

A - Cappella Choir Plans Presentation Of Home Concert

The College A Cappella Choir will present its seventh annual home concert Sunday at 3:30 in the HSC auditorium. Mr. Leland Barlow, professor of music, will conduct the group in a wide variety of musical compositions, classical, traditional, folk and modern.

For their program the choir will sing the following: "Exultate Deo" by Palestrina; "O God Thou Faithful God" by Brahms-Douglas; "Advent Motet" by Schreck; "Salvation Is Created" by Tschernokoff; "Let Us Break Bread Together" arranged by Montague.

THE MADRIGAL SINGERS will sing seven selections. Members of the group are Mary Bowersox, Darlene Miller, Marilyn Raglin, sopranos; Betty Everett, Nadine Lozensky, Yvonne Morrison, altos; Earl Rumble, Edward Solenberger, William Tuttle, tenors; Leland Barlow and Jerry Beck, basses. Ten students and Mr. Barlow comprise this group.

The group will sing: "Sing, All Men," arranged by Niles; "Adamus Te, Christe" by Mozart; "Angler's Song" by Lawes; "Fair Phyllis I Saw" by Farmer; "The Dove's Message," "The Fickle Sweetheart" and "The Witch" all by Martina.

TO CONCLUDE the afternoon program the choir will sing "Song Afar" by Bull; "When I Know What You Know" by Lachner; "Black Is the Color of My True Love's Hair," arranged by Churchill; "Christopher Robin" by Fraser-Simon-Gray; "O, No, John," arranged by Thiman.

Admission to the concert is 75 cents for adults, 50 cents for students, and student body cardholders admitted free of charge.

Mr. Barlow graduated from the Oberlin Conservatory of Music and completed his Master's Degree at Iowa State University. He came to the College to direct the choir in 1946.

The HSC choir of 36 voices recently returned from a one-week tour of the bay area and Lake County. They made 14 appearances and sang for approximately 4000 persons.

Other officers elected for the spring semester were Bill Glover, vice-duke; Bruce Sweet, chapter host and expansion officer; Frank Zak, knight of armor.

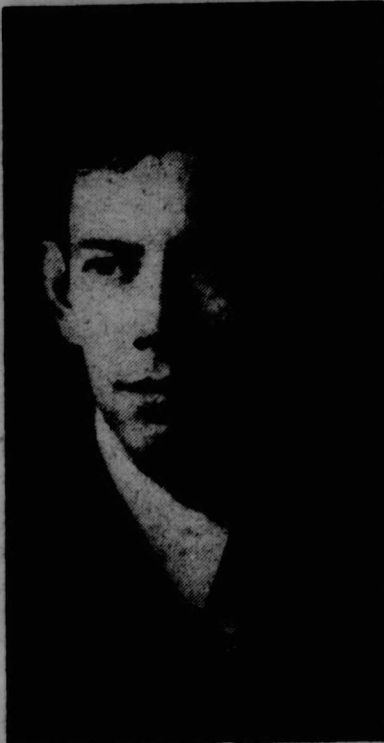

Council Rejects Measure To Lift Coop Controls

Alternative Motion Releases Lumberjack Distribution; Students No Longer To Show Student Body Cards

Dropping the issue like a hot potato, the Executive Student Council by-passed with a near unanimous vote a motion containing a resolution to halt Student Benefit Plan controls on Coop fountain prices, approving instead an alternative motion to release the Lumberjack from circulation restrictions. The action took place at the weekly meeting held Tuesday night in the Radio Hut.

As a result of the decision, students may now secure copies of the Lumberjack without showing their ASB cards as was previously stipulated. However, the solution to the more controversial Coop dual-price system, submitted by Student Body President Richard Harmer as the second part of a proposition aimed at reducing dissension among the students was turned down by the Council with a single opposing vote.

One member of the Council, who declined use of identification, stated in defense of the decision, "We felt that the dual-price system issue called for a more thorough consideration of the proposition." It was added that the Council seemed to be in favor of the plan now in use but was seeking a way of administration that would be less controversial.

A suggestion that ASB cards be required for presentation every ten days was followed by another stating that strict enforcement of the Student Benefit Plan be followed the first two weeks of each semester.

The problem will again be discussed at the next meeting of the Council.

According to Harmer, the two-price system, involving higher prices for non-student body card holders than for student body members, has caused too much dissension among the students. He stated that he would continue to fight for removal of card restrictions in the Coop.

Disposing of a third controversial item on the agenda, the Council threw out a proposed measure to close the Coop during assembly hours. It was the consensus of the group that if approved, this policy would harm assembly attendance rather than promote it.

April 11 is the date set for the annual playday sponsored by the Women's Athletic Association. Girls from Arcata, Eureka, Fortuna, Ferndale, South Fork, Hoopa and Del Norte High Schools will be invited up to the college for a day of games and fellowship.

CU Brings Natural Resources From Textbooks to Classes

Many experts in the field of wildlife feel that subjects about conservation of our natural resources must be taken from the dusty, little-read textbook on the shelf, and made a part of our every day living.

In the immediate area Conservation Unlimited has made it a club project to bring the fascinating subject of wildlife and its conservation into the classrooms and club meetings of all age groups.

A series of Kodachrome slides, Wildlife Series No. 1, has been shown to both grade school students and a group of sportsmen and teachers. Series 1 was arranged to show animal life histories, habits and conservation, and when shown to the adult groups a request was made for more showings of the same type. As the adults have reported back to their various groups, many more requests have been received for these slides to be shown to sportsmen's groups and schools.

Where these slides have been shown in the grade schools the children have responded with gratifying enthusiasm in preparing wildlife notebooks and various projects, wildlifer Jim Yoakum reports. Yoakum is one of twelve wildlife students showing these slides.

"If this interest by children can be sustained with further illustrated talks, conservation will become as much a natural habit as eating and breathing. In all - a challenging project!" says Jerry Cummings, another student on the wildlife project.

HOPES HIGH AGAIN

Sept. 29, 1932

"Due to the increase in attendance at Humboldt, it may be necessary to ask freshmen to use the College Commons to do their studying."

"It is probable that freshmen have more text book assignments than the other classes and hence might have less need to use reference books."

March 15, 1934

"Humboldt State will play its first collegiate baseball game on March 28, when they meet San Francisco State nine in the bay city. Plans are being made to line up several other games for that week so the team may spend a week in the bay area."

Nov. 6, 1940

President Arthur S. Gist's new Buick sedan which he had only a few days, was stolen from his garage some time Monday night, probably during the wind storm, as no unusual noises were heard. Just before the Lumberjack went to press, it was reported that the car was found in Eureka.

Oct. 1, 1926

Thirteen members of the HSTC football team were declared ineligible because of scholastic standing and cannot participate in sports for six weeks. Thus the HSTC football team was disbanded, as there were only six men to compete.

This was the result of a faculty ruling adopted last spring, that students must be doing passing work in no less than 10 units before participants in extra-mural activities is permitted.

Oct. 30, 1946

"The new men's dorm is rapidly nearing completion and will be ready for occupancy about Dec. 1. The dorm will be able to accommodate 70 students."

Oct. 18, 1950

"The enrollment took a plunge this year. Total students enrolled at HSC is 621, a drop of 135 students from last year. The total number of students who belong to the associated student body is 368."

HSC, Wildcats Split; Raiders Beat Aggies

The Far Western Conference basketball race was thrown into a three-way tie last week-end when the Jacks split with the Chico State Wildcats, winning 66-65 and losing 77-61. Southern Oregon won two from Cal Aggies 60-57 and 68-64 in the other conference games to move the Raiders into a tie with Chico and HSC for first place.

FRESHMAN FORWARD George Ibarreta turned apparent defeat into victory as he canned the winning field goal with five seconds remaining in the game, with the Jacks behind 65-64.

Pollard led the Jacks in scoring with 18 as well as putting on a great defensive show holding high scoring Maderos to his lowest mark for the season, 17 points. Myers, who dominated the boards, hit for 15 and Chuck Perry, a recent addition to the squad, connected for 11. Ceaglio led the losers with 19 points.

Wildcats Take Second

The second game found high-scoring Maderos hot and the whole Jack team as cold as a Californian in a Greenland blizzard.

The Raiders are currently tied with the Jacks and Chico State for first place. The games this week-end will decide the conference champions since Cal Aggies meet Chico in two games also.

Raider Coach Ted Schopf will floor a squad of mostly freshmen with juniors Ken Kimura and Leon Keefe forming the nucleus.

Keefe is the mainstay of the squad at his center position and is a threat on both rebounds and in the scoring department. Kimura will serve as their floor captain in respect for his two years of varsity experience. He was also selected honorable mention on the Far Western Conference all-star team last year.

Others who will see action are Ernest Brestzel, Jerry Erickson, Bob Gouley, Ron Hartley, Lloyd Hoffine, Jack Kennett, Bill Hollingsworth, John Johnson, Harold Titus and Bob Smith.

Mr. Sarboe also announced that a series has been agreed upon between the College athletic department and officials at San Francisco State.

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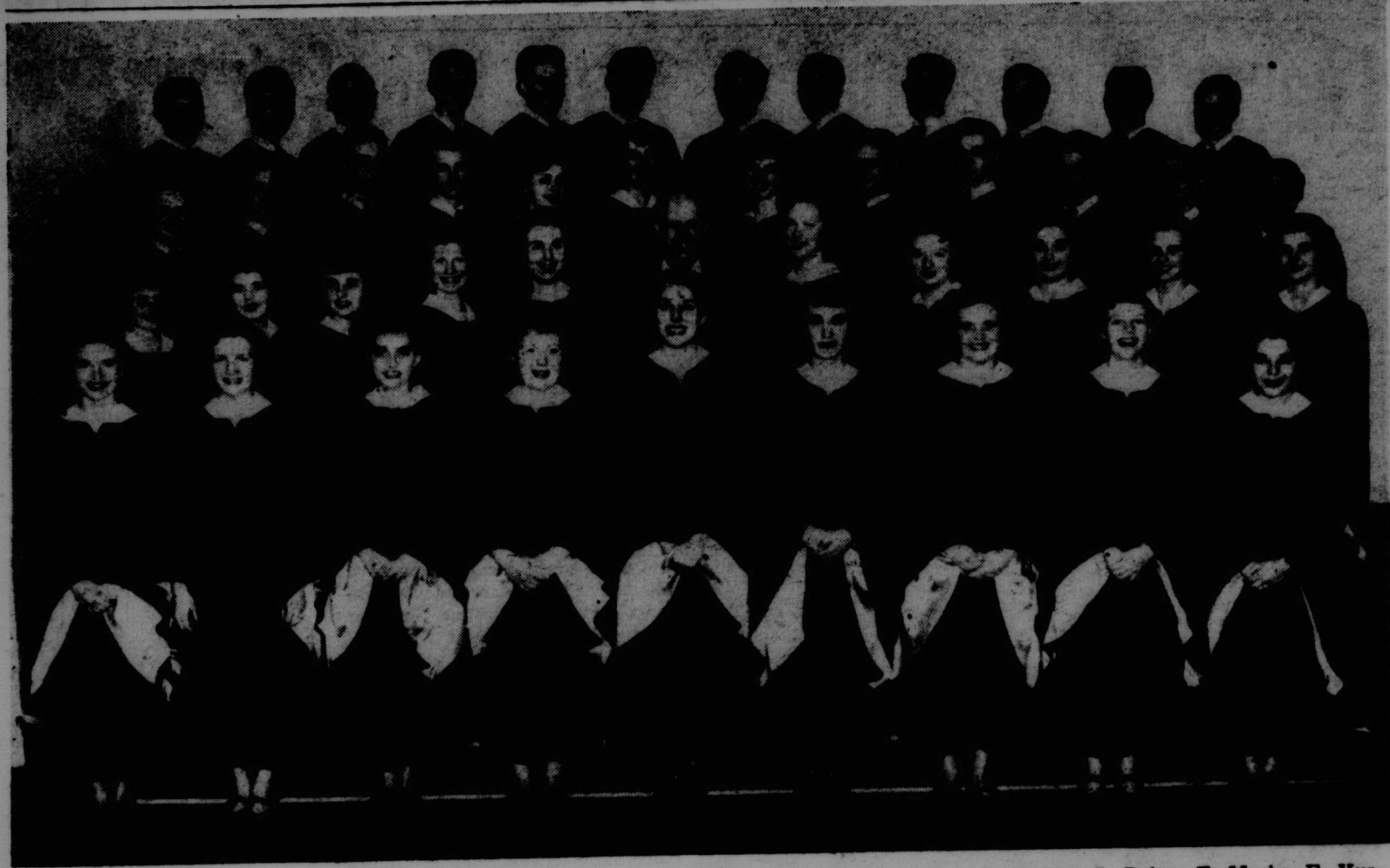

Library To Equal Others in State

The College, according to present expansion plans, is to have a library comparable to the better small colleges in the state.

The main floor or second story will include the men's reading room, administrative offices, and work room. The work room is designed for the faculty and graduate students. It is to be equipped with 10 desks and book stacks. These books will be available to all the students, not to just a few, as is too often the case at other institutions.

The first floor will house the audio-visual room. It will seat 60 persons and plans call for upholstered folding chairs, a phonograph and records for music appreciation courses. It will also be used for lectures, meetings and art exhibits.

The new library will be dedicated May 15. Construction cost has been estimated at approximately \$140,000.
