormitories and houses.

Petitions for Campus Queen contest entries should be submitted to Box 462, and all petitions must be in by March 14 at 12 noon.

### PE Club Members To Attend Meet

Eight members of the Humboldt State Physical Education majors club will journey to a Santa Cruz conference in the near future to participate in a discussion on the "Place of Physical Education in the Elementary School," it was decided at a recent meeting of the organization.

Other plans which the P. E. club has include a drive toward completion of the running track around the Redwood Bowl turf. The club is now awaiting the track specifications which must come from the state engineer before work can be completed on the track.

### HSC Netsters May Play In Tourney

Ellis Williamson, playing manager of the Humboldt State tennis team, announced Monday that he and Cliff Mitchell will probably represent Humboldt in the Northern California Tennis Association pre-season collegiate matches to be held at Berkeley March 28 and 29.

Williamson posted his initial call for candidates for the Lumberjack tennis team Monday, and practices will begin as soon as weather permits. While a men's team is assured, a women's team may also be formed if enough interest is shown.

Williamson is a veteran Humboldt netster, and was number one man on last year's team. Mitchell is a freshman, but has had plenty of tennis experience at Roosevelt High in Fresno and at Eureka High school. He won the Humboldt-Del Norte CIF boys' singles championship two years straight while at Eureka High.

### Top Player Award To Be Given Here

A trophy which will be awarded to the outstanding Humboldt State College athlete for the 1946-47 school year was received last week from Jack Dempsey and the Adam Hat company, who award trophies of this kind to colleges and universities throughout the country.

The trophy stands about twenty inches high, and is topped by a gold figure. It will be awarded on the basis of a student body wide election sometime in May, and will become the personal property of the person to whom it is awarded.

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Do ya wanta buy a bus?

This is a question which the Humboldt State student body will be called upon to answer sometime in the very near future. The question of whether or not the associated students should take advantage of the offer through which they can obtain a 1943 Chevrolet bus in good mechanical condition for only about \$1300.

The idea behind the purchase is a commendable one—to wit: that in order to cut down student body expenditures a cheaper mode of transportation should be found for athletic teams, which make the majority of the long trips, and music and dramatic groups.

Now, as was stated before, this is a fine idea. The savings that would be effected would undoubtedly be considerable. But, on the other hand, is the bus suitable for carrying passengers on a long trip?

Mechanically, it undoubtedly is, but as far as comfort is concerned, it undoubtedly is not. If the student body looks at the question from a purely monetary angle, then the bus should be purchased. But they cannot expect anyone who makes a trip of any distance in that bus to do a good job when they arrive at their destination, whether they be athletes, musicians, actors, or anyone else.

In the first place, the seats of the bus have very little padding. Maybe the first string football players could stand it (but we doubt it), but think of the reserves who spend plenty of time on the bench as it is, without having to be subjected to riding the equivalent of a moving teeter-totter for 300 miles or so. They would certainly become hardened and calloused in a hurry, and that might be taken a number of ways.

Then there is a little matter of room, or rather lack of it, between the seats. Anyone larger than a midget is forced to sit in the same position as he would in a straight backed chair, except that in the chair he could probably stretch his legs from time to time. Not so in the bus. Once you sit down, if you are on the inside seat, you sit there with your legs tucked up under your chin until the bus stops and you get a chance to pile out and rest your bones.

Of course, if you are on the out-

side seat and able to put your legs in the aisle, you are still better off. For the benefit of those who have not been inside the bus, there are no arms on any of the seats and on a sharp curve the outside man is quite liable to find himself sitting in the aisle.

Naturally, there is at present no room to put all the luggage which would have to be carried by an athletic, music or dramatic group. This would have to be stacked in the aisle, a situation which would add a difficulty in getting in and out of the contraption.

So, fellow students, if you purchase the bus, it might be wise to do so with the stipulation that no group of any of the kinds mentioned above would have to ride in the bus if it were deemed inadvisable by the person in immediate charge of the group. Nobody should be subjected to that against his will.

## Students Argue Purchase of Bus

Arguments over the proposed purchase of a surplus former Army Air corps bus featured last Thursday's meeting of the Humboldt State associated students.

The bus, a 1943 Chevrolet accommodating 29 persons, was bought recently by Robert Madsen, HSC alumnus, on his veteran's priority and he has offered it to the associated students for approximately \$1300.

Those favoring the purchase of the bus argued that it should be bought in order to send athletic teams, dramatic and music groups, and other student body organizations on trips for which private cars and chartered busses have been used in the past. Proponents of the purchase stated that money spent for the bus would be made up in a comparatively short period of time, since the cost of sending a student body-owned bus on a trip would be far less than is paid when other forms of transportation are used. They also stated that the student body, if it did not want to keep the bus, could buy it and then re-sell it at a profit.

Opponents of the measure stated that the bus was built for short trips and is not suitable for lengthy journeys to places like San Francisco, Chico, or Davis. There is no room for baggage either inside or on top of the bus, and all athletic gear, musical instruments, or dramatic properties which would have to be taken would have to be stacked in the aisles.

After a long discussion, a motion by Jim Walsh to table the issue was passed, and it will be taken up again at the next student body meeting.

## VETERANS CORNER

Thousands of Northern California veterans who have dropped their National Service Life Insurance now have another opportunity to reinstate without a physical examination, according to an announcement made by the Veterans Administration Public Relations office last week. This opportunity was granted when President Truman signed the bill extending to August 1, 1947, the veteran's privilege of signing a comparative health statement to reinstate his NSLI.

A comparative health statement is simply a statement by the veteran that his health is as good as when his policy lapsed.

In addition to the health statement, all that a veteran must do to regain his NSLI is to pay one back premium and one current premium—two monthly premiums altogether.

A veteran may reinstate the full amount of the insurance he allowed to lapse, or he may reinstate only a part. If he wants to carry more insurance than he had when his policy lapsed, he must first reinstate his old policy and then apply for an additional amount. In no case, however, can a veteran carry more than \$10,000 of NSLI, and if less the amount must be a multiple of \$500.

VA is not putting "pressure" on veterans to reinstate, but the agency believes it is vitally important to the veteran and his dependants to know the following things about NSLI:

1. NSLI carries more advantages than any other insurance because the Federal government considers such advantages part of the nation's obligation to veterans.

2. NSLI carries the lowest premiums of any insurance because the government absorbs administrative expenses.

3. NSLI can be purchased only by veterans; it is the veteran's "finest asset from service."

Question: I want to change the beneficiary on my National Service Life Insurance, but I don't want the old beneficiary to know about it. Can I do this?

Answer: Yes. A veteran may change his NSLI beneficiary or beneficiaries at any time without their knowledge or consent.

Q: Is there any way that I can get Veterans Administration to deduct my NSLI monthly premium from the disability compensation

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## Pape Announces Fourteen Game Baseball Schedule

Humboldt State's 1947 baseball team will open its season March 31 against Vallejo J. C. at Vallejo, it was announced last week by Coach Larry Pape who outlined the Lumberjacks' schedule for the coming campaign.

A fourteen game slate has been mapped for the Green and Gold pastimers, including games with the University of Oregon and Oregon State College, and more home games are expected to be added against both college and local independent nines.

Prospects are bright for a winning ball club this year with a wealth of fine infield talent currently the best spot in the Lumberjack diamond picture. A hard hitting outfield and good catching are also looked for, and a shortage of good moundsmen is the only questionable aspect to date.

With the season opener less than four weeks away, Pape is expecting to mould his pitching staff around Red Hunt, a former Eureka High ace and a veteran of two seasons with the Humboldt Crabs, local independent team, and Gene Johnson, another lad who toiled on the hill for Les Mooneyham's EHS Loggers. The rest of the team's hurlers, including Gerry Couer, Laurald, Stebbins, and Dick Lawitzke, show lots of promise, but must improve if they are to silence the bats of the San Francisco State and Cal Aggie batsmen, who they will face early in the campaign.

In the infield, the outlook is more promising, with several hot battles being fought for the starting positions.

At first base, Johnny MacDonald and Bob Bell are staging a hard fight for the post at the initial sack. MacDonald is a brilliant fielding artist who also performed with the Crabs last season, but he lacks Bell's power at the plate. Right now, it looks as though MacDonald may be kept on first with Bell being transferred to the outfield.

At second, George Brazil, Cliff Mitchell, and Jim Dickinson are staging a three-way battle for the

right to cover the keystone sack. All are speedy boys who cover plenty of territory.

Ed Oliveira, another ex-Crab and a great high school star when he performed with the Arcata High Tiger nine, and Lenny Gold are the chief contestants in the competition for shortstop.

Patrolling the hot corner when opening day rolls around will probably be either Links Carranco, a hard hitting slugger who covered third for the Crabs during a part of last season, and George Renworth, another boy who is strong both at the plate and in the field.

Working back behind the plate, there is a wealth of catching talent to handle the slants of the Humboldt hurlers. Top men at the moment in the behind-the-mask department are Phil Young, Bob Thoman, Royce Lima, and Bob Brennan. Brennan is a long ball hitter who may be transplanted to an outfield post in order to get the most out of his hitting ability.

Roaming the outer gardens will probably be Mike Whelan, Spider Klingenspor, W. Bailey, Walt Sweet, and Wilson. With the possibility that Bell and Brennan may be sent to the outfield, Pape is assured of a heavy hitting gang of fielders.

Pape said that home games will probably be played in the Arcata ball park, and that as many as possible will be night games.

From all appearances, Coach Larry Pape should come up with a pretty fair ball club this season—that is if he can round his mound staff into shape for the rugged schedule. Those hurlers will have to be on their toes if they are to win their share of games against teams like Oregon State and University of Oregon.

The backbone of the pitching staff at the moment consists of a pair of better than average right handers, Red Hunt and Gene Johnson. Incidentally, Hunt earned a niche in baseball's local hall of fame two seasons ago when he twirled a no hit, no run game against the Cincinnati Rookies nine. The big redhead was performing with Paladini's Humboldt Crabs at the time.

Speaking of baseball, "Lefty" Bullen, HSC art instructor tried his hand on the mound the other day, pitching batting practice for a while to the Lumberjack baseballers. But he found to his dismay that the old wing isn't what she used to be by coming up with a sore arm the following day.

Switching the subject, I might comment on the way in which athletic letters are awarded around this institution. Maybe I am living in the past, but I always felt that it was a good gesture towards members of football, basketball, track, tennis, and baseball teams to award letters to a certain specified number from each sport.

In my time at Humboldt, there has never been a single award of this type made at a student body assembly. Maybe the letters are given away somewhere else around school, but it seems to me that those guys who spend two or three hours in practice nearly every day for two or three months should get a little recognition for their efforts. And it is safe to say that an assembly where these awards are made would be quite a bit more interesting than some of the ones which have been presented lately.

## Important Games Tomorrow Night

Two important games which will have an important bearing on the final standings in the Humboldt County Independent league national division will be played tomorrow night in the Eureka Municipal auditorium.

In the opening game, scheduled to get under way at 7:30 the Buon Gusto five will meet the vastly improved College Ramblers combine, the team which pulled one of the big upsets of the season in upsetting the American Legion recently.

The second game will see the American Legion quintet battling the Classics in another evenly matched tussle.

In order to stay in contention for the national division title, both the Buon Gusto and the Legion fives must come out on the long end of the score in tomorrow's night's contests. If the two teams go through the rest of the season without a defeat, a three way tie will be effected, necessitating a playoff between the BG, Legion, and Humboldt State Jayvees.

## Humboldt Cagers Win Hoop Titles

With the Humboldt State varsity's conquest of the Sportsmen's club last Saturday night and the Lumberjack javees victory earlier last week over the Buon Gusto, both Green and Gold cage combines had either all or parts of the championships of the two Humboldt County Independent leagues.

Coach Joe Forbes' varsity cagers gained undisputed possession of the American division crown as they went through their 10 game, double round robin Independent league schedule with a record of nine victories and one defeat. Their double overtime loss to the Ferndale Berry's Toggery quintet in the Independent league opener is the lone blot on their otherwise perfect Independent record.

At present, Phil Young's Junior Varsity is faced with the possibility of a three way tie between themselves, the Buon Gusto, and the American Legion teams. The Jayvees assured themselves of at least a tie when they came from behind in the second half against the BG to score a 44-41 victory. George Brazil of the Buon Gusto and Jim Carvell of the Junior Varsity took high scoring honors with 16 and 14 points respectively.

## HSC Scores Win

Paced by Darrel Brown's 17 point attack, the Humboldt State College basketball team completed their 1946-47 cage season with a 53-40 victory over the Eureka Sportsmen's club quintet in a game played last Saturday night in the college gym.

The Lumberjack's conquest gave them undisputed possession of the Humboldt County Independent league American division title. The Sportsmen's club was the defending champion.

Coach Joe Forbes' cagers got off to an early lead, running up a 12 point, 27-15 lead, at halftime, and holding to their margin throughout the second half. Brown's 17 points took high scoring honors for the evening, and he was followed by Ed Oliveira of the Lumberjacks and Darrel Bishop and Howard Goodwin of the Sportsmen's club, who each collected nine.

## Brown Sets High Scoring Record

Looking over the box scores of Humboldt State's basketball games for the recently completed season, it is not hard to see that by virtue of his point making exploits alone, Darrel Brown, the lanky forward on the Lumberjack varsity, has justly established himself as an outstanding candidate for the 1947 Little All-American basketball team.

By racking up 17 points in the final games of the season last Saturday night against the Sportsmen's club, Brown brought his point total to 569 tallies for the season, a mark which placed Coach Joe Forbes' ace among the top collegiate scorers in the nation.

It took Brown only 32 games to pile up his remarkable record, which smashed all existing Humboldt State season scoring marks. Brown's average per game was 17.77 tallies.

The Lumberjack sensation was at his best in college games where the going was tough, and spent plenty of time on the bench against some of the weaker Independent league teams which the Green and Gold faced. His top performance of the season was of course the record breaking 42 point total which he picked up against Chico State in the final game of the HSC-Chico series. He also added 133 markers to his total in the seven games which Humboldt played on their recent road trip to Southern California. These performances are all the more remarkable in view of the fact that Humboldt dropped five of the seven games.

Forbes has called Brown the greatest cager he has seen in action this season, and these sentiments have been echoed by several coaches who have seen Brown run wild against their teams.

Although the rains which fell during the early part of the week tossed a monkey wrench into Coach Joe Forbes' original plans to open track and field practice Monday afternoon, it was hoped that the field would dry out sufficiently so that the initial workouts could get under way.

As Humboldt prepares to go into the biggest track season in the history of the college, a season which will culminate in the Far Western Conference track meet at Davis on May 24, prospects are bright for a successful campaign with several experienced men expected to be present when practice begins.

A pair of top flight middle distance men who will be wearing the

Humboldt colors are Jake Newman and Cliff Bedwell. Newman formerly starred at Long Beach City College where he holds both the mile and half mile records.

Sid Cohen and Caplan will be hard to beat in the shot put competition. While in the service, Cohen took second place in the shot put when he performed in the Inter-Allied games overseas.

A couple of crack quarter milers are expected in Ad Holden and Ed Oliveira, who set a Humboldt-Del Norte CIF 440 record when he was pickin' 'em up and layin' 'em down for Arcata High. Holden is also an ace 200 yard low hurdler.

Turkey Thompson and Brick Bralich are among the pole vaulters who will be hoisting themselves into the atmosphere when meet time rolls around. Thompson went 13 feet 3 inches when stationed at Lowry Field, Colorado, in 1944. He should have little trouble in cracking the present HSC mark of 12 feet.

Grady Lawrence, Spider Klingenspor, and Darrel Brown are listed among the probable high jumpers. Lawrence and Klingenspor have both hit 6 feet two in this event, while Brown is an unknown quantity. However, the lanky basketball star should do well in the high jump with the powerful spring in his legs.

Claude Eshleman and Wally Tudor will probably be among the ace timber toppers running the high hurdles for the Lumberjacks.
