## "Midsummer Nights Dream" Cast: Play - Study Started

Cast for "Midsummer Night's Dream" picked; study of play to begin immediately. Production will be in the second semester.

A Shakespearean comedy-fantasy, "Midsummer Night's Dream" has been chosen as a drama project for fall and spring semesters.

The play, composed of three basic groups of people; royalty, young lovers, commoners, and fantasy, has its setting in Greece. It deals with the various activities of these groups. It is a beautiful balance of pageantry, earthly comedy, and colorful scenery.

The music is by Mendelssohn, but the orchestra has not yet been arranged for.

The cast of seventeen chief characters has been chosen after several days of tryouts: Theseus - Sid Smith, Hippolyta - Marbry Hampton, Philostrate - Dusty Rhodes, Egeus - Jean Masters,

Hermia - Marian Wurche, Demetrius - Harry Gift, Helena - Carol Beck, Lysander - Merwyn Rickey, Oberon - Al Braun, Titania - Donna Burbage, Puck - Paula Foley, Quince - Ole Carlson, Bottom - Francis Stebbins, Flute - Roy Leamy, Snout - John Lloyd, Snug - Darrell Altimus, Starveling - Dave Tolle.

In addition to these characters there are approximately twenty-three other students who will aid and act in the various phases of the play. These forty people will work during this semester in Oral Interpretation of Literature, a class designed to help them study the play throughout before beginning actual production.

This play will be presented at H.S.C. and is tentatively set to play in Eureka, Fortuna, Del Norte, and South Fork high schools with production dates running through-out March of '50.

While new to the college, Mr. Hickman is well acquainted with Humboldt County, having spent several vacations in the Redwoods.

W. F. (Bill) Pursley teaches Music Theory, Orchestra, and Piano. He did his undergraduate work at the State Teachers College in Indiana, and is a graduate of the Eastman School of Music. Mrs. Pursley is the Head Resident at Nelson Hall.

The new head coach at H.S.C. is Ted Staffler who played with the varsity team at the University of California. Serving in the Air Force during the war, Staffler played on the Moffet Field football team in 1941, and later played and coached for the 7th Air Force team. After his discharge from the service Ted went to Stanford for his M.A. degree.

Assisting Coach Staffler this year is Jack Whetstone, former all-conference halfback at the University of Kentucky. Before coming to Humboldt Whetstone coached the championship Tillamook Oregon High School team.

## Tragic Death Of Professor Lewis Mourned

Christian Science church services were held in the College Elementary school auditorium Wednesday afternoon for John H. Lewis, professor of the Wildlife department at Humboldt State College.

Professor Lewis was killed last week when the jeep in which he was driving in the Weitchpec area went over an embankment and pinned him underneath.

At the time of his death, Lewis was on his way for the backwoods area of the Weitchpec region to do some research work for the college. His body was found on the Klamath river road, two miles east of Weitchpec, Sunday morning by Bill Sanderson, a deer hunter.

### NATIONALLY KNOWN

Nationally known and recognized throughout the United States for the work he accomplished at Humboldt State, Lewis was also largely responsible for having the division of Wildlife studies at Humboldt State into a branch of the physical sciences. This is presently recognized as one of the outstanding wildlife courses being offered in any college. This year the wildlife department boasts a record enrollment of more than 125 students, the second largest enrollment for a single course of study in the entire school.

Officials at the college mourned the death of Lewis as the loss of an extremely respected person and an unsurpassable academician in his field.

Lewis was known as the guiding hand behind the game reserve established in this area, having laid out the program in detail. Professors and students from every section of the United States came for frequent visits and study with him.

The preliminary surveys for the development of the many areas in Humboldt county now under consideration by the State Wildlife Conservation board as public recreational sites, including Big Lagoon, Stone Lagoon, the South Spit, and several others, were spearheaded by Lewis.

### WAR VETERAN

He was a veteran of World War II and served as a lieutenant in the Navy. He earned the Asiatic Pacific theater ribbon with one star, the Philippine Liberation medal with two stars, and the American theater, World War II victory ribbon.

Lewis was a native of Fernley, Nevada, a member of the Sigma Alpha Epsilon fraternity and of the Alpha Zeta, an honorary fraternity.

## HSC Enrollment Figures May Reach New High

The highest enrollment figures in the history of Humboldt State college may soon be reached this fall, Myrtle McKittrick, college registrar, announced Tuesday.

Present enrollment is now 701, while many are attending classes on a visitors permit awaiting arrival of their transcripts.

The fall of 1947, when a total of 739 students registered, is the highest enrollment figure ever reached at HSC. Last year the total figure was 721.

Mrs. McKittrick attributed this year's anticipated figure to the expansion of the Humboldt State curriculum, the development of the wildlife program and the granting of the Masters degree, as well as the population growth in this area.

## Rent Rates Unchanged

Despite the desired lowering of room rents for housing on campus this year, last year's rates are still in effect. Efforts made by Humboldt State college to change minimum rents were superceded by state authority requiring that the old rates remain.

In an effort to alleviate one of last year's difficulties, however, the college is allowing rent to be paid for a whole semester at one time. Students unable to do so may follow last year's method of paying in monthly installments. Rates for the semester in the campus dormitories are: Nelson Hall, \$78.75; Redwood Hall, \$51.75; and Varsity Hall, \$49.50.

Fewer students are living in the dormitories so far this year than was expected according to the number who signed up for rooms last spring. As yet, all the dormitories are not filled, but new students are still coming in. As figures now stand Redwood Hall leads with 70 students, Nelson Hall next with 62, then Varsity

## Masters Degree Now Offered At Humboldt State

Humboldt State College has been authorized to accept applications for candidacy for the Master of Arts degree. This degree has been authorized primarily to assist qualified teachers and administrators to improve their professional competence through graduate study and to achieve the professional recognition that this work affords. The degree will be offered in Elementary Education, Secondary Education, Administration and Supervision, and Social Science.

All work for the Masters Degree will be done under the direction of the graduate study committee consisting of Dr. Ivan Milhous, chairman, Dr. Homer P. Balabanis, Dr. A. D. Graves, Dr. Hyman Palais, and Harry Griffith.

In order to make it possible for teachers in the vicinity to begin work on the degree several courses have been scheduled for late afternoon. These classes will begin Sept. 26.

Included in the group are Special Problems in Education, Elementary School Science, Teaching of Social Science, Teaching of Homemaking, Teaching of Physical Education, Seminar in Elementary Education, Master's Degree Seminar, Guidance in Education, Business Organization, Development of Economic Thought the U. S. Colonial Period, and Seminar in Calif. History.

Due to a State regulation, the library fines this semester have been changed.

A charge of 25 cents for the first hour and 5 cents for each additional hour that the library is open will be made for overdue reserve books. Any student who takes a book that has been previously reserved by another student will be fined.

All other books may be borrowed for two weeks and may be renewed at the end of that time, if not in special demand. If books are not returned when due, a fine of 5 cents a day will be charged up to \$1.00 or the cost of the item if more than \$1.00. An additional charge of 25 cents may be made if the item is in great demand.

The charge for lost books and other items will be the cost of the item plus \$1.00.

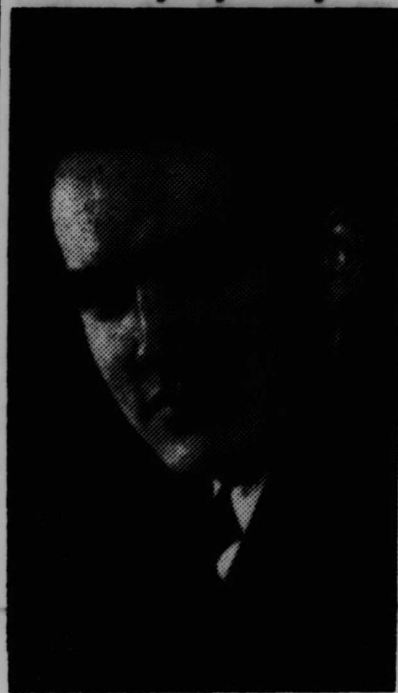

Linfield scored again early in the fourth quarter, and then added two points in the closing minutes of the game, when the Linfield defense trapped Dennis Kinser behind his own goal line.

## HSC Loses To Red Raiders In Oregon Tilt: 27 to 13

The Red Raiders of Southern Oregon started their march toward the Far Western Conference championship at Ashland Saturday night at the expense of the Humboldt State College Lumberjacks.

The Staetrs came back in the second half, but three first half touchdowns gave the Oregon team a 27 to 13 victory in the arc tilt.

The tricky Southern Oregon "Double T" proved virtually unstoppable during the first half, although the Humboldt line stopped their drives at times, the Lumberjacks could not stop the explosive distance running and passing attack.

The Oregon team scored its first touchdown midway through the first quarter on their concerted touchdown march of the half. Starting on their own 45, the Oregonites drove to the Humboldt 9 in short gaining plays. Foster passed to Gatlin to make the score Southern Oregon 6, Humboldt 0.

Two lightning like breakaway runs by Don Campbell, former Eureka high star, and Snuffy Smith added seven more points to the Red total. Campbell raced around end for 41 yards, and Smith spun through center for 21 and a touchdown on the next play. Jones kicked the conversion to make the score Southern Oregon 13, HSC 0.

A penalty on Humboldt at an inopportune time gave the Southern Oregon team another six points. Oliveira took a Humboldt punt on his own 17, but a penalty put the ball on the Humboldt 2, instead of the 31, where Oliveira had placed the ball. Wally Landis kicked out to the 45, from where Veentjer returned the ball to the 30. Foster passed to Smith for the touchdown, Jones again added the point. Score SO 20, HSC 0.

A lightning like pass to Eddie Oliveira from Kenny Dunaway gave Humboldt 50 yards and their first touchdown of the game midway through the third period. Viracola made the kick good, making the score read Southern Oregon 20, HSC 7.

The Red Raiders got the touchdown back in the fourth quarter,

practically with a ribbon around it. Smith intercepted an Oliveira pass and reutrned it to the Humboldt 32. Two penalties and several gains by Riggs put the ball on the Humboldt 4, from were Riggs cracked over for the touchdown.

Jerry Schroeder returned the kickoff 46 yards to the Southern Oregon 29, setting up the second Humboldt touchdown. Stoops passed to Schroeder on the one foot line, from where Ivancich skirted end for a touchdown, ending the scoring in the game.

## HSC Skiers Work On Lodge

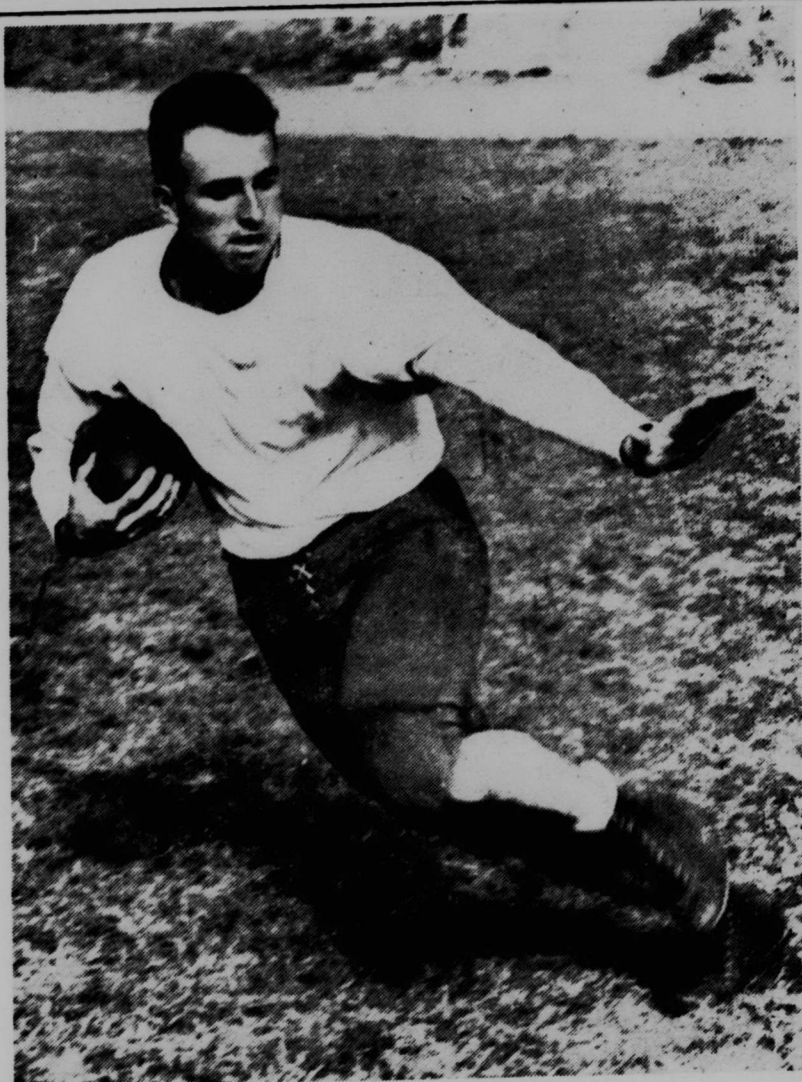
