Ted, a Junior, is a transfer student from Pacific University.

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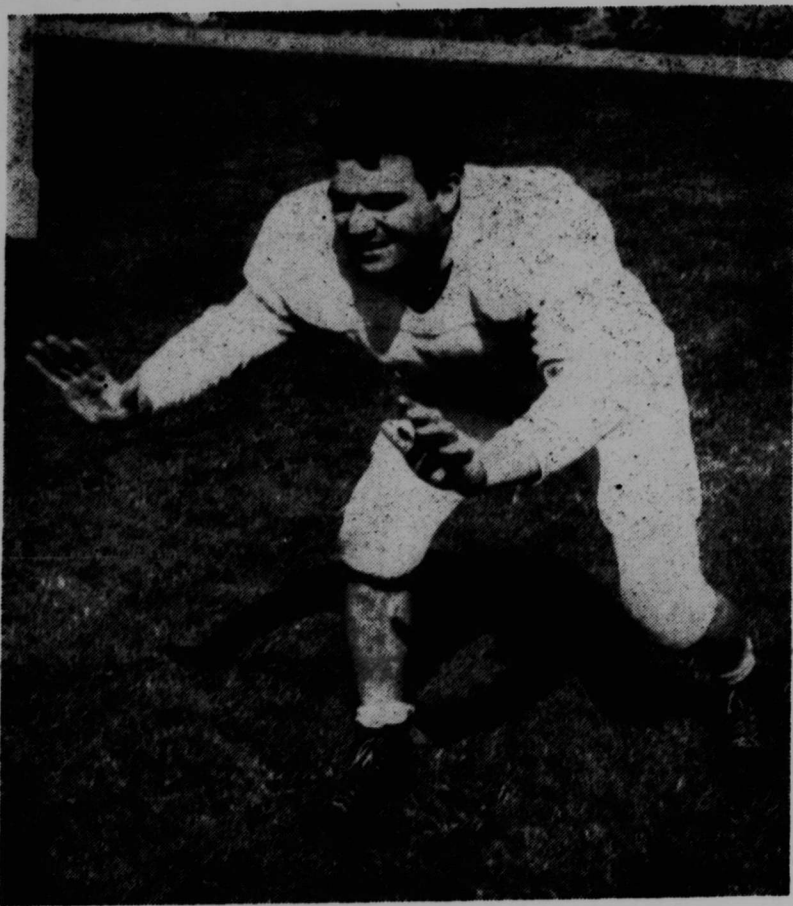

RAMBLERS EDGE HUMBOLDT 47-20; DUNAWAY, KINSER, MATTHEWS STAR

An explosive ground offense and a tough line gave the Cal Ramblers a 47 to 20 victory over Humboldt State's Lumberjacks November 11, despite a Humboldt aerial attack which picked holes in the Cal pass defense.

A tremendously hard charging team, with reserves three and four deep, the Cal team showed what power blocking and hard runners can do. Although held to a minimum of points for most of three quarters, Cal exploded in the second half for five of their seven touchdowns and the game.

A determined Humboldt State team scored first, on the fourth play of the game, and stayed very much in the game throughout the contest, coming back to threaten the Ramblers late in the game.

John Cadenasso, No. 1 Cal fullback, set up the first Humboldt touchdown by letting Lawitzke's kick go over his head, he finally recovered the elusive pigskin on the Cal one foot line. On the first scrimmage play of the game, a Cal

man fumbled and Humboldt recovered.

Two smashes at the line, and a penalty against Cal left the Humboldters where they had started, but Bob Matthews tried a quarterback sneak and scored.

Humboldt's passing attack was the only phase of the Green and Gold machine that was clicking, but Dennis Kinser and Bob Matthews, Humboldt's ace passers turned in their best performance of the year, completing 13 out of 29 passes for 197 yards gained, and nine first downs.

Kenny Dunaway, brilliant Fortuna flash just off the injured list, caught a long pass from Dennis Kinser for Humboldt's second touchdown. There wasn't a Cal defense man within fifteen yards of the elusive scatback as he picked a perfect Kinser pass out of the air and rambled for a score.

Clarification of the regulation regarding the requirement in physical education has been received from Verne Landreth, Chief of the Bureau of Health Education, Physical Education, and Recreation, State Department of Education, at Sacramento. Landreth states that veterans entering college in September of this year or latter will be required to complete the two units in physical education normally required of freshman and sophomore students.
