Dolf, Saunders, Mitchell And Abbott Head Cast

Maxwell Anderson's prize winning play, "Joan of Lorraine," was chosen by members of the Dramatic Workshop and then casted by Don Karshaer, Kate Buchanan, and Ted Delay late last week for presentation on Nov. 13, 17, 18, and 19th for the public and on Nov. 14th in conjunction with the Northwestern Dramatic Festival.

Although remembered mostly as a vehicle for Ingrid Bergman's debut on Broadway last year, "Joan" has proven all over the country that it can stand on its own two feet as an interesting play-within-a-play, even without the lovely Swede. It deserves mention along with Anderson's "What Price Glory?" and "Winter's Tale."

Barbara Dolf, known chiefly to Humboldt theatre audiences as the star of last fall's "Guest in the

House" and this spring's "Hilarities" has been casted along with Jane Saunders, a talented newcomer with traces of unusual talent, as Joan. The girls will probably alternate in the role during its run.

The role of stage director and male lead has also been assigned to two actors to play on alternate nights. Clifford Mitchell, Dr. Bradman of "Blithe Spirit," shares the billing of Jimmy Masters with Robert Abbott, known for his interpretation as "Coheny" in last year's reading of "Home of the Brave."

RECORD REVIEWS

CLASSICAL ALBUM

It is doubtful if Marc Blitzstein's Symphony, The Airborne, will ever join the ranks of great music but this should not discourage listening to this work because there are many commendable features that make it good entertainment.

The RCA Chorale under the baton of Robert Shaw, does some very fine singing especially in the movement dealing with the Tale of the Cities. The rhythmic combination between the chorus and orchestra in this section is effective in establishing the mood of the destruction of war from the air on these cities. Robert Shaw does an exceptional job of narration except that he tends to get over-dramatic at times. The performance of the New York City Symphony orchestra is adequately conducted by Leonard Bernstein.

The subject of the symphony deals with Man's conquest of the air—the role it can play in the world of the future—and the role that conquest played during the Second World War. The oftentimes trite text and Stravinskyish orchestration tend to weaken the coherence of this work and put it in a class of just acceptable entertainment.

POPULAR RECORD

For the record of the issue, my choice is Nellie Lutcher's "Hurry On Down."
 From comparative obscurity her startling recording of "Down" rose to become one of the three largest selling records in the country.

With a voice that has a dash of Ella Logan, a pinch of Cass Daley, (ouch), a smattering of Arkansas hill music, and backed up by a driving boogie piano, played by Miss Lutcher herself, we find a refreshing new personality in our midst. Nell wrote tune also, but I wonder if she didn't get the light from an old, old Ada Jones—Walter Van Brunt Columbia spinner; "All Alone?"

Upon listening to the two, I found the words to be quite similar. Nellie's piece goes something like this; "Hurry On Down to My House Baby, Ain't Nobody Here But Me."

While very much like it Ada's goes; "Hurry up and get here honey, for I'm All Alone, All Alone, There's Nobody Here But Me."

I don't know, could be. At any rate, the music is different, and I can assure you that Nat "King" Cole's fave chanter has it hands down, any way you look at it, or listen to it.

B-side finds another delicious goodie; "The Lady's In Love With You." Record holds a lot of promise to a new member of the "Ivory Tower League." that's 30

Because a record number of veterans have enrolled in colleges and universities this semester, the Veterans Administration warns veteran students not to expect their first subsistence checks until early in November, and advises them to plan on meeting personal financial obligations for at least the first six weeks of the fall term.

This delay in the mailing of subsistence checks involves two factors. First, a veteran usually is not entitled to subsistence allowance until after 30 days training have been completed. Secondly, all checks are normally mailed on the first of the month, covering the

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Oregon College Invades Lumberjacks Saturday

Coach William "Bill" McArthur and his Crimson and Gray Wolves will be number two on Humboldt's schedule, Saturday night at Redwood bowl. With both teams having a game under their belt, and their mistakes ironed out, the contest will be one of those "Must See" affairs.

The Lumberjacks have the advantage of weight and experienced lettermen over the Oregon Squad. Oregon was defeated last Friday by Linfield College 33-0. Since that defeat they have been bolstered by Jack Saling who played quarterback for HSC last year and Ray Gaines 240 pound tackle from Long Beach City College.
