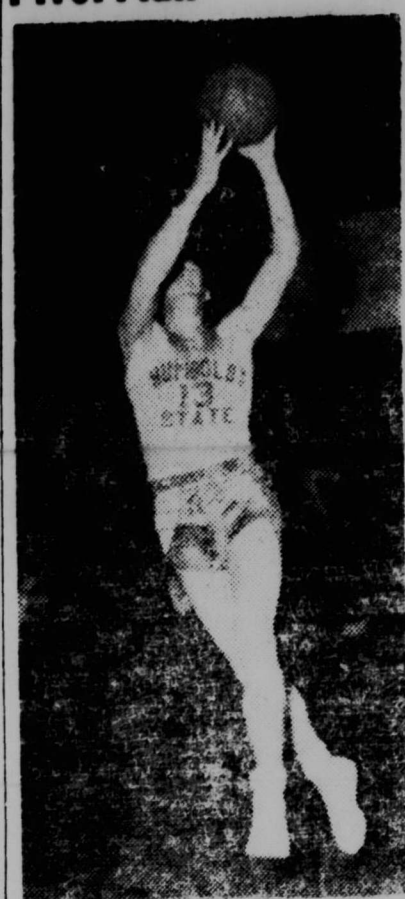

The Bittners are potential challengers for the A. A. U. championship this year having lost only one game in thirty-nine starts. The club is of amateur standing, coached by Bob Alameda, but it has met such college teams as Oregon State, St. Mary's and University of California. Recently they made a tour of the Phillippines adding ten more wins to their impressive record. Three members of this mighty squad were participants on the United States Olympic basketball team sent to England in 1948.

In the starting lineup for the Oakland casabas there are some very tall men with very distinguished titles. Don Barksdale, 6 ft. 6 ins., sparked the U. S. Olympic team and while attending U. C.

L. A. was voted All-American forward. Chuck Hanger, 6 ft. 6 ins., played forward position for University of California, where he made the All-Conference team, and at the pivot spot, lanky Ed Voss, 6 ft. 6 ins., was voted All-American when he saw action for the Stanford Indians. Les O'Gara and Dave Minor are both 6 ft. 3 ins., play guard and were chosen All-Americans in their college years.

The Oakland outfit will be favored when they encounter the Lumberjacks, but Bob Brambani and Ernie Cunningham who have been out with knee injuries will be at full strength to add power to the club. Holding a record of five straight wins, the green and gold cagers of HSC prepared themselves for the two game series with Southern Oregon College.

In what proved to be two of the most thrilling games of the season HSC the first nite, downed a taller quintet from the Northland 52-41.

The half time score found S.O.C. ahead 27-21, but the Humboldt five in the second half proved the caliber of ball they are able to play and moved out in front to decidedly defeat S. O. C.

Forwards, Eddie Oliveira and Bob Marsh each collected 15 points, and guard, Gene Moses, was not far behind with 12 points for the victors.

A serious aspect of the game was the loss of Ernie Cunningham, with a knee injury, which proved in later games to be costly to the H. S. C. club.

The second game with S. O. C. was another thriller, but this time H. S. C. went down to defeat, 54-50. It was their first loss at home his season.

Keith Wade, of S. O. C. caught fire, and dropped 25 points through the bucket for the winners, while Oliveira had 18 and Klingenspor 14 points for the losers.

On Jan. 17th, the Broadway Clowns played H. S. C. in Eureka, and both clubs put on a good performance for the fans.

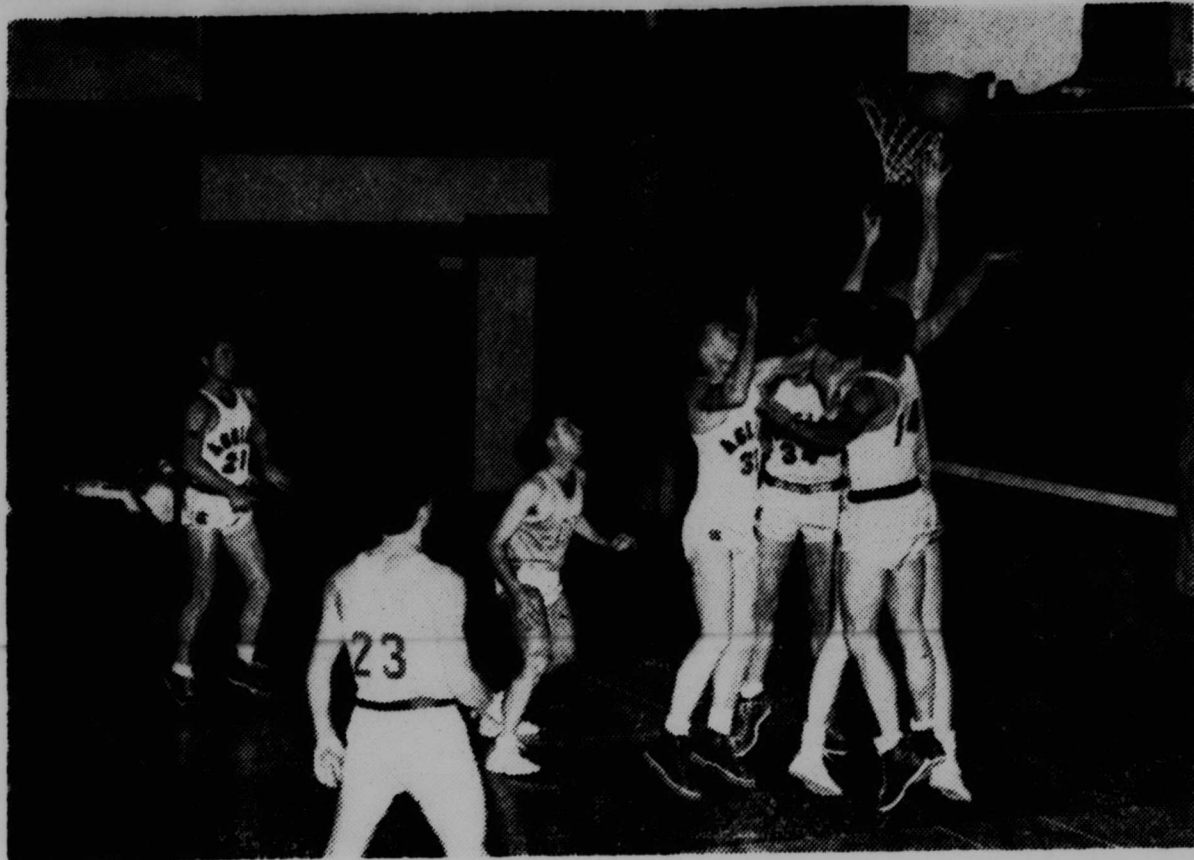
H. S. C. played its second string the first half in trying to wear down the Clowns, who only had five players. In the second half, the first string played, but were unable to over take the Clowns, and the Broadway Club eked out a 35-33 victory.

The locals headed South for three games, the first of which was with Sacramento State College, a nonconference game. H. S. C. came from behind to win 37-34. Three ex-Humboldt men play with S. S. C. team, Ralph Maloof, Parker Johnston, and Les Bolt. Their coach Warren Conrad, is a former cage mentor from Humboldt State.

For two consecutive nights, the Humboldt cagers turned on the cold water in Kezar Pavilion, to drop two games to San Francisco State, 51-35 and 76-49.

The first nite, Kenny Dunaway was the leading scorer for the losers with 10 points, and the second night Moses had 15 and Oliveira

had 13 for the Humboldt squad.

Humboldt came home to continue its losing ways by dropping a pair of games to Chico State.

In the first over-time period of this season H. S. C. fell before the Wildcats 49-44. Klingenspor knotted the count at 41-41 all just before the final buzzer sounded, but in the over-time Chico added five quick points and then three more to turn back the green and gold.

The second game found the Humboldt five again on the short end. This time by a 47-43 count. Moses came through with 13 points, and Oliveira had 12 for the losers.

In a return match with Frisco State, H. S. C. looked like a top form ball club, for they decisively trounced the Gators twice, 68-55 and 64-36. In the first game they were ahead all the way and led 36-28 at the half time. It was their first win in five starts and the Gators third loss in a row. Oliveira was again leading scorer with 20 points, and Bob Marsh had 17.

The second game was hardly a contest as Humboldt scored at will. The hapless Gators were a beaten ball club, and didn't look like the league leaders that they had been a week or so before. Dead-eye Ed just couldn't miss as he sank 29 points, and Bob Marsh connected for 10 for the green and gold.

Humboldt broke the Cal Aggies losing streak by handing them their first conference win of the season 49-36. It was definitely a cold nite for the H. S. C. cagers.

In their first meeting H. S. C. trampled the Aggies 55-30. The half time score was 30-14, and needless to say, "little Eddie", was

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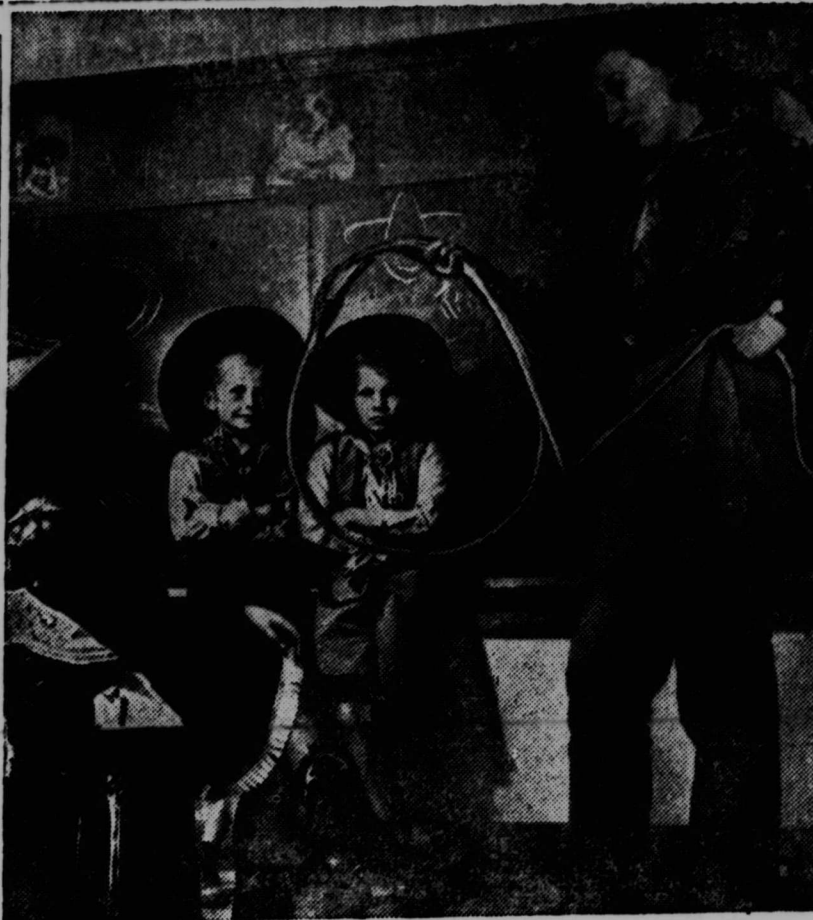

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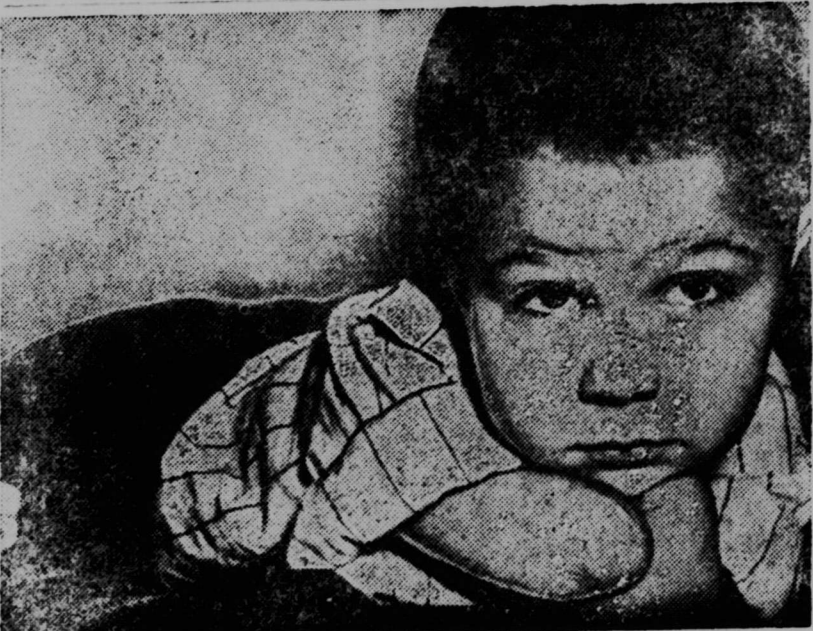
