## H. S. C. Organizations Host To Humboldt, Del Norte, High Schools

One-hundred-fifty high school drama enthusiasts from Humboldt and Del Norte Counties will converge on the Humboldt State College campus the weekend of March 18 and 19 for the annual college sponsored Northwestern California Dramatic Festival. At this time a series of one-act plays by the high schools and the college productions, "Down in the Valley" and "Happy Journey" will be presented.

60 college students representing all of the clubs and organizations on the campus will serve as hosts and hostesses to the high school drama groups. About 40 high school girls will be housed in Nelson Hall, and about the same number of high school boys will be housed in the big gym Friday night, March 18.

## Letter To The Editor

"Name Withheld's" plaintive query about communism in the March 2nd issue of Lumberjack is indicative of the state of mind into which many of us have either drifted or been shoved. Our reaction to questions about communism is similar to the Bee-and-Flower brush-off given Little Oswald when he begins to exhibit curiosity concerning some of the more interesting biological processes.

Webster's Collegiate Dictionary defines communism as "Any system of social organization involving common ownership of the agents of production, and an approach to equal distribution of the products of industry." The Encyclopedia Britannica states that the aim of communism is the liberation of man from toil and the reform of society on ethical grounds.

There isn't a revolution in a ton of it. It is, in fact, a highly idealistic system of social and economic organization.

Communism is not a recent impotation or development in the United States. Robert Owen tried it in 1825 at New Harmony, Indiana. So, also, did Francois Fourier at Brook Farm in staid old Massachusetts. Both these projects failed for the same reason they would fail today: Homo Americanus is an onery cuss who doesn't take kindly to planned Utopias, even if offered surcease from toil and ethical reformation. Ask any starry-eyed Do Gooder.

Let us turn from the Bee-and-Flower aspect of communism and, keeping a little to the windward, drag out Uncle Joe's brand of communism. For study of Uncle Joe's communism, we need not beat our brains out against the Iron Curtain. Nazi Germany and Fascist Italy were high fidelity replicas of the present government by terror in Russia. Slave labor, merciless eradication of radical and political minorities, nationalization of women for breeding and the ceaseless flow of venomous, saliva-flecked propaganda for domestic and foreign consumption: all were, or are, common and accepted practices in the Third Reich, in Mussolini's Empire and in the Union of Socialist Soviet Republics. Any differences are those of terminology.

When our eager young ask about communism let us not take refuge in pusillanimous silence. Let's tell 'em about Uncle Joe.

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## Parking Rules Now In Effect

Last Thursday, March 10, the new traffic parking regulations went into effect, as some students have already found out to their sorrow.

The new set-up is under the direction of the Board of Control, with the co-operation of the Arcata Police Department. Arcata police will patrol the city streets in the area of the college and will issue regular city parking tickets to any violations incurred on the following streets:

No Parking - North side of plaza from Sequoia to Cedar Sts.

No Parking - On either side of Cedar St.

No Parking - North side of 19th St., from Pine St. to the Gym.

This leaves the Board of Control with two areas to police - the parking pattern in front of the college and the parking area behind the school. To enforce the parking regulations of these two areas the Board of Control has 12 volunteer student officers. These students, who work in an unofficial capacity, have the power to issue campus citations.

The proper procedure to be followed upon receiving a campus citation is as follows - Go either to the Dean of Men or Dean of Women's office within two days after receiving the citation. If it is your first offense you will receive nothing more than a warning. If you already have one or more violations you may expect a fine of fifty cents. If you disagree with the nature of the citation, or believe it unfairly imposed, you have the right to go before the Board of Control, where you will be given an opportunity to express yourself.

A group of pugilists representing Humboldt State will leave tomorrow night for the Far Western Conference Boxing Tournament, which will be held Friday and Saturday night at the University of California at Davis.

All five schools of the Far Western Conference are entered; San Francisco State, Cal Aggies, Chico, So. Oregon, and Humboldt State.

Frisco State is pre-tournament favorite, but strong opposition can be expected from the Cal. Aggies, who are considered to have one of the strongest teams on the Coast.

Little is known about So. Oregon, because they have had no showings to date. They could prove to be the dark-horse of the Tournament and can be expected to make a good showing.

The Wildcats from Chico have been in three dual meets so far this season. Their record is not impressive. They have won only once while losing twice.

Their two losses were to Nevada University, and Frisco State. Their one victory was over H. S. C., at Chico.

Humboldt, with one contest under their belts, will send a five man team down to the Davis meet. Most of these men have had previous experience, and with the last few weeks have gone through diligent training for this coming tournament.

At his last showing at Chico, Hawkins fought his opponent to a draw, in one of the best bouts of the dual meet. He showed a very fine exhibition of boxing skill, and will be counted upon to make another good showing down at Davis.

Mahlon Marshall, 160 pounds, represents H. S. C. in the middleweight division. Marshall fought Clarence Ferguson in the inter-school tournament, which was held in the H. S. C. gym.

His showing in this fight was very impressive and was considered the best bout of the evening.

Gene Collard, the boy with the terrific right, fought both in the bout at Chico and the inter-school meet. He did surprisingly well in both his appearances, especially his fight at Chico, in which he almost tore his opponent's ear off. He weighs 145 lbs. and will fight in the welter-weight clas.

Lou Asavis, who has been looking better with every work out, will enter the ring at 135 pounds and will swing leather in the light-weight division. Asavis has had some previous experience in the ring. He fought over in Eureka in the last tournament that the school was entered in. Lou is a snappy, aggressive fighter, and should do well in the coming show at Davis.

Ken Gallegar an experienced fighter, has an impressive ring record. In 27 fights Gallegar has won 26 and lost one. He will be representing the school for the first time, and will fight in the bantam weight, at a 125 pounds.
