Chico Players To Present "The New Amendment To Constitution" At Drama Festival

This fall Humboldt audiences will see two popular shows on the Humboldt stage November 12 and again on the 17th and 18th during the Chico-Humboldt Drama Festival.

"The Devil and Daniel Webster" by Stephen Vincent Benet, produced by the College Players, under the direction of Dr. Don Karshner, takes place in a New Hampshire farmhouse and concerns a man who has sold his soul to the devil for wealth. When the devil appears to claim his property he finds himself pitted against the genius of Daniel Webster who is there to defend Jabez Stone. The cast for the production consists of some of the most outstanding of the Humboldt Players.

The second production "Trial By Jury", one of Gilbert and Sullivan's masterpieces of satire and comedy is to be performed by the Humboldt State College Choir under the direction of Mr. Leland Barlow. The play attacks the procedure used by the British court system in the trial of a breach of promise suit. Mastering the tricky tempo and rhythm of Sir Arthur Sullivan's music offers a great challenge to the Humboldt College a cappella choir, which achieved wide acclaim for its production of "Down in the Valley" last year.

The third production to be presented will be the "Traitor" and will be given by the Chico players as a part of the 10th Annual Drama festival.

"Q" Means A One-Act Play

"Q," a one-act farce by Stephen Leacock, will be presented, under the direction of Douglas Dupen, at an assembly Tuesday, November 22. The play is being sponsored by Alpha Psi Omega, National Honorary Dramatics Fraternity. The cast includes George Spelvin as Jack Annerley; Darrel Altimus as George Groof; Lois Carlson as Doris Dneiper, and Blane Johnson as Blight.

"Merwyn Rickey and his Homecoming committee are doing a fine job. If Homecoming weekend lives up to only half the expectations it will be a highly successful event", disclosed Wilbur Jensen, president of the Humboldt State student body.

Rickey, appointed by the Student Council to head the Homecoming weekend activities, and his co-workers, Rod Sheperd, faculty advisor, the Alumni Association, and representatives from the various campus organizations participating in presenting the Homecoming program, have been hard at work for weeks planning this, the biggest event of football season at HSC.

The crowded schedule of events starts Thursday, November 10, with the traditional assembly to present the candidates for Homecoming queen.

This assembly will be held at 11:00 a. m. in the school auditorium and will include skits prepared by each organizations sponsoring a candidate. Voting by the student body will be held following the assembly.

BEAN FEED FIRST

Thursday afternoon at 6:00 p. m. the Home Economics Club under the direction of Emily Whalen, president, will hold their annual bean feed in the hall of the Administration building. Admission is 25 cents per person for all the beans they can eat.

THURSDAY EVENTS

Bonfire rally, Pajamarino dance, Hayride, and marshmallow roast and song-fest will be held Thursday night. The Freshman class under president Francis Stebbins is sponsoring these events. The bonfire rally will be held at 7:30 p. m. Entertainment will be provided by the band, cheer-leaders, and the song queens. Joe Sousa is in charge of arrangements.

"PAJAMARINO"

The annual 'Pajamarino Dance' is being directed by Nancy Crichton. It will be presented in the dining room of Nelson Hall from 8:30 to 10:30 to the music of Leonard Cooke's orchestra. Everyone is to wear pajamas, night shirts, or any other weird night wear. Prizes for the most outstanding costumes will be awarded by the Alumni Association. Admission for the dance is 50 cents per person and 75c for couples. Faculty members are admitted free of charge.

Immediately following the dance, at 10:30, there will be a hayride out to Freshwater park in three trucks. Admission to this is covered by the ticket to the Pajamarino, but those not going to the dance will be charged the same price for the hayride. Mr. Barlow will lead songs on the ride and at the marshmallow roast following. Bob Titlow is handling these two events. The marshmallow roast will be held at Freshwater Park.

All day Thursday an open house will be held for the benefit of the Alumni. It will be applied to all classes and dormitories.

HOMECOMING DAY

Friday, November 11, is the day of Homecoming itself. The Homecoming game will start at 2:00 in the afternoon, with HSC playing the Cal Ramblers. The half time stunt, directed by the Rally Committee under co-chairmen Don Crowe and Martha Lynn with Clay

Carley, will include a football kicking and passing contest among local high school players sponsored by the Radio Club. A trophy for the winners will be awarded by the Alumni Association. The half-time includes, too, the presentation of all the candidates for Homecoming queen on a float built by the sophomore class. John McMurrin of the sophomore class is chairman for this latter event.

At 6:00 p. m. Friday there will be an alumni reception and buffet dinner.

HOMECOMING DANCE

The annual Homecoming Dance will be presented from 9:00 p. m. to 1:00 in the Arcata Labor Temple. The dance will be informal and Ray Bullocks orchestra will provide the music. The Knights organization is handling the dance this year with Bill Thayer and Locke McCorkle as co-chairmen. Miss Buchanan is acting as faculty advisor for the dance. At this time the Homecoming queen will be presented, crowned, and gifts bestowed upon her. Tickets for the dance will be \$1.00 per person and \$1.50 per couple.

PLAY PREMIERE

The Division of Fine and Applied Arts is going to present a premiere showing of their Fall production, "The Devil and Daniel Webster," a one-act play given in conjunction with "Trial by Jury," a one-act operetta. This will be given Saturday night, at 8:15 in the college auditorium. Tickets may be obtained through the student body office.

ALUMNI PARTICIPATE

The Alumni Association of Humboldt State College is participating in the Homecoming weekend by presenting prizes and trophies at the Pajamarino dance and at the football contest during the Homecoming game. They are also presenting their annual reception and buffet dinner after the game under the direction of James Cady, president of the association. Last Tuesday evening at 6:30 they held the Annual Alumni Banquet at the Bayside Grange. Letters were sent out to all alumni concerning this banquet and the Homecoming calendar of events.

QUEEN CONTEST

All arrangements for the queen contest including building the float on which to present the candidates at the half-time of the game, the presentation of the queens assembly, and the voting to determine the queen are being conducted by the sophomore class under Raphael Belluomini, president, and Norma Gentry, student representative.

The final success of the Homecoming will rest with the attending students and alumni of Humboldt State. The fine co-operation and planning of the Homecoming committee deserve to be rewarded by student attendance and participation in the activities planned. This year's Homecoming may well prove to be the most successful in years.

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J. R. Powers To Select Queen For Yearbook

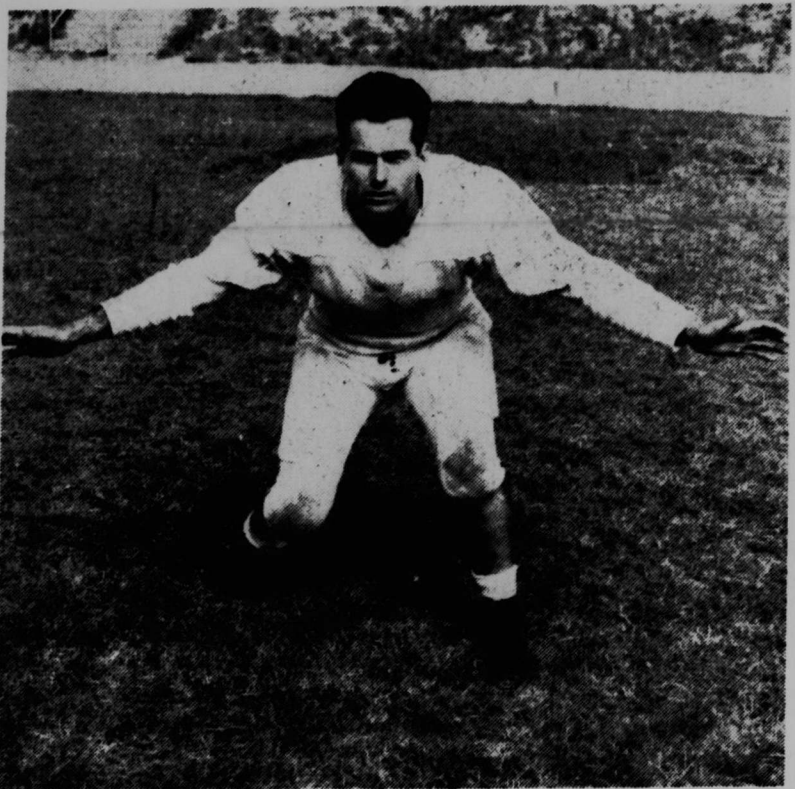

HSC Teammanship Keeps Chico 0 To 0

The Humboldt State college Lumberjacks threw Chico State entirely out of the running for the Far Western conference title by throwing up a stone wall defense and holding the Wildcats to a 0 to 0 tie at Chico last Saturday night.

Sparkling defensive work by Tom Seuffert, Alme Allen, Tom Viracola, Dick Lawitzke and Caesar Fiamma combined to hold

the highly rated Wildcats scoreless.

Chico made one long drive, which went 79 yards and ended when Humboldt held on the one yard line, in the fourth quarter, as the desperate Wildcats attempted to score.

Humboldt's main offensive weapon was the good left foot of Bob Bell. Bell kicked seven times during the game for an average of 43.5 yards per try. He booted a 48 yard kick out of bounds on the Chico one yard line midway through the game. A fifty yarder trickled into the end zone, and two other kicks were good for 48 and 44 yards.

Jack Stoops took the place of the injured Kenny Dunaway and Milt Warren at left half, getting away for a 21 yard gain, but like the rest of Humboldt's backs, was held for little gain consistently.

The only back on either team to gain consistently was Matt Spear, 145 pound Chico flash who was

HSC Close To SF Win; Score 26-20

Despite a thrilling second half rally, which left them only minutes short of their first win of the ball game, the Humboldt State college Lumberjacks dropped a 26 to 20 decision to San Francisco State in the Redwood Bowl October 29.

The San Franciscans had a 26 to 7 lead early in the third quarter, but red hot Humboldt comeback left them gasping at the end of the game.

The Lumberjacks scored their first touchdown in the second quarter, after falling behind 14 to 0. Les Ivancich rambled 12 yards to the San Francisco 33, from where Excellent Eddie Oliviera raced for a touchdown. Bob Bell booted the extra point between the uprights and the score was Humboldt 7, San Francisco 14.

After falling behind 26 to 7 early in the third quarter, the Lumberjacks started to move. Dennis Kinser rifled a pass to Eddie Oliviera on the second play after the fourth quarter had started. The pass was good for eleven yards, coming on the end of a 76 yard drive, Humboldt's longest of the season. Bell missed the extra point, making the score San Francisco 26, Humboldt 13.

Lee Cockrum blocked a San Francisco State punt to set up Humboldt's third touchdown midway through the fourth quarter. Landis hit tackle for 9 and Oliviera added 18 more. Bob Matthews threw a perfect strike to Johnny Adams in the end zone for the score. Bob Bell added the extra point making the score Humboldt 20, San Francisco 26.

San Francisco scored twice on quarterback sneaks by Don Lowart, both in the second quarter. Slingin' Sam DiVito was responsible for San Francisco's third score, passing to Jack Caruso on the Humboldt 5, then passing again to Bob Kroeckel for a touchdown.

Rudy Smith intercepted a Humboldt lateral to set up the fourth San Francisco touchdown on the Humboldt five yard line. DiVito passed to Chabot for the touchdown.

Dennis Kinser flipped a 23 yard pass to Mel Klein for the longest Humboldt gain of the contest.

Humboldt had one golden scoring opportunity in the third quarter, when the Humboldt line broke through the Chico wall while Jater Cowan was attempting to kick. The Humboldt linemen chased Cowan all over the Chico backfield before Cowan broke away long enough to throw an incomplete pass.

The Lumberjacks had a first down on the Chico 18, but lost back to the 33, on a penalty, a fumble, and a pass attempt. Kinser gained back the lost yardage with a pass to Klein, but Chico took over on their own 19 and Humboldt had lost its chance.

HSC To Meet Ramblers Friday Afternoon

The Lumberjacks, winless, but with a tie under their belts, will be substantial underdogs in the tilt, but they were underdogs last week too and are improving with every game.

The Lumberjacks played their game minus two left halfbacks, both of whom will play Friday. Kenny Dunaway, out with muscle injuries last weekend, will be back

at his old post, and Milt Warren, out since the Cal Aggie game, will probably see action.

The Ramblers have won four, lost two, tied one record thus far this season.

They blanked Chico 24 to 0 earlier in the year, and last week downed Hamilton Field 44 to 21, after being behind at the halftime.

They thrive on Collegiate competition. In addition to their Chico win, the Ramblers have a 55 to 7 win over Modesto JC to their credit.
