## Conservation Unlimited Plant Multiflora Roses

Conservation Unlimited club members are enthusiastic about the progress of their Multiflora Rose plantings are making. Plantings were made at the pheasant pens behind Nelson hall last January, and are coming along very nicely.

The Northern Humboldt Fish & Game Club of Arcata donated sufficient funds for the club to purchase one thousand seedlings, from one to three years old. Several experimental plantings have been made in the area in different types of soil and growth records are being kept. There have been two plantings made on Dr. Lanphere's property at Samoa, one in sandy soil and one in bottom loam.

## Wildlife Club Plan Nursery

The Conservation Unlimited Club plans to start a nursery from the multiflora rose seedlings obtained from the plantings made recently in the community. The plants from the nursery will be sold locally and the proceeds will be used for planting equipment and general county improvement of wildlife habitat. It is hoped that ten years time will see multiflora rose fences blooming around the county in place of the present day strands of barbed wire.

Bishop, who will also serve on a panel of Men's Athletic Problems, will speak on the subject, "A Survey of Physical Education Training in California Colleges," on Monday morning.

Jack Newman, who will attend the conference as a student representative of the Humboldt State college physical education department, is scheduled to speak on "Job Opportunities in Rural Schools." Jake will deliver his talk on the 10th.

The theme of the conference is "Gateway to Golden Opportunities in '49." Conference headquarters will be at the Whitcomb Hotel in San Francisco.

Both Bishop and Newman expect to leave Friday afternoon, April 9.

## Info For Veterans On Withdrawal

If you find it necessary to withdraw from College, the importance of making an official withdrawal cannot be over-emphasized.

A Student who drops from school without taking the proper steps receives all "F" grades.

If this record is sent to the Veterans Administration, all further educational benefits under the G. I. Bill are jeopardized. The same thing applies to students under any state or federal assistance program.

To withdraw officially, call at the office of the Registrar or report in writing if you find it impossible to call in person.

Any veteran who withdraws before the end of the semester must either pay for his books and supplies or turn them in to be re-sold. Any sum realized from such resale is reported to the Veterans Administration and credited to his account.

No veteran can afford to jeopardize his status with the VA by failing to take care of his obligations, in case any indebtedness is incurred, through withdrawal or otherwise.

## Business Ed. Expanded

Humboldt State college is offering a new credential in business education as part of the general secondary degree. On receiving this credential, the state qualifies one in four sub-fields: secretarial, accounting, merchandising, and general business.

The recent addition of professor William Himstreet to the college faculty has made this new credential possible. Due to the fact that demand far exceeds supply for good business teachers, particularly men, the job opportunities in this field are wide open.

## April 8 To Be "Blue" Friday

Every year about this time we notice little colorful notes in most of our boxes — yep, it's cinch notice season again.

Cinch notices are issued at the end of the ninth week of each semester — that will be Friday, the 8th of April.

After notices have been issued the responsibility is entirely upon the students to get in and act. All studnets who receive cinch notices are given the opportunity to see their instructors and advisor to clear up their difficulty.

A research was made on the notices issued for the fall semester of 1947. The results were as follows: Of a total of 376 cinch notices there were 28 per cent failures, 16 per cent withdrawals, or incomplete, 26 per cent with a grade of D, and 30 per cent with a grade of C or better. The registrar's office reveals that the chief cause of these is excessive absence.

## Awards Offered In Field Of Art

A recent announcement was made to the effect that three awards are being offered for the field of Art for the year of 1949. The first award carrying a stipend of \$1,000, the second \$650, and the third award is \$350. They are made available annually under the terms of a bequest to bring about a further development of native talent in California in the fields of literature and art.

This year only painting will be offered, but the competition is open to all types of painting.

Applicants for the award, both men and women, must be native born citizens of California, and must be between the ages of 20 and 40.

Applications, and more detailed information, may be obtained from the office of James D. Phelan Award in Literature and Art, 820 Phelan building, San Francisco, 2. In addition, applicants are required to present two specimens of their handiwork.

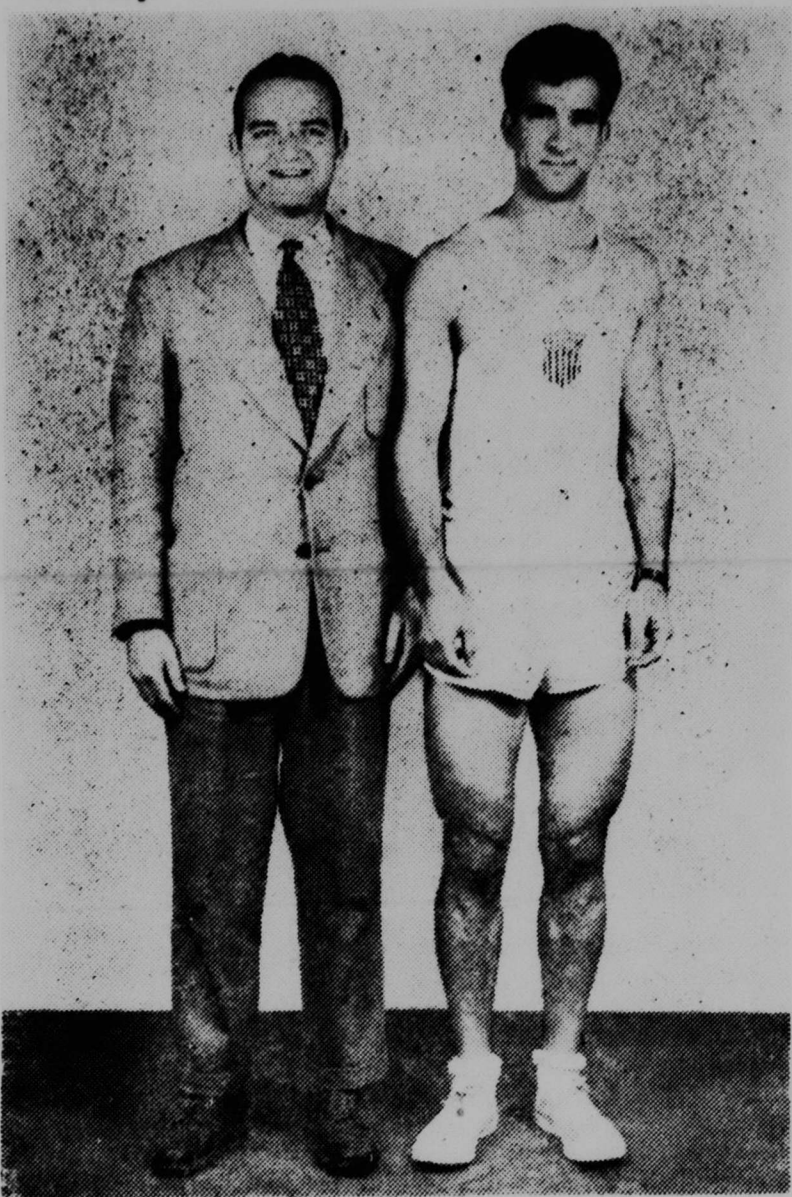
Round one must be completed by April 6th, round two by April 8th, and rounds three and four by April 22, or the players must forfeit.

## Jesse Van Zant Wins Petaluma Race; To Enter Boston Race

Jesse Van Zant, marathon runner from Korb, ran 26 miles, 385 yards in two hours and 58 minutes to win the fifteenth annual Petaluma Spartans Marathon which was held at Petaluma Sunday, April 3.

Van Zant is coached by Tom Laughran, a student taking graduate work at HSC and a star of field and track man himself. Tom ran in the final Olympic tryouts, at Boston, in 1948, and placed thirteenth in a field of 42 internationally known track stars.

Van Zant, under Tom's watchful coaching, trained for the Petaluma race by running on the old Arcata road between Eureka and Arcata.

The marathon was run under the scorching sun of 90 degrees with Van Zant finishing nine minutes before the finishing line was crossed again.

The star has entered the 53rd annual Boston marathon which is

Led by the hitting of Cliff Prelow, George Renworth, and Kenny Dunaway, and the pitching of the entire mound staff, the Humboldt State Lumberjacks defeated the Crescent City Merchants 6 to 5 in the latter's home park last Sunday afternoon. The game was a nip and tuck affair throughout the nine innings with the lead changing hands five times before the Tsoutsouvas coached men emerged the victors.

Humboldt started the scoring in the first inning when Prelow got on first base on an error, stole second, and advanced to third on an infield out. Then with the squeeze play on, Renworth laid down a perfect bunt scoring Prelow. The Merchants came back in the fourth inning to score a pair of runs and go into the lead 2 to 1.

The Lumberjacks went back into the lead after two men were out in the big seventh inning. Dave Dana started the fireworks with a single to center field and was advanced to second on a sacrifice by Jere Shumin, and Prelow was purposely passed. Then with two strikes on him, Dunaway hit a Texas leaguer to right field scoring Dana and advancing Prelow to third base, Dunaway going down to second on the throw to the plate. Then up strode the mighty Renworth, and he promptly lined a single through the box scoring both Prelow and Dunaway and making the score 4 to 2 favoring the collegians. Crescent City scored one run in their half of the seventh, and two more in the eighth inning to make the score Crescent City 5, Humboldt State 4 going into the ninth inning.

Leading off the top of the ninth for the jacks was Shumin, who lined a single into center field. He was followed by Prelow, who was a thorn in the Merchants side all afternoon, and Cliff hit the first pitched ball over the center fielder's head, scoring Shumin, and then scoring himself on a Crescent City overthrow to third base. Big Don Carlson then put the Merchants down in order in the last half of the ninth making the final score Humboldt State 6, Crescent City 5.

Evan Reilly pitched the first four innings for Humboldt, and was in great form. He was followed by Ted Anvick, Del Goble, Red Hunt, and Don Carlson with Hunt getting credit for the win.

## "Popera" Result Of Cooperation

Friday night at 8:15 in the Eureka Municipal Auditorium the curtain will rise on the First Annual "Popera", presented through the cooperation of the Humboldt State Music Department and the Musician's Union, Local 333. Leland Barlow, Charles Fulkerson, and Woodrow Thompson, President of the Musician's Union, have joined hands to present the surrounding communities with an evening of music, laughter, and dancing. "Uncle" Dave Hilderbran will be Master of Ceremonies for the evening's entertainment.

This extravaganza is a benefit concert and dance given by the Music Department and Local 333 in order to raise money to continue and expand the cultural contributions of the college music department. Funds raised through this performance will not only continue Music Department activities already in operation but will help expand the present program and go toward such needed items as additional choir robes, band uniforms, orchestra music, trips, with 35 percent being set aside for scholarships for prospective music majors.

Friday evening's offerings will be divided into two parts, a pop-concert starting at 8:15 followed by a dance until 1 o'clock.

The Humboldt Little Symphony, a college and community enterprise, will open the pop-concert featuring familiar compositions by well-known composers, such as J. Strauss, Rimsky-Korsakoff, Schubert, Greig, and Bach. The symphony is under the direction of Charles Fulkerson.

The college choir under the direction of Leland Barlow will follow with a group of choral works by noteworthy composers in the field. A highlight will be the singing of the final chorus of the recent production of the folk-opera, "Down In the Valley," by Kurt Weill. Soloists with the choir will be Shirley Pitlock and Don Stephens.

Following the choir the symphony will play an amusing set of variations by the waltz king, J. Strauss, to be followed by a performance of 3 movements from the "Capriccio Espagnole" by Rimsky-Korsakoff with Henry Simonson playing rhapsodic violin cadenzas.

The college chorus will sing a group of folk-song arrangements of several nations, namely, Czechoslovakia, South Africa, and America. Margo Hanley, a music major, will appear as soloist with the chorus under the direction of Mr. Fulkerson.

Gloria Chappell, outstanding concert artist and wife of Richard Flye, who is a member of the
