one thing in common.

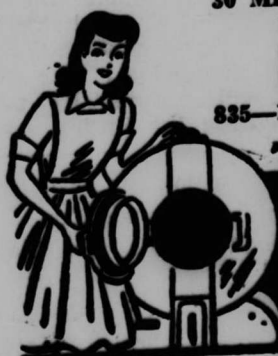
They are the Messrs Alward, Galloway, and Jackson. All three expect additions to their families within three months.

GUEST EDITORIAL

Jackie Anderson was an inevitable contributor to this column. Always to be found in the middle of a heated conversation, Jackie has been, among other things, a president of the Student Federalists.

After reading Neska Jeffers' letter in a recent issue, it occurred to me that you might be interested in a couple of letters I received from a French student, Georgette Bordel, of Lyon, France. We have been corresponding for some time and naturally, as a good Federalist as well as an "avid" French student, I have been telling her about the Federalist movement. I received this letter after I had told her briefly about World Government and the second after I had really expounded. These are exactly as written in her English. I have omitted the parts that were irrelevant to the subject.

"... I have also thinking to the World Government. It's a very good contract. I think it cannot be implanted in France now. For you, Americans, war is finished, and you think of peace, a true and lasting peace. But a world-peace too merriellous. He also, I wish for a complete union between nations. No cruel wars, no mourning, no atrocious misery. But for French people it is ridiculous to speak of "peace." They are waiting for new war between Russia and U.S.A.

"In political point of view, this next war is inevitable. Suppose all the nations agree to a Federal World Government. But who will be the head - Russia will wish to be, and impose their method to the world. But all the Nations do not agree this Russian method, and some prefer American system. From this, squabble must arise.

"But I am not very clever to explain this in English. Do you understand me? ... What do your other French correspondents think about Federal Students? Please, tell me about this organization—where is central office, who are chiefs, what town is center of each nation - I hope that the organization will can be in France in one year or two, and then, we shall have time to think of world peace. Now, each French is occupied with the reconstruction of his country, and he has much work to do! But the next year, all will be better, and I am such French will have a share in an universal brotherhood."

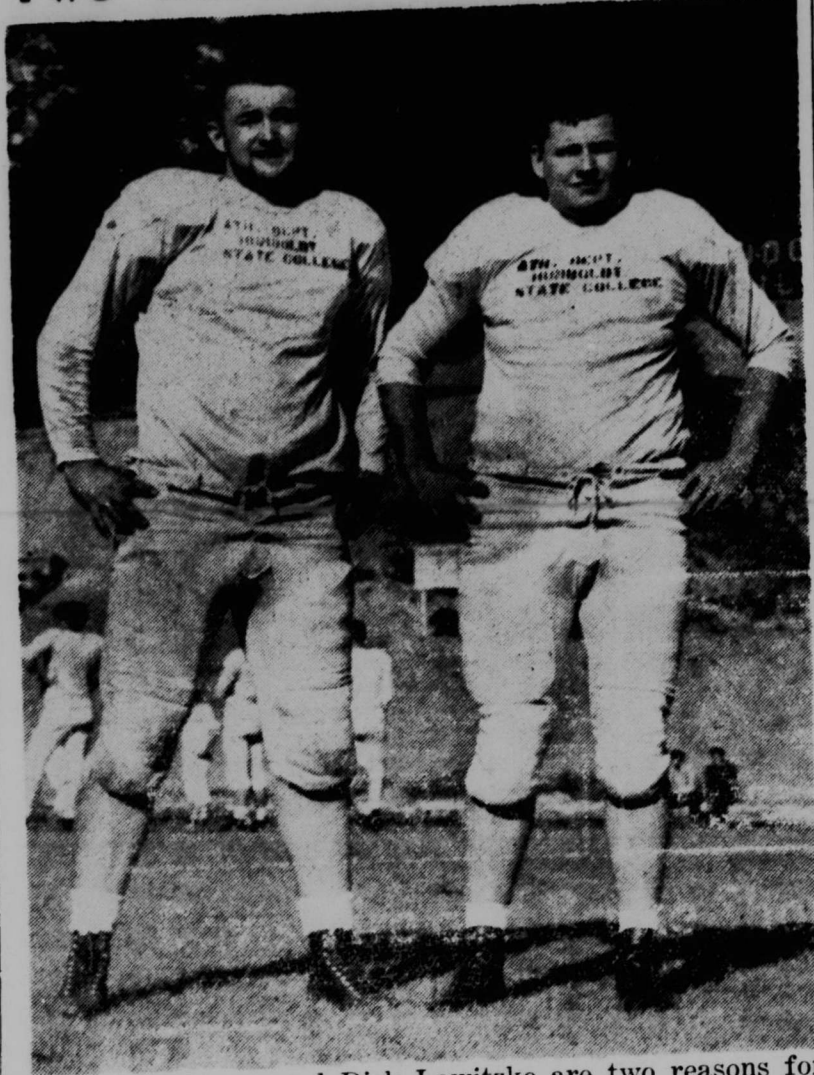

Record Crowd See HSC Defeat Chico Saturday

Still stinging from last week's conference loss, the Humboldt State Lumberjacks battered a bewildered Chico State team into submission by a score of 14 to 0 in a game played in the Redwood Bowl. Saturday night's win kept the Humboldters record of never having been defeated in the Bowl thus far this season intact, and also kept their chances of winning the Far Western Conference title very much alive.

Humboldt started things rolling when midway in the second quarter Thompson took Spear's punt and carried it back to the Humboldt 45 yard line. Chico was penalized five yards for being offside to the fifty yard line. Chico was again penalized for offside to their own forty five yard line. The Lumberjacks picked up five through the line to the Chico forty. On a naked reverse, Holden took the ball around his own right end and aided by beautiful blocking dodged and sped his way over for a touchdown. McKown's conversion was squarely between the uprights and the green and gold led 7 to 0.

In the third quarter the Lumberjacks worked the ball down to the Chico one yard line and then lost the ball on downs. The rest of the period was spent deep in Chico territory thanks to some very timely and well executed quick kicks by Tex McKown, with neither team doing much yard gaining.

Early in the final quarter McKown kicked to the Chico thirty

seven yard line. Viracola, Lumberjack tackle, intercepted Novak's pass and was tackled on the Chico thirty nine. McKown passed to quarterback Mark Melendy who carried the ball down to the Wildcat twenty one. McKown came out wide around his own right end and covered the remaining twenty one yards to the goal line to put the Lumberjacks into a 13 to 0 lead. "Tex" booted his second perfect conversion of the evening and the the Humboldters had 14 big points to their opponents 0.

Chico State muffed their only scoring opportunity when early in the second half they worked the ball down to the Humboldt eleven yard line on a series of pass plays. Novak, Chico fullback, plunged through center to the Lumberjack five where the green and gold stiffened to hold the Wildcats at bay and took over on downs on their own nine yard line.

All the Lumberjacks played heads up and deserve a lot of credit for the win. Particularly outstanding was the great defensive work of tackle, Tom Viracola; center, Dick Lawitzke, and of course, Captain Gordon Schroeder who just doesn't play a bad game. Offensive stars for the evening were Iten, Riddle, McKown, Thompson and Holden.
