Improvements Slated For Campus

Post War Construction: On March 10, in Sacramento the state architect again stated that bids for Jenkins Hall will be submitted to contractors soon.

Minor repairs and improvements: Following is a partial list of approved items with funds now on hand with the exception of a small amount to be secured from the present legislature: Repairs and replacement of plumbing fixtures—\$3600. Miscellaneous painting, which includes the inside of the Administration building, the outside of the C.E.S., the outside of the Gym and possibly the outside of Nelson Hall. These projects will be done this summer.

Roadways, back of the college and east of the Gym. This work will be done by the State Div. of Highways as soon as the weather permits.

Separate heating unit and hot water system for the Gym. C.E.S. lower and upper playfields hard-surfacing. As soon as the weather permits, these projects will be done.

Other items include window and protective screens for the playrooms at the C.E.S. cement walks north of the C.E.S., flagstone walk between the Gym and west stadium. Resurfacing tennis courts and some miscellaneous projects.

Douglas Bill Topic Of Forum

H. R. 2876, the Helen Gahagan-Douglas Bill, was the topic for discussion at the March 21st meeting of the Conservation Unlimited Club. Stanley Woodman, Arcata attorney, and Vern C. Hallin of the United States Forest Service were guest speakers.

The Douglas Bill, if passed would set aside as a memorial to the late Franklin D. Roosevelt the redwood belt in the counties of Humboldt, Del Norte, Mendocino, and the northern portion of Sonoma County; the bill also designates the redwood belt as a national forest, placing many restrictions on logging practices and the amount of logging to be done in the redwood belt.

Conservation Unlimited members discussed various aspects of the bill as a conservation measure, rather than its merits as a memorial to our late President Roosevelt. Intense discussions took place, and much interest is the bill was aroused in those present, many of whom previously knew little or nothing about the Douglas Bill.

Miss Hermie Kroeger was the advisor.

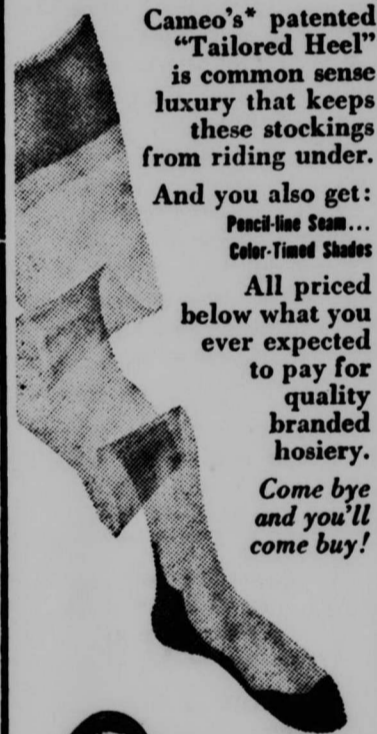
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Federalist Progress

Working for the passage of Assembly Joint Resolution No. 26 in the California assembly, the Student Federalist organization of HSC circulated a petition through the City of Arcata, last week. A.J.R. No. 26, if passed in the assembly and senate, will be sent to congress and President Truman to ask them to call a convention for the sole purpose of proposing amendment to the constitution of the United States to make it possible for the country to enter a world government.

The campus organization contacted 130 persons and secured 127 signatures upon the petition. Seventeen faculty members of HSC were approached and 15 gladly signed the petition. The petition was telegraphed to Assemblyman A. W. Way in Sacramento and word has been received from the state capitol that Way was surprised in an extremely pleasant way.
