WHAT DOES IT COST TO COME TO HUMBOLDT?

For a semester at HSC, the student must pay:

Registration fee \$6.50.
 Materials and service fee \$7.50.
 Student organization expenses (club dues, yearbook, hospitalization, physical education, alumni fees, etc.) \$25.00.

Books, paper, and supplies (approximately) \$15.00 to \$50.00.
 Board and room (per month: \$60 to \$72) total for semester \$278.00 to \$325.00.

Miscellaneous (Entertainment, laundry, cleaning, etc.) \$45.00 to \$112.50.

Grand total for semester \$377.00 to \$526.50.

This means that for a student who lives at home, his expenses for a year in College will cost him under two hundred dollars. If he boards on campus, it will cost him approximately one thousand dollars.

This is far below the national average. A recent study conducted by the New York Times reveals that the annual tuition fee for the undergraduate students for the fall semester of this school year averaged \$281. The larger and better known "name institutions" average between \$500 and \$600 per year for tuition and materials and services seem small indeed!

The same study reveals that the average college student this year will spend between \$1,500 and \$2,000 for his college education.

STATE COLLEGE PRESIDENTS TO CONFER HERE MAY 1 AND 2

The California state college presidents will hold their regular meeting at Humboldt State College on May 2 and 3. This is the first time that the presidents have met at Humboldt State College. The ten college presidents and the Chief of the Division of State Colleges, Dr. Aubrey A. Douglass, will remain here after their meeting is adjourned and will attend the inaugural ceremonies for Dr. Cornelius H. Siemens, HSC's fourth president.

The colleges and the presidents representing them include: Dr. Walter R. Hepner, president San Diego State College; Dr. P. Victor Peterson, president Long Beach State College; Dr. Howard McDonald, president Los Angeles State College of Applied Arts and Sciences; Dr. Arnold E. Joyal, president Fresno State College;

Mr. Julian McPhee, president California Polytechnic College; Dr. T. W. Mac Quarrie, president San Jose State College; Dr. J. Paul Leonard, president San Francisco State College; Dr. Guy A. West, president Sacramento State College; Dr. Glenn Kendall, president Chico State College; and Commodore Russell M. Ihrig, superintendent of the California Maritime Academy.

HSC Transfers Get High Grades

According to a report from HSC President C. H. Siemens, students who transfer from Humboldt State college to the University of California maintain high scholastic records.

The report indicated that of fifteen transfer students 87 percent made better than a C average. This group, which completed one year at U. C., June 1950, improved over the 1948-49 group of HSC transfers.

HSC also outranged transfers from junior colleges, state colleges and private colleges. Based upon an A grade being a 3, HSC transfers averaged 1.59 (B minus); junior college transfers, 1.22; state colleges, 1.32; and private colleges, 1.49.

Wildlife Students Work to Pay College Expenses

In a recent survey, Dr. Fred Glover, in charge of wildlife management, found that 53 percent of the students with wildlife majors are earning all or part of their way through college. There are 55 wildlife majors, excluding fisheries students, 29 of whom are working.

About 50 percent of the wild-lifers in senior standing are defraying college expenses by outside work. Seven percent earn 100 percent and 50 percent earn more than 30 percent in the junior class. About 15 percent earn more than 80 percent of college expenses in the sophomore standing and over 50 percent of the freshman students are earning at least 80 percent of college expenses. The higher number of freshmen working may be due to more non-veterans starting to college, Glover stated.

Listening Room Hours Scheduled

The new listening room is located across Plaza Avenue from Nelson hall and a schedule of times it is available for student use has been released by the music division.

The new hours are, Monday through Friday at noon, Tuesday and Thursday from 11 a. m. to 3 p. m., Tuesday evenings from 7 to 9. From 8:30 to 9:30 on Monday mornings and from 2 to 3 p. m. on Fridays is reserved for checking in and checking out records, Saturday from 10 a. m. to 12 noon is a free listening hour.

Students may bring their lunches to the room at noon and listen to the music while they eat. A bulletin board has been provided

Majority Votes No on Compulsory Student Body Cards

Sixty percent of the HSC students voted on a recent poll to find opinions about the proposed state legislation on compulsory student body cards voted negatively. Forty percent of the voters favored the bill. President C. H. Siemens took these figures to authorities in Sacramento last week.

Only 250 students cast votes for this poll. Another poll was taken after the assembly Wednesday, April 18, in which a debate on the question was held. The results of this last poll were not available at the time of this writing.

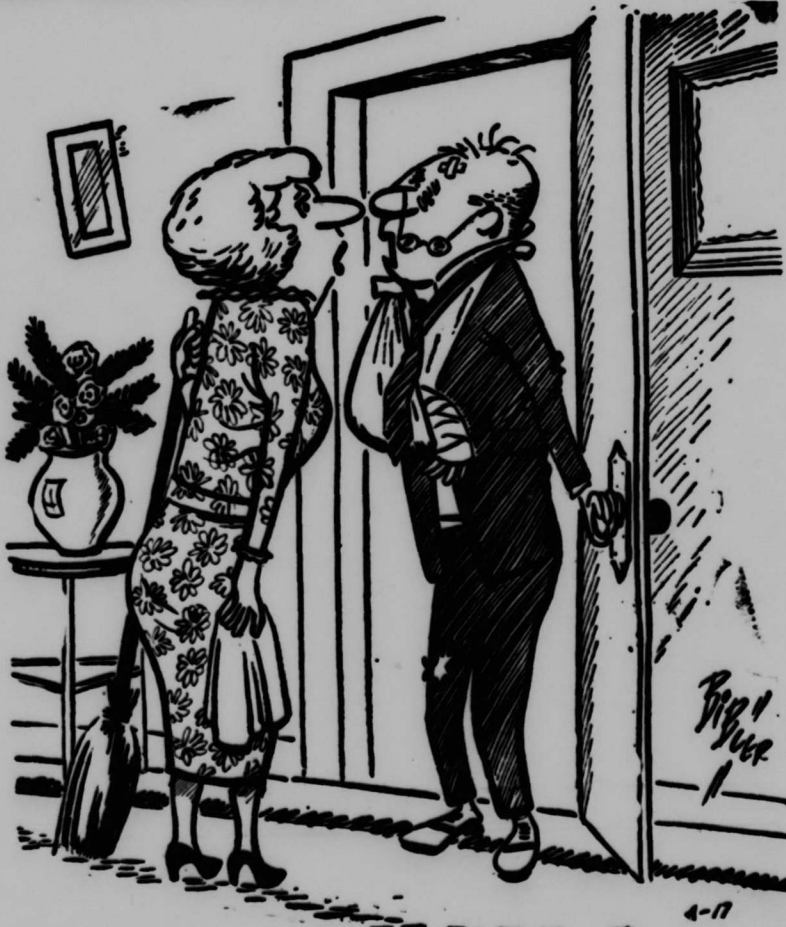

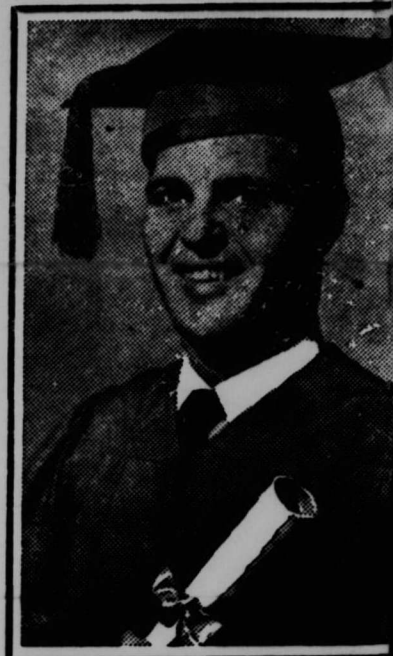

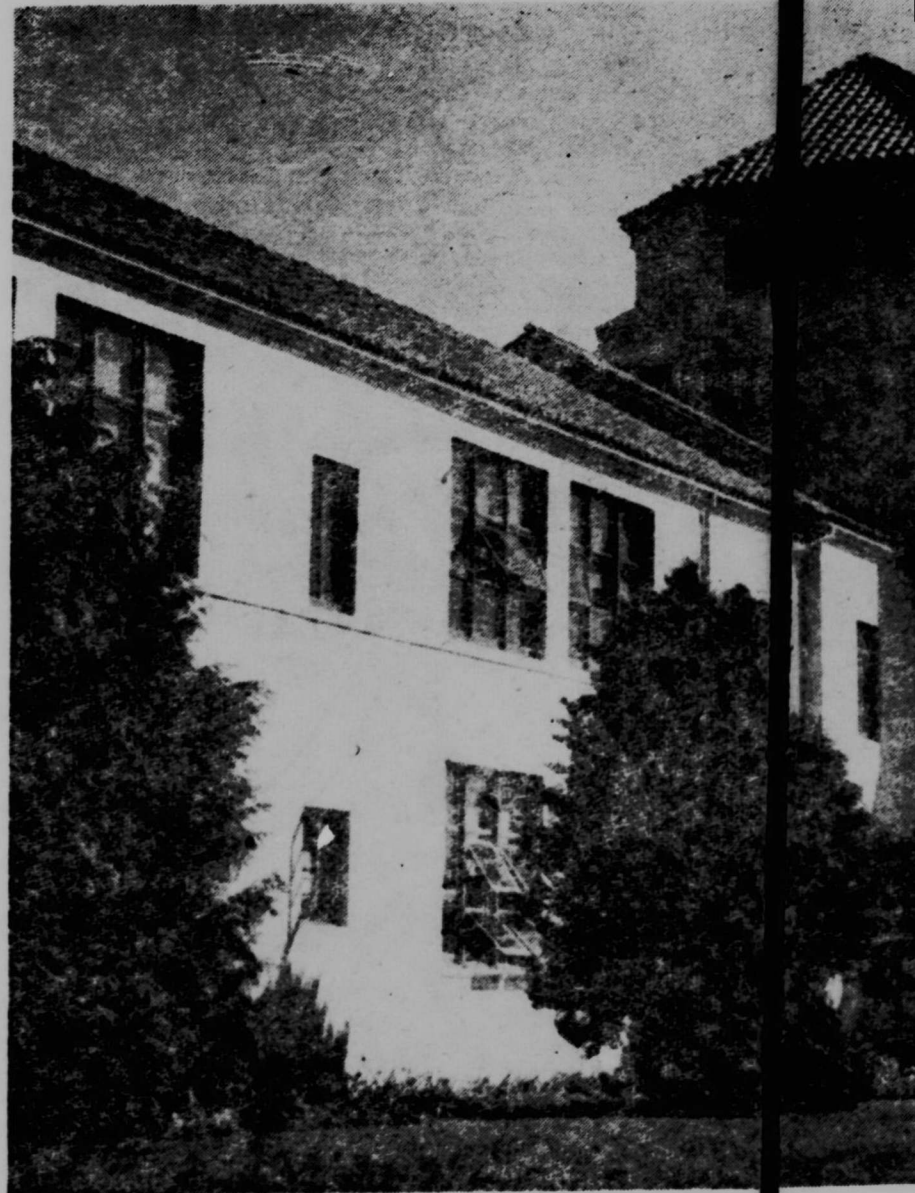


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Many Additions Plan

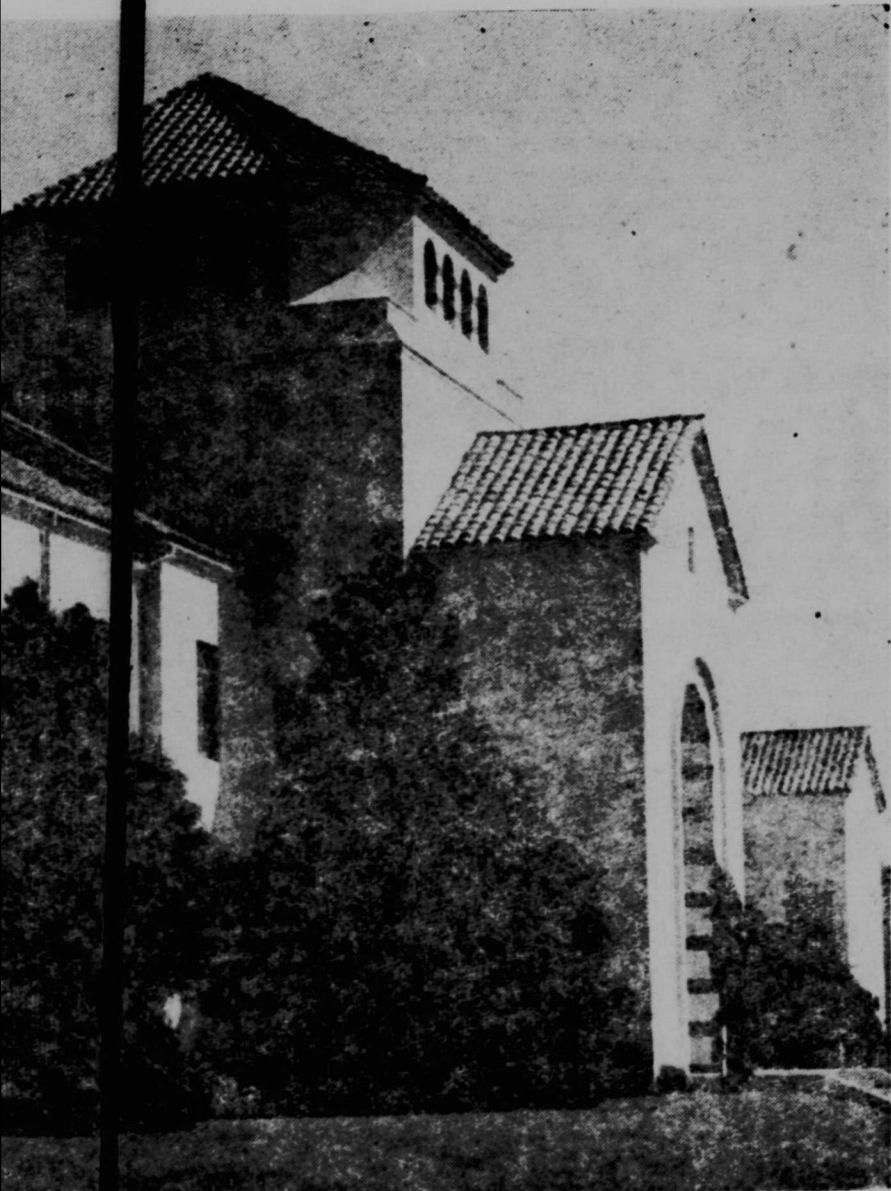

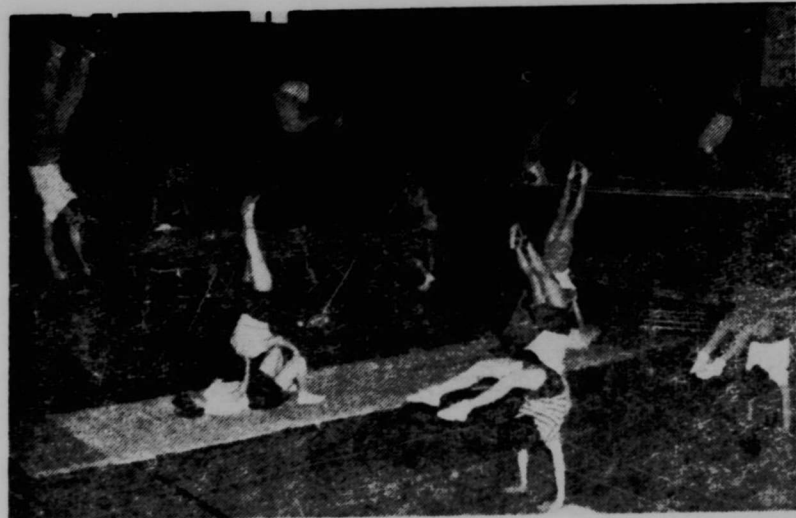

Five New Jobs Created for Humboldt Staff

Beginning next year, HSC will have an increased administrative staff equal to five positions. The present deans will be increased to full-time status and will be titled Dean of Instruction and Dean of Personnel. The chairmen of the five divisions, who heretofore have not been given time for their administrative duties, will be assigned part-time to the supervision of their departments. New appointments will include an Executive Dean (assistant to the president), a Coordinator of Terminal Education (part-time) and a Coordinator of the Summer Session (part-time).

All together the forty per cent increase in administrative personnel will permit the college to plan and carry out its program more effectively and completely than in the past, according to Dr. C. Siemens, president. The State has recognized the administrative needs at Humboldt and given it the same support, in this respect, as it has given to any other college.

Many Scholarships Given Students

Scholarships totaling \$3,565.00 have been awarded to students enrolled this year at Humboldt State college. Of this amount, \$3,240.00 comes from regularly established scholarships, and \$1,325 represents special grants given by local groups or by agencies in other parts of the country, the recipients of which have chosen HSC.

Many of the available scholarships are not open to entering students but are offered to sophomore, junior or senior students who meet the specific requirements set up by the donor for the particular award.

Application for a scholarship should be filed before June 1 with the registrar, according to Mrs. Myrtle M. McKittrick, registrar. Detailed information concerning the various awards available is given in the college catalogue.

In addition to scholarships, there are several loan funds which provide aid to deserving students under conditions prescribed by the donors. These funds are administered under the supervision of the State, and application is made through the office of the dean of students. Loans are not usually extended, except on a short-term, emergency basis, to lower division students.

There are also several prizes which have been established to encourage scholarship or to reward outstanding performance along academic lines. These prizes are listed in the college catalogue.

New Scholarships To be Offered

The Registrar's office announced that the Scholarships and Awards Committee will publish soon a list of available scholarships.

A special scholarship is being established for a woman student who has completed two year's nurse's training. Several new, unrestricted scholarships which do specify residence or status in high school or college are also being established.

The Committee, which is made up of Dr. Ivan C. Milhous, Miss Adella Johnson, Charles Fulkerson and Phil Sarboe, urges anyone interested in additional information to see any one of the members.

Mrs. Myrtle McKittrick, registrar, said that applications must be filed before May 1, and that no student would be considered unless he applied. All students who are qualified were urged by Mrs. McKittrick to apply.

Additional staff will include custodians, groundsman, a gardener, a stationary engineman, and an electrician. The new budget also calls for added equipment and machinery.

Scheduled for early construction is a new corporation house and yard in which will be centralized the maintenance and operational facilities, offices and equipment. The \$75,000.00 structure will be complete with power tools, offices, workshops and storage spaces. It will be located on level ground directly south of the new science building.

Fresh from their five-day road trip, the Humboldt State college baseball team will meet the Crescent City Merchants of the Southern Oregon league in the Arcata Ball Park this Sunday. Game time is 2 p. m.

In a previous meeting, the Lumberjacks dropped a 4 to 0 decision to the northerners, and will be anxious to gain revenge.

Among the Crescent City players are two faces very familiar to Humboldt State athletic fans—those of Chuck DeAutremont and Tex Gatlin. As Southern Oregon stars, they were responsible for several close wins over Humboldt. As members of the Crescent City squad, they were largely responsible for that 4-0 win.

One of Humboldt's top three pitchers will probably start again at the northerners, with Wally Maciel probably due to get the nod against the home folks. Ben Henke or Ken Dunaway may also see action.

Coach Phil Sarboe will depend on the same lineup that he used on the road trip: Dick Oliver, ss; Ben Henke, cf; Jim Gillogly, 2b; Dave Dana, c; Jack Fiskness, 1b; Ken Dunaway, 1f; either Jerry Zattola or Dale Sorenson, rf; Don Flemming, 3b; and Maciel pitcher. If either Dunaway or Zattola pitch, both Zattola and Sorenson will be in the outfield.

Despite Wally Maciel's brilliant two-hit pitching, San Francisco State College came from behind in the last inning to defeat Humboldt State College 5-4, in the second game of the Far-Western Conference double header here today. The Gaters took the first victory on a three-run rally in the last inning 7-6.

Maciel kept himself in hot water with his lack of control, although his team mates played errorless ball behind him. A perfect squeeze bunt brought in the final game, but three walks in the final inning proved to be the difference. The time run scored when the umpire called interference on catcher Dave Dana when he brushed the batter while attempting to field a bunt. A near riot ensued when Dana protested to the umpire and San Francisco protested the protestation. The ruckus ended with Dana being heaved out of the game.

The Lumberjacks, with the first game seemingly won with a 6-4 lead in the final inning and Bob Kezely pitching good ball, the Gaters, who had only four hits in the beginning of the inning, came through with four more singles. All the runs were scored after Kezely had two outs and two strikes on the batter. A three-run uprising in the first inning had given the Humboldters a lead they relinquished only in the final stanza. Triples by Ken Dunaway and Dave Dana were the big blows of the rally. Jim Gillogly, Humboldt end fielder, led the hitting in the double header, smacking four hits in eight tries. Dale Sorenson and Don Flemming each got two hits in the nightcap.

In Davis on Friday afternoon, the Humboldters dropped their first game of the season by a 9-6 battle. They collapsed completely in the searing heat to lose 21-0. Bob Kezely made two relief performances, turning in a good job in each; but the last of the Humboldt pitching staff was greeted with joyful cries by the Aggie batting list.

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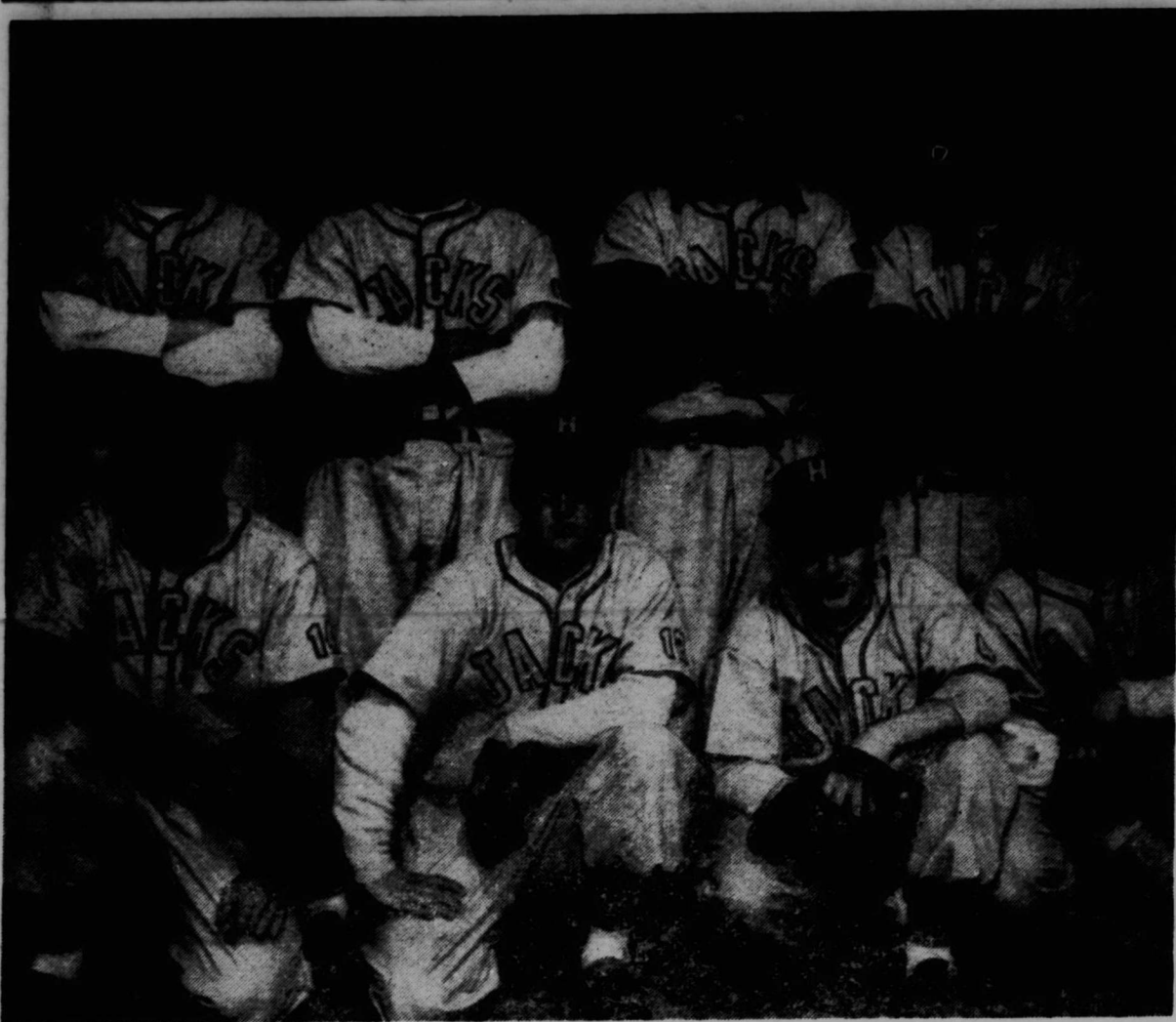
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Crabs Nip Lumberjacks in Final Inning

WHAT HIGH SCHOOL COURSES SHOULD I HAVE TAKEN?

A high school student who looks forward to attending Humboldt State College should take a well-rounded course during his four years in high school. By so doing, he will acquire a good background for more advanced studies; and he will discover and develop special fields of interest and talent, so that he will be better able to plan his college program.

Excellence in English is important! Words are tools that find constant use. Any good workman sees to it that he is equipped for his job with the best tools he can obtain. The high school student who expects to attend college should take his English work very seriously. It will pay dividends later on.

Elementary algebra and plane geometry are not required for admission—but if not taken in high school, they must be taken in college (without credit) before a degree can be obtained.

Students interested in engineering, should take at least three years of mathematics, chemistry, physics, and mechanical drawing.

Pre-nursing students should be sure to take chemistry in high school.

Prospective teachers should take a variety of courses, including mathematics, science, foreign language, social sciences, and some exploratory courses in fields of art, music, commerce, shop, or home economics, to develop skills and interests.

Pre-medical students should take as much foreign language as possible (preferably Latin and a modern language), plus chemistry, physics, mathematics, English, and other "college preparatory" courses.

Students interested in wildlife management, forestry, pharmacy, business administration and many other vocational fields would be wise to take advanced algebra and possibly trigonometry in high school.

Quality of work is, however, even more important than the choice of subjects.

Humboldt Bops Eureka High, 12-1

Piling up 14 hits and 12 runs, Humboldt State's baseballers downed Eureka high 12-1 in a practice game in Eureka's Albee Stadium last Thursday.

Bob Kezelsky scattered eight hits in five innings for Humboldt, allowing one run. Ben Henke pitched three runless-hitless innings, while Bob Matthews finished up, striking out two of the three men he faced in the final inning.

Eureka high pitcher Art Tosten held the Lumberjacks to a respectable margin for the first three innings, but the Lumberjacks got two runs in the fourth one more in the sixth and another in the seventh to build up a commanding 6 to 1 lead before Larry Paynter went to the mound and allowed 6 more runs for Humboldt.

Scuttled by Chuck DeAutremont's two hits in three trips, Humboldt State's baseballers dropped a 4 to 0 game to the Crescent City merchants on April 1 in Crescent City.

Tex Gatlin, another Humboldt nemesis from Southern Oregon, went the route for the northerners, scattering five hits, although Crescent City could only get four off of three Humboldt pitchers in a mound duel.

Crescent City bunched three of their four hits in the third inning for the game's deciding two run rally. Bud Pyke popped a Texas leaguer into left field for the first hit, and was followed by a scratch infield hit by Sonny May. DeAutremont stepped to the plate and singled to left-center for the winning runs.

Ben Henke and Ken Dunaway pitched the final five innings for Humboldt, giving up no hits. Henke faced only nine men in his three-inning stint, while Dunaway was wild and allowed two runs on a walk, two hit batters, and an error.

DeAutremont was the only player to get more than one hit in the game. No extra-base blows were recorded.

Scuttled by their own over-anxiousness to win, Humboldt State college's baseballers dropped a 5-4 decision to the semi-pro Humboldt Crabs in the Arcata Ball Park on April 8.

Humboldt, although out-hit 11 to 5 by the semi-pros, was very much in the game all the way, holding a 4 to 2 lead going into the last half of the ninth inning.

Two hits and two costly errors, when coupled with a walk, produced three runs for the Crabs to win the ball game. Norby Paynter, old-time ball player who played with the San Francisco Seals of the Pacific Coast league in 1925, knocked in the tying and winning runs with a single.

Little Wally Maciel went all the way for the Lumberjacks, holding the Crabs well under control until the eighth and ninth innings, when he tired. Maciel was the first Humboldt State pitcher to go the distance this season.

The Crabs scored first, picking up a run in the first inning when Micheli walked, went to third on Del Grande's double, and scored on an infield out.

From there on, the pitchers held complete sway. It was the fifth inning before another score crossed the plate—the tying run.

Don Flemming set up the Lumberjacks score by smashing a liner down the first base line for a triple. An infield error allowed him to score, tying up the game.

Two walks and a single by Dale Sorenson scored the go-ahead run for the Lumberjacks in the following inning.

The Crabs came back with a single tally in the seventh inning to tie the score again. A fielders choice, two errors and Ric Pastori's single produced the score.

Humboldt went ahead again in the eighth inning when a single and two errors filled the bases with none out. Dale Sorenson knocked a towering fly to left field to score one run and a passed ball produced another tally.

Humboldt threatened again in the top of the ninth, when Crab pitcher Russ Hagen walked the bases full, but escaped without damage.

Don Flemming lashed a triple and a single in four trips to lead the hitting for Humboldt. Carl Del Grande, with a double and a single in two trips and Ric Pastori, with two singles in four tries, led the Crabs.

Bob Piersall started on the mound for the Crabs, lefthanding two hits and one run in five innings. George Gruell followed for three stanzas, being charged with three runs, while Russ Hagen hurled the final heat.

If Rich Harris, senior veteran, can find time for track, the green and gold may come up with a double winner. Harris has bettered FWC meet distances in both the shot put and the discus.

More candidates will be surveyed this Friday when an inter-class meet will be held under the direction of Coach Jack Whetstone. Other handicap meets are being planned with local high school teams.

WHO CAN ENTER HUMBOLDT STATE

If you are a graduate of an accredited high school—or

If you are an honorably discharged veteran with a record of at least three months of service in the armed forces of the United States—or

If you are over twenty-one years of age—you are eligible for admission to Humboldt State College. Evidence must be presented showing fitness to profit by college instruction, as indicated by previous scholastic records, evidence of good moral characters, and by a satisfactory score on the college aptitude test. Once admitted, students must meet the scholarship standards prescribed by the faculty if they wish to remain in the College.

To enter Humboldt State College, the prospective student should:

1. Have complete, original, official transcripts sent to the Office of the Registrar covering all high school and college work previously undertaken. These transcripts must indicate honorable dismissal from the last college attended. Transfers from other colleges will seldom be admitted unless their transcripts show work of a "C" average or better.

2. File an application blank which will be supplied by the Registrar's office.

3. Enclose a check for \$2.00 if any previous college work has been taken. (No fee is required for students who have had only high school work).

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
