

# Arsenic and Old Lace Begins Friday

## Beck, Stockoff, and Newman In Main Leads in Spring Play

One of the most popular comedies to be written in recent years, "Arsenic and Old Lace" by Joseph Kesselring, will be offered by the Humboldt State College Players in the college auditorium at 8:15 p. m. of the evenings of May 6, 7, 13, and 14, after which the cast will travel to Chico State College to present the play for the annual Drama Festival there.

"Arsenic and Old Lace" enjoyed one of the longest runs on Broadway in the history of the New York stage. The hilarious plot features the strange behavior of two sweet, elderly ladies who have a habit of poisoning people as a form of charity. The menacing antics of a Boris Karloff character who is trying to dispose of a body and the startling behavior of the nephew who believes he is Teddy Roosevelt are unusual contrasts to the normal character in the play.

Jake Newman is seen as Mortimer Brewster, a drama critic for a New York newspaper. Wilbur Jensen plays the role of Teddy Brewster, the eccentric nephew who thinks that he is Teddy Roosevelt. The Boris Karloff character "Jonathan" is played by David Tolle. The play's other characters are more nearly normal.

"The set for this play is the most difficult I've undertaken in quite some time," stated John Van Duzer, technical director of the spring play, "Arsenic and Old Lace." "It's a good set and I've enjoyed building it," he concluded.

The set represents the main room of an old Brooklyn house, a house which was built near the beginning of the century. Besides the furnishings, which have to be in the period of the play, there is the stairway and interior of the

room, which also have to be designed for the period. The period might be expressed by calling it "gay nineties" period.

"Every set that is made for any play has its problems but this one has many more than the usual ones," claimed one of John's helpers.

"But why talk about the problems," stated another helper, "it was an enormous job, but it has been well made and we're all proud of it," stated another helper.

"From the design on the doors; from the stairway; to the squeak in the window box, everything is well made; and its been fun helping John," said still another student helper.

Southern Oregon started fast in the first game, scoring all their runs in the first inning on two walks, two hits, and a Humboldt error. Red Hunt settled down after that disastrous first inning and pitched beautiful ball allowing but four more hits for the rest of the game.

Humboldt scored their first run in the third inning when first baseman Shuman doubled and came home on George Renworth's single. The Staters second run came in the fifth inning when Cliff Prelow started things off with a single. He advanced to third base on Jerry Shumman's sacrifice. Bob Brambanini then walked and immediately stole second base, Prelow scoring from third when S.O.C.'s catcher tried to throw out Brambani at second. Humboldt outhit the Raiders 7 to 6.

In the nightcap Russ Martindale handcuffed the Lumberjack batsmen with 2 hits, both by "Dangerous" Dave Dana. The 'jacks scored their lone run in the sixth inning when Prelow walked, advanced to third on sacrifices by Shuman and Renworth, and with two outs the speedy little second sacker stole home.
