Rally Committee Prepares For Successful Trip

The school is buzzing—everybody is talking about it. "Are you going to Klamath Falls with the team? Good—we'll have a swell time." For those who haven't made up their minds is a great big—"WHY NOT?"

The Rally Committee has plans galore. Under the direction of Des Shanahan and Jim Morrow they have been working overtime on the CARAVAN to Klamath Falls. The real reason for the trip is to give the football team all the support necessary to pull through with another win. But the entertainment angle hasn't been neglected. The proposed agenda includes the combined efforts of both the Humboldt and Southern Oregon Rally Committees. For those who haven't gotten in on all the "scuttlebutt," here is a sketch of some of the tentative plans.

The biggest question, naturally, is transportation. Greyhound buses have been arranged for to carry the bulk of the rooters. Through the efforts of Larry Dake, President of the Rally Committee, Des Shanahan, co-chairman of the CARAVAN, Jimmy Morrow, Yell King and co-chairman, the regular price of \$8.91 has been cut down to \$6.25 for the round trip which is a saving of \$2.66 (Mr. Jackson please notice). The Greyhound Company will supply as many buses as needed. The pay load for each bus is thirty seven people so lets see how many we can fill. Reservations should be in early in order to be sure to have enough buses.

The California Highway Patrol can not provide accommodations for a caravan of individual cars for the trip, but that doesn't mean you can't take your own car. Anyone planning on doing so, may get all the necessary decorations by contacting the Rally Committee.

The proposed schedule (which is subject to change at a moments notice, so keep posted) starts at the college Friday morning. Dean Griffith, when last contacted, thinks it will be possible for students to be excused from Friday classes to make the trip. The CARAVAN will leave soon enough to arrive at Klamath Falls in plenty of time for the game at eight o'clock. Jimmy Morrow proposes two stops—one for free beer at Crescent City, and the second for free air at Medford. (It's his idea, hold him to it.)

Arrangements are being made with Southern Oregon for Humboldt State Student Body tickets to be honored at the game. The buses will remain overnight and return Saturday.

The game itself is the highlight of the evening, but not the climax. Even with just Humboldt's plans, it wouldn't be dull afterwards. The Southern Oregon Rally Committee is also planning ways and means of celebrating.

In case anyone is wondering whether Humboldt's CARAVANS are "pink-tea socials", ask the veterans of the Chico CARAVAN of last year. The only reason they have stopped talking about that one is that they are all too busy making plans for this one. This will be the only chance for a CARAVAN this year as the only other out-of-town game is with Pepperdine in Los Angeles. That is just a little too far to go.

The CARAVAN Committee can guarantee you a good time.—The team needs your support.—What are you waiting for?—Get your reservations now.—Don't wait until the last minute.—Watch the bulletin board for final arrangements.—See you Friday morning!

"We are such a long way from peace. It is not 'military' conscription we need but 'perspective' conscription. Give each person about two years travel around the globe with a little job of goodwill to do in each spot. How many friends he could make, how many spheres of life he might find outside his own teacup, how much thought and understanding he might bring home with him. And when he walks to the polls or sits down to the peace table, he would not think of only his wants but of the necessities of his world and all those whom he would know share it with him.

"I am speaking of all people, not just the Americans."

"I hear you say—there's Neska, dreaming again, not remembering all those who have learned the globe by encircling it a few thousand times already. But can you think 'peace and goodwill' when your dollars go over the hill and your buddies under it? You know you cannot. And it does no good now to try to justify the past. We read it in the paper; we talk about it at chow; we fight over it in Congress. But do we live it? Only so minutely.

"Let all schools emphasize training in unselfishness, kindheartedness, goodwill, generosity, guilelessness, humility, love, faith, hope, and then send them out with any academic training you choose, or just let them be wherever fortune puts them. It won't matter then. They would have problems, and they would know how to meet them. They would grow and grow and grow with that self-satisfied feeling that comes when you have done something and know you have done it well. That feeling is the only real peace in this world."

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HUMBOLDT SKINS WOLVES 27 to 7

Despite PG & E And Thick Fog

Fog rolled in over Redwood Bowl Saturday night just about the same time that the bruised and battered Oregon College Wolves from Monmouth rolled homeward licking their wounds and smarting from a 27 to 7 defeat administered to them by the powerful Lumberjacks from the little green college on the hill.

It was just too much power, speed and deception that spelled the downfall of the crimson and grey clad Oregonians and lifted the Humboldts to new football heights as they made their season record to date read: two wins, no losses.

Humboldt was the first to reach the promised land when early in

the first quarter McKown rifled a pass to right end Newman who finding himself surrounded by Oregon tacklers lateraled to Cavanaugh on the Oregon twenty-five yard line and the burly tackle sped down the sidelines behind excellent downfield blocking to tally touchdown number one standing up. Smith's kick was squarely between the uprights and the Staters led 7 to 0.

The game was then held up for several minutes while a temporary dim out of the lighting system due to a blown fuse was repaired. In the interim the Rally committee presented their halftime stunt much to the delight and amusement of the crowded stands.

In the second quarter the Lumberjacks were penalized fifteen yards for clipping back their own twenty-five. McKown punted to Van Loo, Oregon halfback, who

ran the ball back to the Humboldt twenty five yard line. An attempted Oregon pass into the flat was intercepted by Fred Iten who galloped seventy-five yards down the sidelines without a hand being laid on him. On the conversion attempt the pass from center was momentarily fumbled, then picked up and run over the goal line by Jack Smith and the Lumberjacks held a commanding 14 to 0 lead.

Late in the second quarter a series of running plays and laterals brought the green and gold boys down to the Oregon two yard line. "Tex" McKown passed to left end Grady Lawrence who jumped high into the air and took the ball out of the hands of two Oregon defenders for six more big points. Jack Smith booted the extra point and the half ended with Humboldt leading 21 to 0.

Oregon College struck back swiftly when halfback Lee took the opening kickoff of the second

Forbesmen Tackle Sons At Klamath Falls

The sons defeated Eastern Oregon College Sept. 27 in their one and only contest prior to this game. The Lumberjacks have taken their first two encounters in stride. Hordes of returning lettermen and veteran reserves undermine the power of both the Sons and the Staters.

Humboldt has a slight disadvantage for this game due to the loss of first string guard Wiley Cousins who suffers a broken collar bone and Sid "Quinn" Cohen, veteran tackle, who claims U. S. F. is printed on the cast of his broken hand. Coach Al Simpson, Humboldt grad, heads the S. O. machine and assures us that this is one time my Alma Mater receives no priority.

half on his own fifteen and sprinted the remaining eighty-five yards directly down the center of the field to pay dirt. The Wolves made their conversion good and the scoreboard read 21 to 7.

Early in the final period Humboldt worked their way down to the Oregon seven and on fourth down "Turkey" Thompson fired a pass to Lawrence in the end zone for the fourth Lumberjack T. D. of the evening. Cavanaugh's attempted conversion was low and the score favored the Humboldts 27 to 7.
