## New Rental Books Added

A number of new books have been added recently to the library's stock. They are available on the rental shelf.

"I Distinctly Remember", by Frederick Lewis Allen and Agnes Rogers, is a semi-historical book of the peace years from 1918 to Pearl Harbor. In 500 pictures and 35,000 words, it brings back the turbulent picture that made the headlines of yesteryear. It is very entertaining.

"Adversary in the House" is by Irving Stone, author of "Lust for Life", the biography of Van Gogh. In this book he has romanticized the life of Eugene V. Debs. Current reviews place it a little below good.

"Proud Destiny", by Lion Feuchtwanger, is a Literary Guild selection that has already been purchased for screen production. It is another of his fine historical novels, dealing with the French Revolution this time.

"The Bright Promise", by Richard Sherman, is a bitter-sweet novel dealing with the Roosevelt Era, 1933-1945. It is melodramatic, slick-friction, and good reading.

"Second Growth", by Wallace Stegner, is a novel set in New Hampshire, encompassing the conflict between the modern element and the old guard. The reviews are not good.

"Hill of the Hawk", by Scott O'Dell, is a historical novel of early California, at that period in the overthrow of the Spanish rule.

## College Chorus Accents Quality

This year the College Chorus has 70 voices instead of the expected 250, but will make up the deficiency of quantity with quality. This select group has been working on folk songs and standard choral music for the past two weeks. The product to date is a well balanced ensemble capable of producing some beautiful music.

Next week the chorus plans to start working on several numbers from Handel's "Messiah," "Oh Brother Man" by Kemmer, and other chorals and music to be used on their Christmas program.

### I SMELL SMOKE

## RECORD REVIEWS

### CLASSICAL ALBUM

One of the finest collections of recorded music that has been released in many years is Columbia's latest release of Handel's Twelve Concertos Grossi, played by the Busch Chamber Players and conducted by Adolf Busch. To my knowledge, this is the only recording of the complete works in one set.

Many ovations to the Busch players for their exceptional rendition of some of the greatest music ever written. This performance far surpasses their top rate reading of the six Brandenburg Concertos of Bach. The excellence of ensemble, brilliance, and interpretation is especially noteworthy.

Technically, this three volume, 25 record set, far surpasses most of Columbia's pre-war recordings. You may hear this work at one of the future listening hours . . . ro.

### POPULAR RECORD

Spinner of the week for my money is Frankie Laine's; "S'posin," flipover being; "You've Changed."

After having heard Mr. Laine down Frisco way summer last, I have become one of his most astute fans. His musical imagination and bright ideas keep your spirits up, and your worries down 'till the last note is uttered.

In S'posin, we find a goodie of an oldie. The peppy band maestroed by Carl Fischer seems to inspire him to greater heights.

Disc keeps moving all the way through, with vocal split at half-point for a Herby Haymer-ish sax cut, followed by more chanting. For the results, lend an ear to this fine, fine frankie. The opposite happens to every good vocalist at one time or another, and has in turn happened to the aforementioned. I'm afraid I'll have to shake my head horizontally to "You've Changed" . . . Lad Laine does what he can with this, but even that isn't enough.

## THE VETERAN

A new method of granting leave to veterans attending college under the G.I. Bill which will expedite payment of subsistence checks and eliminate much paper work for the colleges and Veterans Administration has been announced by the Veterans Administration.

Formerly leave with subsistence allowance was granted at the rate of two and a half days a month during the school, providing the veteran applied for it.

Under the new system veterans, upon enrolling for the school year at accredited colleges, will automatically be credited with 15 days leave and Veterans Administration will continue them on the subsistence rolls until 15 days after the end of the school year.

If the veteran desires to attend summer school, he will be continued on the subsistence rolls without a break, provided there are no more than 15 days between terms.

Veterans who do not want the automatic 15 days leave, which is charged against their entitlement, must notify the Veterans Administration at least 30 days before the end of the school year or other period of enrollment.

The new leave provisions will not apply to veterans interrupting their training before the end of the term. In such cases, subsistence payments will end on the date training was interrupted.

No leaves other than the automatic 15 day extension mentioned above will be granted veteran students with the exception

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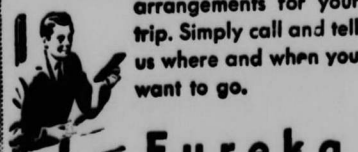

## Undefeated Chico State Is Next Humboldt Test

The Chico State Wildcats with two straight victories, Hamilton Field 46-0, and California Poly at San Dimes 19-0, will be guests of the Lumberjacks this Saturday night in a grueling Far Western Conference tussel.

Chico's backfield of Schwellenback, Novak, Goodridge and McDonald unchanged from last years, should be a ripe threat against Humboldts Thompson, Riddle, McKowan Inc.

The valleyemen have been the game of the year for the Humboldt County fans, 1947 marking the twentieth anniversary of the Humboldt-Chico rivalry. Last year the Forbesmen downed the Wildcats 6 to 2 in one of the tightest, ruffest games of the season.

## Sons Stop Lumberjacks 16 to 6 At Klamath Falls

Friday night at Klamath Falls, Oregon, the Lumberjacks handed their axe to the Sons of Southern Oregon and said, "Here. You use it." The Red Raiders, always an obliging bunch, did just that. And how they used it! They planted it squarely on the necks of the Humboldt Staters to the tune of 16 to 6.

True, the Oregons were helped along with their victorious march by a muddy field and a freezing cold night. Nevertheless, it was the unanimous opinion of all who witnessed the game that the superior team did win.

For the Lumberjacks it was their first defeat of the 1947 season, and incidently (or is it?) their first conference loss. Southern Oregon definitely showed that they were the team to beat in the Far Western Conference.

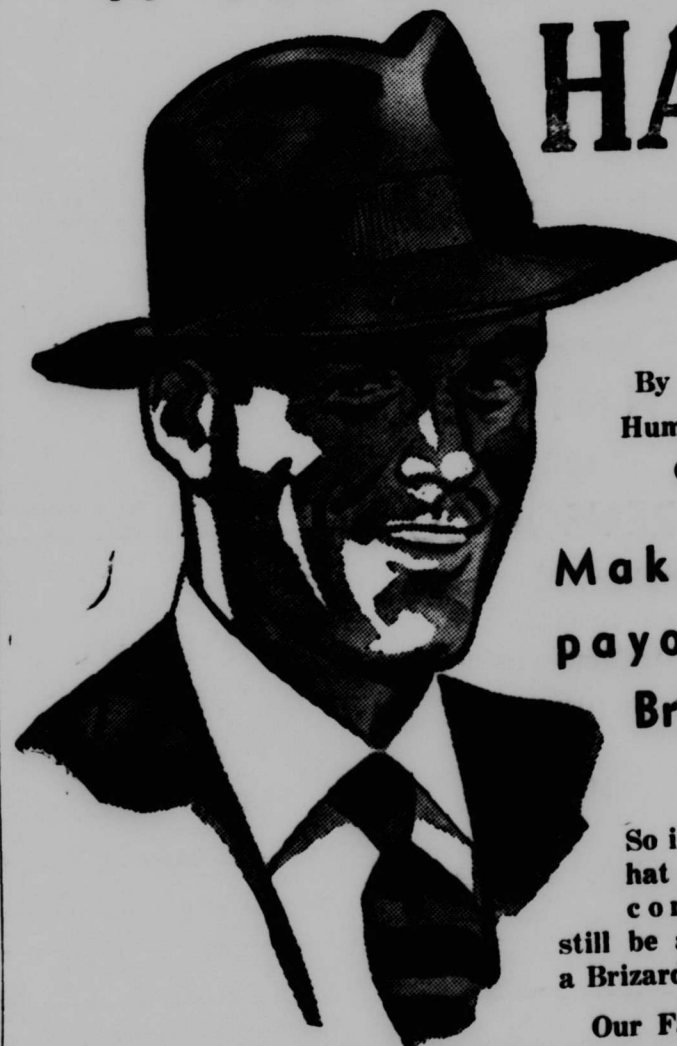
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
