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Road Show A Crew Returns; Tells Success Story of Trip

Stories of "tremendous success" and fine cooperation on the part of the cast returned to Arcata with the Greater Humboldt Committee Road Show A last Friday evening. Dr. Don Karshner, who was in charge of the show, was enthusiastic about the response at all of the 18 high schools and junior colleges at which the show appeared.

The HSC group appeared before an estimated 7,000 people during the entire trip. The hit schools from Leggett Valley to Vallejo and back through Fort Bragg. Some schools had student bodies of less than 50 students. At these schools townspeople were invited to attend the show.

Dr. Karshner reported the show got "terrific" publicity all the way. Pictures of Carol Beck and Merwyn Rickey, who acted in the one-act play, appeared in several newspapers.

GIVES AUTOGRAPHS

At some schools, according to Dr. Karshner, the cast was swarmed after the show with students seeking autographs. "They seemed to think us as movie actors", said one of the members of the cast.

Dale Ingvardson's accordion playing was particularly well received, Karshner noted. As some schools his performance was interrupted by a burst of spontaneous applause. The two "pests", Anne Loeb and Pat Spellenberg, using local names were highly entertaining.

Dr. Ivan Milhous and Charlotte Marks, chairman of the Greater Humboldt Committee, toured with the show to give brief talks afterwards to juniors and seniors. They talked about the advantages of attending college at Humboldt State. Dr. Milhous asked students who were interested in coming to HSC to fill out cards. He collected some 200 of these cards.

An anecdote Milhous tells of the trip occurred in Vallejo where high school principal asked him how such a trip was financed. Milhous replied that the students were paying their own expenses. The principal was so astonished at the school spirit these students demonstrated, he said he would recommend Humboldt State to his students.

The Arcata Chamber of Commerce provided printed programs for the show. Issues of the LUMBERJACK were also distributed to high school students.

Road Show B will start its tour of local high schools immediately after Easter vacation.

It was also stated that the group was contemplating new uniforms for the band for next year.

President Siemens informed the A. S. B. council that the advisory board would be interested in three other divisions of the college's activities. These three are: community cultural activity, such as the choir tour; dramatic performances, lecturers and conventions; college public relations, such as student recruitment; scholarships.

In closing, Dr. Siemens told the A. S. B. council that the advisory board was exceedingly interested in the college and that it would work in full cooperation with school.

Humboldt Attracts Many Students From Out of State

During the fall semester at Humboldt State College many students from counties and states away from Humboldt were enrolled.

Mrs. Myrtle McKittrick, college registrar, this week pointed out that 29 percent or 162 students were out-of-county residents. Los Angeles, Del Norte, Alameda, and Mendocino counties send many students to Humboldt each year. Eighteen students come from out of state, from Connecticut, Idaho, Minnesota, Missouri, Oregon, Texas, Washington, and Wisconsin. Two students come from Hawaii, two from the Samoan Islands, and one from Germany.

However, Mrs. McKittrick said that most of the HSC students come from Humboldt County.

Within the county Arcata supplied 25 percent or 154 students, Eureka 33 percent or 204 students, Fortuna, Ferndale, Samoa, Blue Lake, Trinidad, Garberville, Orick and other areas furnished 16.1 percent or 99 students.

In all there were represented on the HSC campus last semester representatives of nine states 39 California counties, two territories, and 1 foreign country.
