Tickets will soon be on sale at local prominent stores. Dave Tolle is in charge of tickets and publicity.





The sports scenes here at Humboldt have been bubbling over with sunshine (liquid), but now you can stow away your boats (we hope) and settle down to playing spectator to the baseball games and occasional track meets, for the sun doth shine. * * *

Darrell "Brownie" Brown, an alumni of Humboldt, came back last week to see his old friends and make many new ones. Brownie, who was a star on the HSC basketball squad in 1947, was the 5th highest scorer in the nation that same year. 
LUMBERJACK MAINSTAYS The Other Side

Brambini was exceptionally good at first base, as well as at the plate, and Cliff Prelow played a great game at second base.


Prelow laid down two perfect bunts, and each time almost beat them out to get on base.
