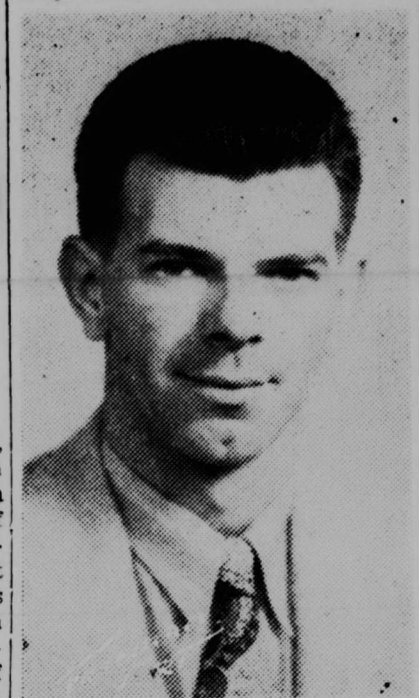

With sparkplug Jim "Rocket" Riddle flashing the go sign, the Humboldt State grid machine roared into high gear and ran over a poor defenseless gridiron pedestrian by the name of San Francisco State by a 19 to 0 score last Saturday night in the Redwood Bowl. Had the hairless Redwood Bowl turf been a just bit kinder to the frantic clutching of the Lumberjack speed merchant's cleats,



the score might well have been much higher in favor of the hard playing Humboldters.

The green and gold got their first score of the evening in the second quarter when "Tex" McKown passed to Ad Holden who was downed on the 50 yard line. Before the Gators had time to recover their lost wits, little Mark Melendy who played a superb game, intercepted Bole's pass and ran it all the way back to the S. F. State 5 yard line. Melendy then carried it to the three and everybody shook hands with his mother for having a son. Somebody lit Riddle's fuse and the "Rocket" whizzed through the center and before he had stopped sizzling McKown's attempted conversion was blocked and the Lumberjacks held a joyous 13 point lead.

In the third quarter, Viracola

intercepted a Gator pass and carried it back to the S. F. 48 yard line. Humboldt was penalized back to their own 37 and then the little men in the striped suits who were flashing handkerchiefs and blowing horns like drunks at a New Year's Eve party, penalized the Gators five. Iten careened around end for seven, Riddle whizzed for eleven more, Thompson went to the 34, "Tex" got in the act and went to the 23. Riddle (sound familiar?), attempted to pass, was trapped and ran to the S.F. 11. San Francisco was then penalized to their own one for unnecessary roughness, and on the next play the man whose last name presents a problem, dived over the goal line for another touchdown. McKown's conversion was no good and the 19-0 victory was wrapped up and delivered to the student body of Humboldt State for safe keeping until next year.

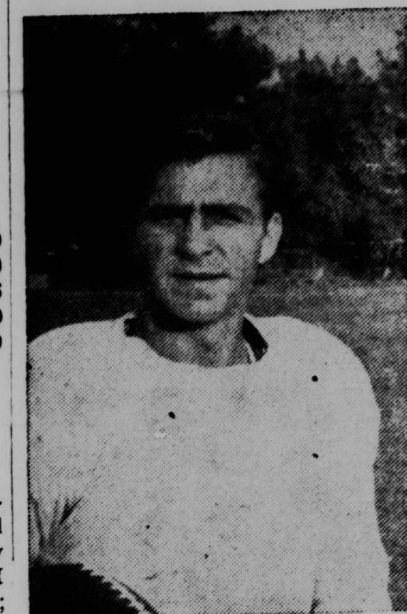
