### Levi Scores At HSC Recital

Nanette Levi, who at the age of fourteen appeared with the San Francisco Symphony, proved last Tuesday evening at the first Mu Epsilon Recital, that all her advanced publicity wasn't just that.

Miss Levi, a young artist of twenty-one, displayed a mature understanding of the music and a tremendous technique. The unaccompanied Sonata in A minor of Bach was well executed and showed a real understanding of interpretation, especially so because it was perhaps the most difficult number on her program.

Nanette is also an excellent interpreter of the modern composers. Her readings of Prokofiev's Sonata in D major and Bertok's dances found her completely at ease and doing her best work.

It was only in the Brahms Sonata that she was beyond her depth. This might be due to her unfamiliarity with the styles of the Romantic composers.

In closing I would like to remark on the audience's fine reception of this young artist, their preference for the second and lighter half of the program, and the fact that Miss Levi is a violinist that bears watching because she has the potentialities of a top rate musician.

## 704 Students Registered For Present Semester

Mrs. Myrtle McKittrick, Registrar, reported today that Humboldt State College has broken all previous enrollment records this fall.

To counteract the veteran influence a large number of high school graduates have invaded HSC from the secondary schools of the county.

Despite this large number of students, registration proceeded smoothly, largely due to the innovation of Pre-Registration. This

took place a day before regular registration and enabled everyone to work out this semester's programs with their advisors without the turmoil of regular Registration Day.

A Vocational Preference Test was used for the first time in addition to the traditional English A and College Aptitude Tests. This test reveals to the student and his advisor what he enjoys and dislikes making the goal of the student easier to find.

### Festival Heads Drama Program

Chico State College will present a 3-act comedy in the Northwestern California Dramatic Festival to be held at Humboldt State College on November 14th and 15th. Humboldt State will present a 3-act play, and others participating in the 2-day event will be the Arcata Community Players and high schools of Eureka, Arcata, Fortuna, Ferndale, Del Norte and South Fork presenting one act plays.

The fall 3-act play and the Hilarities of 1948 are other main events on the dramatic department's calendar.

Organizational work on the Hilarities will start in October. Opportunities in this year's all-student show will exceed last year's cast and staff of 243 participants.

A series of one act plays will offer many opportunities for acting and production classes during the spring semester.

## RADIO RAMBLINGS

This column is intended to bring to you a spattering of radio happening both here at Humboldt as well as a review of some of the programs on our local stations and the "big-uns." If at any time you the reader disagree with me or feel it important to give a bit of the latest dope which I happen to miss, please feel free (no charge) to leave a note in box 115. Now for a little of the latest.

If you happen to stroll near the north side of the main building (don't ask me what you would be doing there) you will see a long low building similar to the rest of the emergency huts on the campus. That little gem constitutes a dream come true for Ted DeLay and his Radio-Speech kids. Construction was begun on this building to house the studio facilities for the college radio activities. Just like KPO, we have call letters, only our handle is KHSC. HSC stands for "you-know-what," but KPO doesn't mean "San Francisco." Yes, we're getting right up in the world. Stations very similar to ours are springing up in colleges all over the country and all are members of the Inter-Collegiate Broadcasting System.

The interior of the station will contain a reception room, two small studios, one large studio and a central control room. These studios will be very much like those found in any average sized radio station and will be equipped with the finest electronic broadcasting equipment. You may have heard or read about the recent developments in the radio engineering field known as the Brush "Sound-Mirror" tape recorder. With the aid of this recorder a

full hour show may be transcribed and be rebroadcast at any later date. It isn't the same as the regular flat records the average person is used to seeing and which involves the use of a paper tape, which may be erased and used again and again. Pretty smooth, huh? Mr. Ted DeLay, head of the Radio-Speech Department, has this to say, "KHSC will be the headquarters for both the radio classes and the radio activities of the college. Upon completion of the studios all of the classes will move to Studio A and all broadcasts from the college over KIEM and KHUM will originate from these studios. Special broadcasts will be made to the student body from HSC in a manner similar to that used by the Armed Forces Radio Service during the war throughout the entire world." I might add that the title Armed Forces Radio Service doesn't mean much to the average wartime civilian, but to those who were in the service it carries a great deal of weight. Ted goes on to say, "These AFRS type broadcasts will not be the activity of any class all interested students are invited to participate. Regular broadcasts over KIEM and KHUM will be produced by the Radio Workshop."

Our far school is fast gaining a name for itself in the field of speech and dramatics. Radio is one of the main parts of that field, and a person can get a degree in Radio-Speech, something that is impossible in many other schools of greater size. No definite plans have been made yet for programs to be aired by the college. However, "The Lone Scout," by Jerry Coeur on KIEM, and "Science News of the Week," by Hank Frank on KHUM have been on the air all summer and will continue.

Plans are being made to include such naturals as "platter-spinners," both popular and classical. Some people like to know what the rest of the world is doing, or what the price of eggs are in the Siberian salt mines. This semester brings ever-growing housing problems for all students. Nelson Hall has been completely turned over to the women.
