## Deadline Set For Student Body Nominations

Any student interested in running for a student body office must have his petition turned in to the student council not later than May 21, according to the requirements of the student body constitution.

Following is the statement from the student body by-laws on elections:

### SECTION 1. ELECTIONS

1. The officers of the association shall be elected by secret ballot.

2. Voting shall be open from 8:00 a. m. to 4:00 p. m. There must be two inspectors at the polls at all times. The voters shall be counted by the executive council and the results shall be posted the next day.

3. The nomination of officers shall be by signed petition of twenty-five (25) members of the associated students. Petitions for nomination shall be filed with the executive council not less than one week nor more than three weeks prior to the primary elections, during which time a notice to the effect that nominations are in order shall be posted on the bulletin board and printed in the LUMBERJACK. Such notice shall include a copy of this section, a list of the officers to be nominated, and the date of the primary election.

4. There shall be two elections, primary and final. The primary election shall be held at least one week before the last meeting of the associated students in the school year.

5. The final election shall be held three school days after the primary election. Candidates who receive the majority of the total votes cast at the primary election shall be declared elected. Whenever a final election shall be necessary to choose the president, vice-president, secretary, or treasurer, the ballot for each election shall contain the names of the two candidates receiving the highest number of votes for the office to be filled. Whenever a final election shall be necessary to choose members of the board of control, the ballot shall contain one more candidate than the number of such members, either men or women, necessary to fill the office. The candidates for such election shall be those receiving the highest vote at the primary. The candidate receiving the lowest vote at the final election shall be elected.

Since elections are scheduled for May 28, the next issue of the Lumberjack will be devoted to local politicians, their platforms and campaign remarks.

## Lumberjacks Battle Chico Here Friday and Saturday

Coach Larry Pape's Humboldt State Lumberjacks, winners of both ends of a two-game series last week against Southern Oregon college, will attempt to run their streak to four straight this Friday and Saturday when they clash with the tough Chico State Wildcats. Friday's game is scheduled for 8 p. m. in the Arcata ball park, with the concluding contest scheduled to get under way at 2 o'clock Saturday afternoon.

Chico Coach Roy Bohler, well known in these parts, having coached Humboldt last year, is bringing a strong team here for the two-game series. The Wildcats defeated Southern Oregon twice, as did Humboldt, and last week took both ends of a twin bill from the Cal Aggie nine, which defeated Humboldt twice earlier in the campaign.

Red Hunt, husky righthander who in recent games has been showing everything which was expected of him early in the season, is slated to get the pitching assignment in the opener. In his last two mound appearances, Hunt has given up only 11 base hits and six runs. He beat Southern Oregon on four hits in the series' opener last week.

Either Don Carlson or Laurald Stebbins will go against the Chicanos Saturday.

The rest of the lineup is expected to remain the same as it has since early season with Jim Dickinson at second, John MacDonald at first, Ed Oliveira at short, Mike Whalen in center field, Phil Young catching, Bill Bailey in right, Bob Bell in left, and George Renworth at third.

Both games will be counted in the Far Western conference standings.

## Enrollment Jump Seen Next Fall

If adequate housing facilities can be provided, there is every indication that enrollment at Humboldt State will increase another fifty percent with the opening of the fall semester. This estimate was arrived at through a study of current enrollment applications.

The College Administrative council, meeting to discuss the housing problem, decided to give the green light to the development of more housing on or near the campus, rather than try to increase the burden on the existing facilities, which are already over-taxed.

Nelson Hall was not designed to accommodate more than two persons in one room, and it is hoped that by September enough housing will be available to relieve the present conditions. The policy of keeping the dorms closed to Eureka and Arcata students will be continued.

In conjunction with the housing announcement, the Registrar's office announced that if currently enrolled students do not, indicate within the next few days their plans on returning next year, they will have to take their chances on admission along with all new students. In other words, get off the dime in returning to the Registrar's office the blanks recently distributed in student boxes.

## NIGHT FOOTBALL

The matter of lights for night football will be brought before the student body again at the next student-body meeting. Because it goes without saying that each student wants to vote intelligently, this column will attempt to state the facts in the case as nearly as facts are obtainable.

The proposition came up for the first time at the last student body meeting, April 24. The resolution presented asked that a plan be adopted whereby Humboldt could have night football next year. It was pointed out that nothing was definite as to when night football could be played if we wait for the state to install the lighting system. There is nothing in the budget now providing for such a project next year and thus it seems certain in that night ball will not be possible for at least two more seasons. Therefore, if we are to have night ball, the student body will have to shoulder the financial responsibility. To bring in the necessary money to finance the lights, the proposition proposed that the student body vote a one dollar increase in its semester student body fees, the additional revenue to be used exclusively for the retirement of the indebtedness which the student body would incur if the lights were installed this summer. This added dollar in student body dues was to be lifted automatically the semester following the final payment on the debt. In addition to the dollar per person to be raised in this method, the athletic department indicated a willingness to charge its budget one thousand dollars per year, to be

obtained from additional income resulting from night ball.

## OLD PROBLEM HERE

This lighting problem is no new problem at Humboldt. Before the war, Harry Griffith, then Director of Athletics, worked out a plan for lighting which was to cost an estimated \$3,500.00. Several things prevented this plan from succeeding, chief among them being that there was not any field to light. Now there is, but unfortunately the cost of lighting has more than doubled.

Two companies, Westinghouse and General Electric, working with Flash Electric of Eureka, have within the past six weeks given lighting estimates. Their estimates vary from \$7,000 to \$12,000, depending upon the type and number of poles, and lights. If this job were to be done by separate contract jobs with our own labor another \$2000 could no doubt be saved. Actual plans exist on blue prints for lighting.

The capital investment must come from borrowed money, if the above plan is to be carried out. Several sources exist for this money. Several men of Eureka and Arcata have agreed to attempt to raise the necessary money if a reliable repayment scheme can be arrived at. Another possible source is the Humboldt State College Improvement Association, the organization that operates Nelson Hall. In no event will interest be over 4 percent, and in all probability less. No complete figures can be presented until student managers are given the go ahead signal to get them.

asked about this matter, and here are the best answers we have been able to uncover:

If the student body invests this money now, is it likely the state will repay the money later? The answer is probably not. It is practically impossible to get money out of the state without a purchasing order prior to the investment. It has been done in some cases, however.

If the student body makes this investment, will the state recognize the property as belonging to the student body? No. It is of the nature of permanent equipment and along with all other improvements belongs to the state. However, the point is not of too great significance, since it is highly unlikely that the student body would ever have any reason for desiring to dig up its poles, and wiring and to take down the lights, since they do not represent much of a useful item unassembled.

To offset the investment of student body money, President Gist stands ready to assure the students in assembly that he will bend every effort to gain other monetary advantages in return for the one the students will have given the college. Examples of such advantages accruing to the student body are: the bleachers on the east side of the field, the lumber for which was obtained outside of the school budget, the football field loud speaker, and the extra room in the co-op, built last summer, plus another one which is to be prepared for next fall.

These are a few of the questions arising over the football lighting problem. Before voting, decide how much the extra dollar levy will effect you, how it will effect the most of your associates, whether it will allow you to get more enjoyment out of your present investment and whether there is any other advantage or disadvantage in getting the lights now.

Southern Oregon went ahead with a three run rally in the fifth. In the seventh, Phil Young blasted a long double with men on to tie the score.

The Lumberjacks scored the winning marker in the eleventh when Jim Dickenson walked, John MacDonald bunted and the throw to first was wild, Dickenson advancing to third and MacDonald to second on the play. A moment later, Eddie Oliveira rapped an infield grounder and Dickenson beat the throw to the plate.

The ball game was featured by the outstanding play of third sacker George Renworth, who came up with three spectacular catches. Renworth handled 12 chances during the game. Hunt

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## Registrar Wants Students' Plans

In making plans for next semester, it is essential that the Registrar's office be informed of the plans of current students. Questionnaires were recently placed in student boxes, but only half the student body responded.

If you have not notified the Registrar concerning your academic plans for 1947-48 before June 9, no place will be reserved for you in next year's enrollment plans. After that date, present students will have to take their chances along with new applicants, Mrs. McKittrick said. Close to one hundred applications have already been filed for next semester, and this does not include applications from June graduates of Humboldt county high schools. This is greatly in excess of the number on file at this time last year.

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## Vote Details To Be Outlined

Details of a student body-wide written vote on a proposed amendment to the student body constitution will be outlined at the next student body meeting.

The petition for the amendment, bearing the proper number of student signatures, is now in the hands of the student council.

The proposed amendment is to Section 5, paragraph 1, of the by-laws. The present regulation reads: "All association revenues, whether from student fees or receipts from student activities, shall go to the treasury of the associated students."

Advocates of the proposed amendment propose to add the following sentence: "Money accruing to the student body from the receipts of athletic affairs will be administered directly by the controller of student affairs, subject to the approval of the director of athletics and the college administration."

Since it is definite that the student body will be called upon to vote on this issue, all students are asked to give the matter their best attention in order that they may vote intelligently.
