Gist Announces Pape Resignation

The resignation of Laurence A. Pape, Humboldt State College head baseball coach and chairman of the division of health and physical education was announced this week from the office of Arthur S. Gist, college president.

Pape is leaving in order to continue his advanced work towards a doctor's degree, the announcement said.

Pape came to Humboldt last fall and has been active in promoting the broad intramural program which has been in effect this year. He is now coaching the first baseball team which the college has had in several years.

Before coming here, Pape coached in an eastern high school and at the University of Buffalo. He served in the Navy from 1943-45.

In making the announcement of the resignation, Gist stated, "The administration recognizes Mr. Pape's ability and intelligent efforts in the field of physical education. Our best wishes go with Mr. and Mrs. Pape."

No successor has been named as yet to fill the vacancy caused by Pape's leaving. His resignation becomes effective at the close of the present semester.

Magazine Holds Fiction Contest

Of interest to the budding feminine authors at HSC is the College Fiction Contest now being sponsored by Mademoiselle, noted women's magazine.

At the close of the contest on May 1, the editors of Mademoiselle will select two stories from those submitted by women undergraduates of colleges throughout the nation for publication in the August issue of the magazine. Prizes of \$500 each will be awarded to the authors of the prize-winning stories.

All stories must be from 3000-5000 words in length. Mademoiselle may also buy at the magazine's regular rate stories entered in the contest other than the prize winners.

Armistice Day Game Cancelled

Joe Forbes, HSC director of athletics and head football coach, announced Monday that next fall's Armistice Day grid classic, originally scheduled with the Santa Clara freshman team, has been cancelled due to the fact that examinations will be given that week at Santa Clara and the university authorities will not permit the football players to leave. Attempts are now being made to sign another school in order that the date can be filled.

Bid Received For Track Work

Announcement that Humboldt State College may have a first class running track before the spring is over was made last week when track specifications were received from the state engineer.

These specifications were far better than had been expected here and instead of having the job done by the college's own labor, as was originally planned, the work was let open to contract last week and a bid was received from the Mercer Fraser company of Eureka.

The bid was made on Saturday, and on Sunday President Arthur Gist left for Sacramento with the bid. Now in the capitol city, Gist is attempting to rush the contract through as quickly as possible in order that the track can be completed before the track season is too far advanced.

Federalists Plan Debate

A debate to be held at a student body assembly April 10 is among the plans which the Humboldt State branch of the United Federalists, formerly Student Federalists, has for the near future.

Principals in the debate will be three members of the World Federalist group and three members of the HSC student body who oppose the ideas of federal world government which is advocated by UWF.

The group changed its name recently when all the principle world government groups, including Student Governments, merged into a single organization.

Last meeting of the Humboldt UWF was held last Sunday at the home of Anne Murphy.

Dr. Hyman Palais, professor of history and sociology, will be the featured speaker on the "Humboldt Reports" broadcast this Friday evening at 6:15. Dr. Palais will speak on the ways through which world peace can be preserved through a type of federal world government.

Annual Student Show Back After Three Year Absence

Opening tomorrow night in the College auditorium for the first of three appearances will be the 1947 version of the Humboldt State College Hilarities, "Life Comes to Humboldt." All three shows, Thursday, Friday, and Saturday nights, will start promptly at 8:15. All seats are reserved.

The show, which is written, directed, produced, and acted by Humboldt students, returns to the Humboldt stage this year following an absence of three years. Some 240 students are included in the acting and production staffs of the show.

This spring's Hilarities is based what a group of reporters and photographers from Life magazine see and hear when they arrive at Humboldt after wandering through

the wilds of Humboldt county for six days. Upon arriving at Humboldt, they are met by the natives who initiate them in the exotic pageants customs, and ideas peculiar to Humboldt State.

Among the acts which will be featured parts of the program are the Pajamarino act which opens the show, an interview with an ex-GI now attending Humboldt, an epic drama "Raunchy City", based on the current Broadway hit of the same title, a Dance act, a brief look into a Beer Hall and a Geisha House where the occupational forces are discovered, a Ski Lodge featuring the A Cappella choir, a serious study of juvenile delinquency, a Radio act, and a Life Goes to a Party scene featuring the grand finale.

Griffith Named New Dean of Men

Harry Griffith, present director of teacher training at the College Elementary school, will become Dean of Men effective July 1, it was announced last week by President Arthur S. Gist.

Griffith will replace Jay Holliday who has been serving as Dean of Men since George Murphy left at the close of the fall semester to teach in an eastern university. Holliday will become the head of a new department which is soon to be formed here, and which will be known as the Testing Bureau.

The appointment of Griffith to his new position will become effective July 1, Gist said. Griffith taught for several years in southern California schools before coming to Humboldt several years ago. In 1941 he coached the Humboldt basketball team which won the Far Western Conference championship in its first year in the conference. He served in the Army during the war, and became director of the normal schools and teacher training in Japan. He returned to Humboldt last fall.

The Testing Bureau, under Holliday's direction will have charge of most of the testing carried on at HSC aside from that given by instructors in classes, the announcement stated. Vocational, aptitude, and some academic achievement tests will be given. Holliday is an expert in this field.

VETERAN'S CORNER

Of interest to all Humboldt State College veteran students is Senate Bill 326, now in the Committee on Labor and Public Welfare, which calls for a raise in the subsistence allowance of student veterans of from \$65 to \$100 for veterans without dependants. The bill, introduced by Senator Claude Pepper, prominent Florida legislator, also would raise the job training ceiling to \$350 without dependants, to \$375 with one dependent, and to \$400 with two or more dependants.

In regard to terminal leave bonds which were issued to many veterans upon discharge from the armed forces, Senator Maybank introduced a bill into the upper house providing for the redemption of terminal leave bonds by the use of any surplus of Federal receipts over Federal expenditures. This bill is still residing in the Committee on Finance.

The Veterans Administration has ruled that women veterans with children may receive \$90 a month subsistence allowance while attending school even though they are recognized as dependents of husbands also attending school under the G.I. Bill.

The decision was based on a case involving a husband and wife, both veterans, with one child. It stated that the maximum of \$90 per month subsistence allowance would be paid only if the woman's outside income from productive work did not exceed \$110 per month.

The woman claimed the child as her dependent for the purpose of the subsistence even though her husband was in training under the same law and was receiving a subsistence allowance of \$90 a month because he had a dependent, the wife.

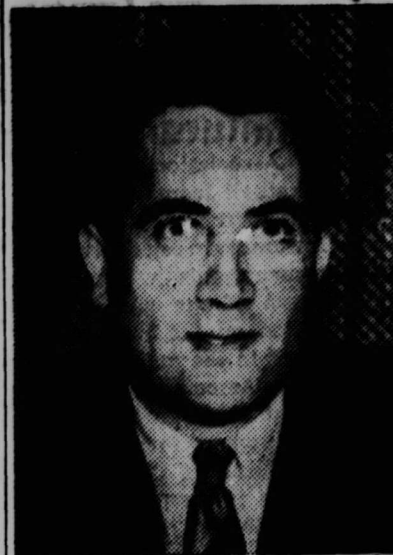
