Advanced Wildlifers Make Field Trip To Northern California

During the vacation between semesters, eight upper division wildlife students and their instructor, Dr. Fred Glover, took an extended field trip to several points of interest in northern California. Students who accompanied Glover on the trip are Earl Lauppe, Ned Dollahite, Morris Anderson, Ken Teberg, Tom Kilduff, Bill Monroe, Wes Fleming and Gene Evans.

The group left Jan. 23, just after they had finished their final examinations. Several stops were made enroute to Redding, one of them at Shasta Dam.

As part of the trip they visited the Mount Shasta Fish Hatchery where they observed trout eggs in various stages of development, different types of rearing ponds, brood fish and hatchery equipment. They saw the Tule Lake Federal Waterfowl Refuge and the Lower Klamath Federal Waterfowl Refuge.

Movies were taken by members of the group for use in the future. The movies will be used for educational and recruiting purposes.

Mac Foster, State Refuge Manager at Honey Lake, provided a tour of a developing waterfowl refuge. Several HSC students have worked on this refuge during the past summers. On Grey Lodge Refuge they met former HSC student Albert Naylor, who is now with the California Division of Fish and Game. Naylor took them for a walk around the refuge and showed them his duck traps and banding procedure.

The Wildlifers arrived back in Humboldt County Jan. 30.

March 30 and 31 are the dates set for high school representatives from schools in Humboldt and Del Norte counties and local adults interested in the youth welfare program to converge on Humboldt State for the annual

state officials as well as representatives from many western college and universities would participate in the ceremonies.

Price Reduced To \$8.50 Now

Going all-out in a campaign to make more Humboldt students buy Student Body Cards, the ASB council has reduced the price of the cards from \$12.50 to \$8.50. In the first few days of the drive thirty students bought cards under the new plan.

The student council cites the fact that although buying a student body card is not mandatory in California state colleges, every other state college has a higher percentage of student body members than does Humboldt State. Statistics from other colleges show 92 percent at Chico State, 95 percent at Cal Poly, 97 percent at Fresno State, 92 percent at San Jose State, 66 percent at Sacramento State, 65 percent at San Diego State and 50 percent at San Francisco State compared to Humboldt's 45 percent at the last tally.

The council also points out that each student actually derives a benefit of \$22 from his card, figuring the total student body expenditures and dividing them by the number of students. The new rate for the cards is \$8.50 with only \$1.00 necessary for a down-payment. Those students who have already bought their cards for the former price will receive \$4.00 back if this plan goes through.

Ten percent discounts, a plan completed through the efforts of the Greater Humboldt Committee, are given to student body card holders at the Minor Theatre, Plaza Shoe Shop, Jack Cyn Acres and Redwood Studios in Arcata; the Bel-Aire theatre in Bayside; and Sally's Dress Shop and Kines' Shoe Shop in Eureka.

Other than the discounts they list advantages offered to members of the ASB:

1. A right to vote and exercise influence in student affairs.

2. Participation in such school activities as basketball, volleyball or intermural sports.

3. Various social functions sponsored by the Student Body such as dances and play day.

4. The services of the Health Unit plus five days hospitalization which is paid for by student funds.

5. Free mimeograph work for individuals, clubs and organizations.

6. Free bookkeeping for clubs and organizations.

7. Discounts at games and dances.

The council states it will print names if necessary of those who do not own cards. ASB President Merwyn Rickey urges all students to hurry and take advantage to this opportunity before March 2, the day the drive ends.

Air Force Officers Here March 7, 8

An Air Force officer team will arrive here March 7 and 8 to interview college men and women interested in careers as officers in the United States Air Force.

The visit to Humboldt State College is part of a nationwide program being conducted by the Air Force to build up an officer corps composed in large part of college graduates, said Major F. J. McCarthy, here to make ad-

vance arrangements.

Students will have opportunity, he said, to learn about the various officer training programs, the requirements and processing procedure. Those qualified may submit applications and be examined by the Air Force officer team so that they can begin training soon after they finish college.

The team members, with local headquarters at the Social Unit in the main building, will explain three types of training: Aviation Cadet Pilot Training, Aviation Cadet Navigator Training, and Air Force Officer Candidate School.

One of the places visited on the five day journey was the Savage Rapids on the Rogue River. Copco Dam and the egg taking station at Fall River were also visited in this phase of the trip.

At Stream Improvement Headquarters in Yreka the caravan was shown the various improvements in fish screens and also some of the latest innovations in fish migration.

The highlight of the tour was the trip to Shasta Dam, which included an escorted trip through the dam and a boat trip on Shasta Lake. Here they saw the Keswick Dam fish trap, located below Shasta and serving a regulatory function for Shasta's discharge.

The group also traveled to Clear Lake and to the Snow Mountain egg taking station on the Eel river.

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IT SAYS HERE

..... in fine print

About a year ago in this column, we took what we thought was a pretty hefty swing at an official of the Far Western Conference, namely Mackay Martin, the conference statistician. The occasion was the cockeyed system of scheduling used by the conference, and also the balled-up scoring system. This was when Bob Marsh was leading the Far Western Conference with something like a 16 point average, but ranked below lesser lights because other schools played more games, and thus other players could score less points per game, and still come up with a larger total.

Evidently it hasn't done any good, for the same old shenanigans are still being pulled, apparently without even protest from the rest of the conference. Humboldt has another high scorer in Ken Dunaway, who had averaged 16.3 points per game coming into the Chico series.

And where did Martin rank him in his official release? — you guessed it — ninth, despite the fact that only two players have higher averages.

For the past two years, the Far Western conference has awarded its championship on a percentage basis. Yet, Martin STILL hasn't changed his scoring system to take this into account. He is still scoring on a total point basis, despite the fact that some schools may play as much as four to six games more than other schools.

— This is fine with Martin, apparently. We're wondering if the reason could be that Chico plays more games than anyone in the conference, thus making the old alma mammy look good with two or three players on the top ten in scoring.

The scoring championship is hardly a matter to start a revolution over, yet, with the all-conference team being set up the way it is, this may be Kenny's only honor to show for four years of basketball.

But the thing that makes the whole affair so incongruous is the fact that it could easily and simply be changed to suit everyone in the conference. Martin could change it himself without even resorting to the conference, if he wanted to.

Or, the matter could be brought up for a vote at the conference meeting, and changed, thus forcing Martin to equalize the scoring race. In fact, it WAS brought up at the last conference meeting — and promptly tabled, why we couldn't guess. Maybe Chico or someone of the other conference members likes the set-up the way it is.

As the matter now stands, the scoring will continue to be decided on a total-point basis. The fact that no self-respecting high school league would tolerate this situation for even one season notwithstanding — Mackay G Martin is still plowing doggedly along the same unfair rut he started years ago.

On a less bitter note, we'd like to welcome Phil Sarboe to Humboldt State College, and to his enormous job of building Humboldt's football fortunes back to where they were under Charley Erb.

The comparison between Erb and Sarboe could mean good footballing for future HSC teams. Erb was the last and only other ex-PCC coach to come to Humboldt, and the teams he turned out are still being discussed among local football filberts.

But first, and not quite so enormous, Sarboe has a little thing called baseball to coach, and surprisingly enough, he could easily start out his HSC career on a winning note here — the first Lumberjack coach in many a moon to do so.

For the Lumberjack baseballers are a promising lot, on the whole. Last year's team finished third and made a gallant try for second last season, and five first stringers and one pitcher are still here.

If Sarboe can come up with some adequate reserves, one or two more pitchers and a first-baseman, the outlook could be extremely rosy for the Lumberjacks.

The rest of the Far Western Conference is in just so-so shape for baseball, off last year's returnees. San Francisco State and Chico share the most returning lettermen, and Chico lost the combo that eked out a double win over Humboldt last season — Dale Larrabee and Mel Dalrymple. All Larrabee did was pitch and win one game against Humboldt, catch another, play the outfield in two others and hit a home run so far that it would have taken radar to find the ball. Dalrymple merely pitched in both ends of a doubleheader, winning the first on a six-hitter and relieving in the ninth to save the other one from Humboldt.

The Wildcats still possess the Terrible Swede — Lyle Olsen who once hit four homers in one game, but not against Humboldt, but his supporting cast is such that Chico will have a tough time repeating.

Dunaway Tops Humboldt State Scoring Parade

Humboldt State's ace forward Ken Dunaway held a commanding lead over all other Humboldt State players in the scoring race in ten collegiate games going into the Cal Aggie series.

compiled a 5 point average in 6 collegiate games.

Chico State Takes Two From Humboldt

Humboldt put on its strongest scoring of the year in Far Western Conference play in the Friday night contest, but fell behind too far at the start and Chico maintained a ten-point lead all the way through the contest.

Led by Ken Dunaway and Dick Oliver, the Lumberjacks narrowed the gap to 31 to 27 at one point, but Chico pulled back ahead to take a 41 to 31 halftime lead.

Humboldt made another bid in the second half when Bill Goetz, who put on the best performance of his college career, and Dunaway pulled the Lumberjacks to within six points, only to see Chico spurt out in front again. Butler led the scoring in the contest with 29 points. Ken Dunaway scored 21 for Humboldt.

Chico led all the way Saturday night, taking advantage of Humboldt's inability to hit their shots and took an easy victory, vaulting back into a tie with Southern Oregon for second place in the Far Western conference by doing so.
