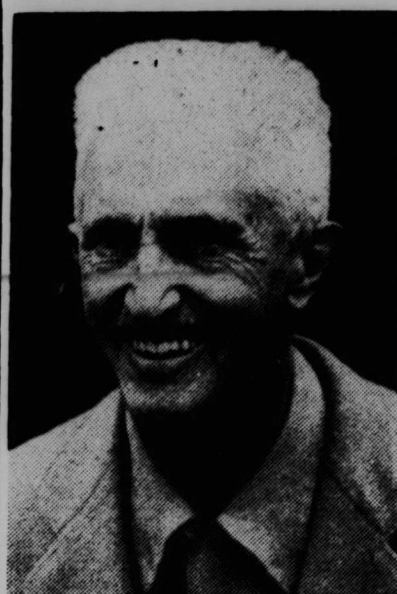

"Pop" Jenkins To Be Honored

Ground breaking ceremonies to inaugurate construction on the new \$200,000 Industrial Arts building at Humboldt State college, will be held Sunday, May 22 at 3 o'clock in the afternoon.

The building is to be named the Jenkin's Building in honor of Horace R. "Pop" Jenkins who has been a member of the Humboldt faculty in the industrial arts department since 1914, the year in which the college was opened. Jenkins will be hailed as guest of honor at the ceremonies.

Many widely known business, civic and education leaders will speak, with the possibility that more will be added to the already imposing list prior to the ceremonies.

Among those scheduled to be present and speak are Mayor J. F. Langer of Eureka; Mayor Allen Ham, Arcata; James Cady, president of the Humboldt State Alumni Association; C. M. Soren, Arcata Superintendent of Schools; J. J. Krohn, California Barrell Co.; Arthur S. Gist, president of Humboldt State; Professor Horace R. "Pop" Jenkins; Hank Frank, president of Humboldt State student body; and Irwin T. Quinn, former California State senator, from Eureka.

The new building will be located at Pine street and Laurel drive. All students are especially urged to attend this ceremony honoring our friend "Pop".

HSC To Offer New Degree

The State Legislature has passed a law authorizing the Board of Education to grant to state colleges the right to award the Master's Degree in connection with teaching Credentials. Each college may apply to the board indicating the areas which they feel qualified to organize programs for the M. A. degree. The Board of Education is the body that will approve applications by the colleges.

Those working for the M. A. would be able to concentrate in professional education such as Elementary or Secondary Education, or a subject of another field, Biological or Social Sciences.

Humboldt State College plans to apply for the right to issue the Master's Degree in two or three fields.

HSC Players To Go To Chico

The cast of the Humboldt State College Player's Spring play "Arsenic and Old Lace," the popular mystery-comedy by Joseph Kesselring, will leave Arcata early Friday morning for Chico where they will present their production at the Chico State College Saturday night.

The cast, accompanied by director Dr. Don Karshner, student directors George Garland and Jane Saunders, and production staff members Charlotte Marks and Clarence Bevington will be entertained Friday evening by the Chico State College production of "Our Hearts Were Young and Gay." Early risers of the Humboldt group will attend the regional high school dramatic festival on the Chico State campus Saturday morning.

An Alpha Psi Omega, National Honorary Dramatic Fraternity, dinner at the Hotel Oaks, where the Humboldt Players are staying, will be given Saturday evening, after which will follow the Humboldt production "Arsenic and Old Lace" at the college. Following the play, a cast party for both the Humboldt Players and the Chico Players will be held.

The trip to Chico is being financed by those of the Players who will travel in the group and was aided by the proceeds from cake sales which were held by the cast.

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HSC World Feds Petition Students

Members of the Student Federalist Chapter of Humboldt State College have been circulating petitions for signatures of students. When the petitions have sufficient signatures they will be sent to Washington D. C. Students desiring to sign a petition should contact any member of the Student Federalists chapter of which Phil Simon is chairman. Following is a copy of the petition.

We, the student of the high schools, colleges, and universities of the State of California, whose future is at stake in the decisions now being made by our statesmen, respectfully ask you, Mr. President and members of the eighty-first Congress, to consider this statement of our convictions.

We believe that the paramount need of our age is to avoid wars rather than to wins wars, and that the peoples of the world concur in this belief.

We believe that attempts to establish peace by means of leagues, alliances, treaties, and pacts will inevitably fail; that permanent peace cannot be assured until the anarchy among nations is supplanted by a world-wide federation of nations

We believe that the member nations of the United Nations should delegate to that body the

sovereign power to make, interpret, and enforce international law, binding not only upon nations, but also upon the individual citizens of the international community, thus transforming the United Nations into a federal world government.

Only then, we believe, will the demoralizing fear of war be lifted.

THEREFORE we propose:

That the Congress shall submit conform our foreign policy to the spirit of the Chapter, and our government give its full support to the United Nations; and

That the President shall instruct the American Delegation to the United Nations to initiate such steps as are necessary to convert that organization into an international federal government; and

That the Congress shall submit to the legislatures of the States a Constitutional Amendment to enable the United States to participate in a world federation.

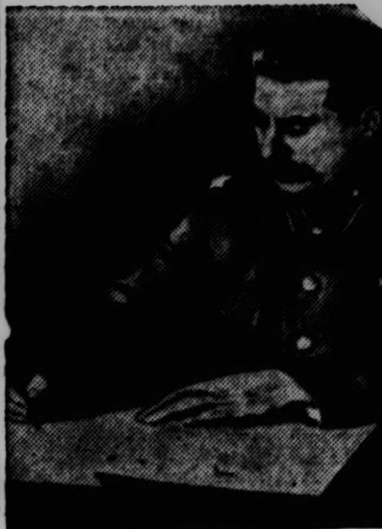

In the girls singles D. Shannon defeated D. Butz 6-4, 3-6, 6-2, and D. Trehearne lost to Folwell 3-6, 6-1, 3-6.

Both the men's doubles teams won, with Crane and Hofferbert defeating Luick and Fike 7-5, 6-1, and Braun and Paaso defeating Rocha and Pinnell 6-4, 8-6.

The girls doubles won with Shannon and Trehearne defeating Folwell and Babage 4-6, 6-1, 6-3. The mixed doubles team lost; D. Stone and D. Shannon to D. Butz and H. Trehearne, 4-6, 6-1, 2-6.

Tennis Coach Hormie Kreoger has plans for the HSC team to play the Eureka team this afternoon in Eureka and the results will be in the next issue.

The U. S. played the part of the Star Spangled Banner during the last war.

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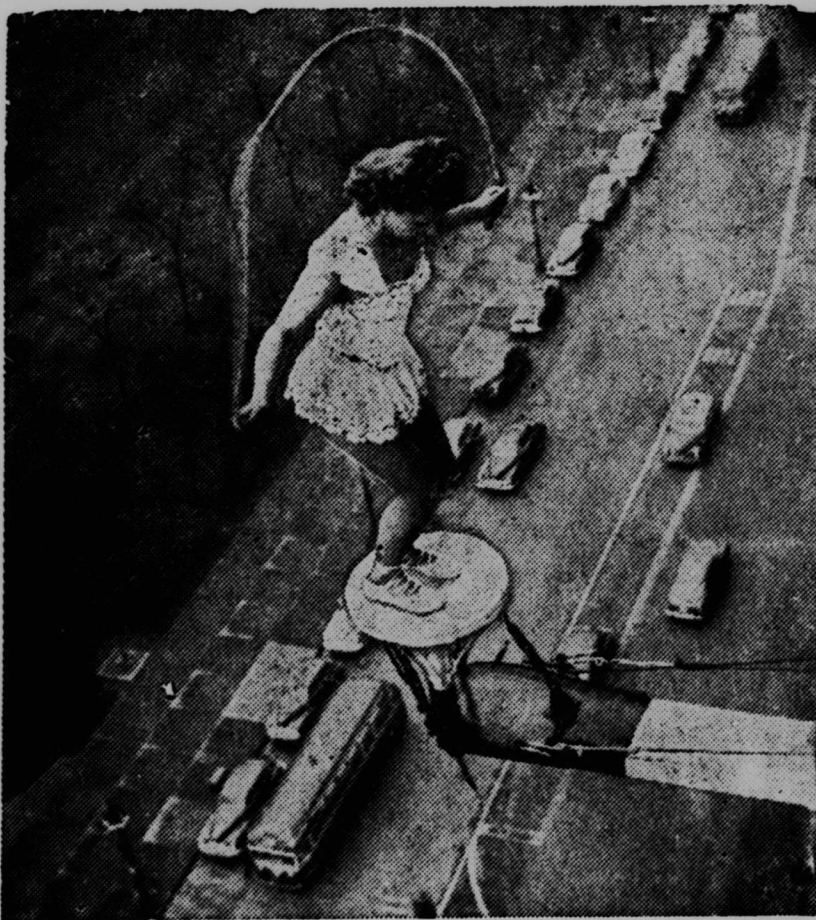
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
