Mel Schuler's Art Work On Display In Libe Monday

A special exhibit of 12 drawings by Melvin A. Schuler, associate professor of art on sabbatical leave in Europe this year, will open Monday, December 12, in the Audio-Visual Gallery of the HSC Library.

The drawings constitute a "preliminary report," according to Professor Schuler, of his sabbatical leave. They were done in England and in the Royal Academy of Fine Arts in Copenhagen, where he has been studying. He will travel later in the year to Italy and Spain for further study and paintings.

Included among the drawings are scenes of London, Copenhagen and York, and one of the dock at Buscoy, an island off the coast of Norway.

The exhibit will remain in the Audio-Visual Gallery until the middle of January, when it will go to Gump's of San Francisco for exhibition there. The public is invited to view the drawings during the HSC Library's regular hours, 8 a.m. to 5 p.m., and 7 p.m. to 9 p.m. Mondays through Thursdays, 8 to 5 on Fridays, and 9 to 1 on Saturdays.

Humboldt finished the season with a 7-3-1 record, but two of the losses were in the Far Western conference, dropping the Jacks to fourth place.

Request Renewed For West Stands Roof Approval

A renewed request for the long-sought roof over the west stands at Redwood Bowl will be made by Dr. Cornelius H. Siemens, president of Humboldt State college, for the 1956-57 governor's budget.

The same request has been made annually for the past four years only to be set aside by a different Sacramento office each time.

However, Dr. Siemens declared "I'm confident that Sacramento now realizes the importance of protecting the supporters who pay the cost of football by providing a roof during the unpredictable football season."

"Our college is the only one in California that has to compete against the real likelihood of rain to balance its budget. It is only reasonable that the state put a roof over the stands as they have at Redwood Acres and at the county fair grounds."

This year three games were either rained out or hampered by serious threat of rain with the result of greatly diminished attendance. Since the athletic program for the entire year depends upon football receipts, the roof assumes even greater importance, Dr. Siemens pointed out.

West stands in the bowl accommodate season ticket holders and other buyers of reserved seat tickets. The season ticket sale this season was the largest in history.

English Test For High Schoolers Set for Tomorrow

High school seniors who plan to attend HSC next year from seven Humboldt and Del Norte high schools have been invited to come to the campus tomorrow at 10 a.m. to take the HSC entrance placement examination in English. Dr. Homer P. Balabanis, dean of instruction, has announced.

"The new plan is designed to afford high school seniors intending to attend Humboldt an opportunity to take the English X test before graduating and, if they pass, to enroll in the fall without further testing," Dean Balabanis explained.

"Last year we experimented with this plan in cooperation with Eureka High School; the experiment proved successful and we are now convinced of the value of the plan to the student, to the high school, and to the college."

More than 250 singers, a symphony orchestra and band will perform traditional and classical Christmas music at the eighth annual Community Christmas Program at 8 p.m. Sunday, in the Humboldt State college gymnasium.

Groups that will sing are the Arcata high school chorus, directed by Howard Sieber; the Arcata community singers, directed by Dr. Leon Wagner; the Arcata high school chorus, Madrigal singers and a cappella choir, directed by Miss Ruth Carroll, and the Humboldt State College chorus and a capella choir directed by Dr. Wagner.

The Humboldt Little Symphony directed by Charles Fulkerson, and the Arcata high school band, directed by Woody Thompson, are the instrumental groups.

The program is free and the public is warmly invited, Dr. Wagner emphasized.

Esther Thompson and Marianne Pinches, violinists, and Elaine Bux, cello, will be soloists with the Little Symphony in "Concerto Grosso" by Corelli.

The community singers, high school chorus, choir and Madrigal singers and the college a cappella choir and chorus will join voices under the direction of Dr. Wagner and accompaniment of the symphony, to sing portions of the Bach Christmas Oratorio.

Oratorio soloists will be Joline Benites, Jane Wyllie, Jean Richards, Shirley Barnhart, Paul Felsher and Louie Davis.

Accompanists will be Kay Richards, Arcata high school chorus, and Merle Smith for the community singers.

Humboldt State College takes to the airwaves five times weekly, bringing the people of Humboldt and Del Norte counties a good look at happenings here at Humboldt and reports on the latest in science, literature and educational methods.

This year, through the facilities of station KHSC, Humboldt State staff and students are presenting a wide variety of programs for the enjoyment of people in the local area. These programs are to give a picture of just what they are getting for their tax dollar, and just what is taking place here at the hilltop campus.

"Science Reporter," heard Sunday nights at 8:55 p. m. over station KIEM, is produced in cooperation with the Division of Natural Science and features one of the division's staff members speaking on topics of scientific interest. The latest developments in the field of science are introduced and discussed. The programs are presented in a straightforward and interesting manner.

On Mondays at 2:15 p. m., KIEM broadcasts the program "Report Card," a production of the Division of Education and Psychology. This program helps the listening audience to better understand the overall purposes and objectives of education. Such topics as the educational services for mentally retarded children and trends in teaching of social studies are slated to be discussed.

"Preview of Tomorrow," a production taken from the science writers of Associated Press, is heard Tuesday at 9:00 p. m. on station KHUM. This show is a production of Humboldt State's Radio Department, and features Dr. William Ladd, Assistant Pro-

fessor of Speech-Radio as the speaker. The program delves into such questions as: What's in prospect for us in the coming years? What will the world be like? The latest scientific research as applied to everyday living, is another topic presented for consideration.

Jan And Jean
Jan Lang and Jean Parker team up for "The Jan and Jean Show," heard Thursdays at 5 p. m. over KIEM. They present campus news, the latest campus personalities in an informal and interesting manner. Jan and Jean serve to remind HSC's listeners that Humboldt State is still the "friendly college."

Also on Thursdays, at 9 p. m., KHUM broadcasts the program "Let's Talk Books," a program presented by the Division of Language and Literature of Humboldt State College. On this radio show, one of Humboldt's English professors reviews a current book, one he feels the listening audience would enjoy reading.

All of these radio shows are recorded in the studios of Humboldt State's own station, KHSC. They are presented through the cooperation of students and faculty to give the "outsiders" a better look at Humboldt State College.

JUMPING JACKS NIP SHASTA IN OVERTIME

HSC's "Jumping Jacks" were forced to come from behind in the second half and then go into overtime to win their hoop opener 73 to 69 over a strong Shasta Plywood squad Saturday night in the college gym.

The Jacks were trailing 35 to 27 at halftime, but they seemed to find the range in the last half to outscore the semi-pro team and tie the game up 67-all at the end of the regulation playing time.

Then Glenn Wallace and Hank Cooper scored the four points that decided the contest in the overtime prelude.

Forward Larry Taylor, who scored the first field goal of the Jack's '55 season, was leading scorer for Humboldt with 18 points. He was followed, in scoring, by starting guards Paul Shields and George Ibarreta, who chalked up 13 and 10 points respectively.

Coach Franny Givins used 11 of his 14-man squad against the visitors, who gave the Jacks a baptism by fire into their tough '55 schedule.

Doug McClary, player-manager for the Shasta five, was high scorer for the evening. The former University of Washington All-American scored 27 points to lead the visitors.

X-Zam For English Speaking Preppers Slated Tomorrow

More than 300 high school seniors from five Humboldt and Del Norte schools will assemble tomorrow at 10 a.m. on the campus to take the English X examination required of all HSC incoming freshmen.

All those who will take the test plan to attend HSC next fall, following their graduation in June from Arcata, Del Norte, Eureka, Ferndale and Fortuna high schools.

Those who pass the test will be allowed to take English 1A, the regular freshman English course in reading and composition, when they enroll in HSC. Those who fail to pass may have an opportunity to take remedial work in the high school to prepare themselves for College English, and will have the chance to take another English X test in the late spring.

In cooperation with Eureka High School, the new plan was tried on an experimental basis last year, and, according to Dean of Instruction Homer P. Balabanis, was successful enough to indicate that it will be of value to the high school, the student, and the college.

Seven High Schools In WAA Play Day

Seven high schools, including Eureka, Arcata, Fortuna, St. Bernards, Del Norte, South Fork and Ferndale, are expected to arrive tomorrow for the annual Play Day, sponsored by the WAA.

Leaders Named In Grid Offense

With the 1955 football season receding into the dim past, Humboldt grid fans can look back on a fine Lumberjack record for the year. Along with a record of seven wins, three losses, and one tie the Lumbermen chalked up a sizable statistical lead over their opponents as shown by the official figures released by the college this week.

The Jacks scored 38 TD's and 26 conversions to the opposition's 24 and 14 to outpoint them 254 to 161. Also, the Jacks gained 1700 yards on the ground and 1599 in the air for an average of 229.8 net yards gained per game and a definite edge over the opposition.

In the individual scoring department, Happy Haft led the team with five touchdowns and 11 conversions for 41 points. He was followed by George Psaros with five TD's and a conversion and Ozzie Gooden with five TD's.

Individual passing leader was nationally-ranked Warren Baker with 85 completions in 143 attempts for a .594 average and 1183 yards. Eleven of Baker's aeriels were for touchdowns.

Leading scorer Haft was also the top pass receiver with 35 caught for 497 yards. Glenn Wallace was second with 15 receptions good for 262 yards.

George Psaros, although he played only four games in the Jack backfield, led the team in rushing with 321 net yards gained in 58 carries for an average of 5.5 yards per carry. Hank Cooper was second with 282 net in 39 carries for a 7.2 yards per carry mark.

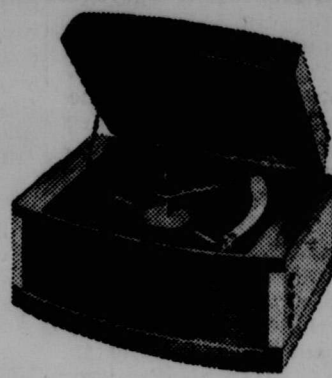
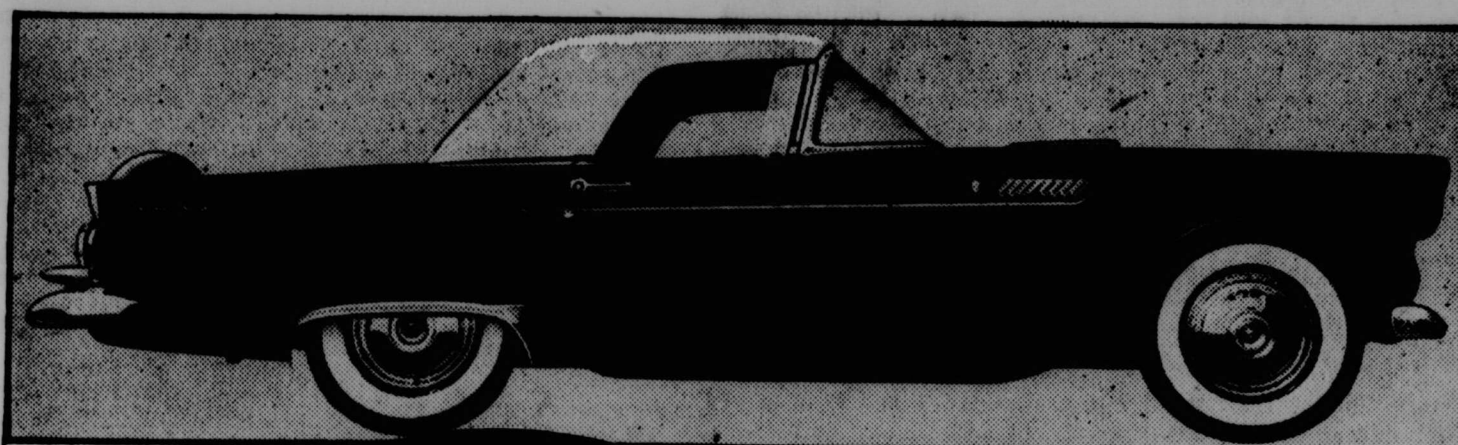

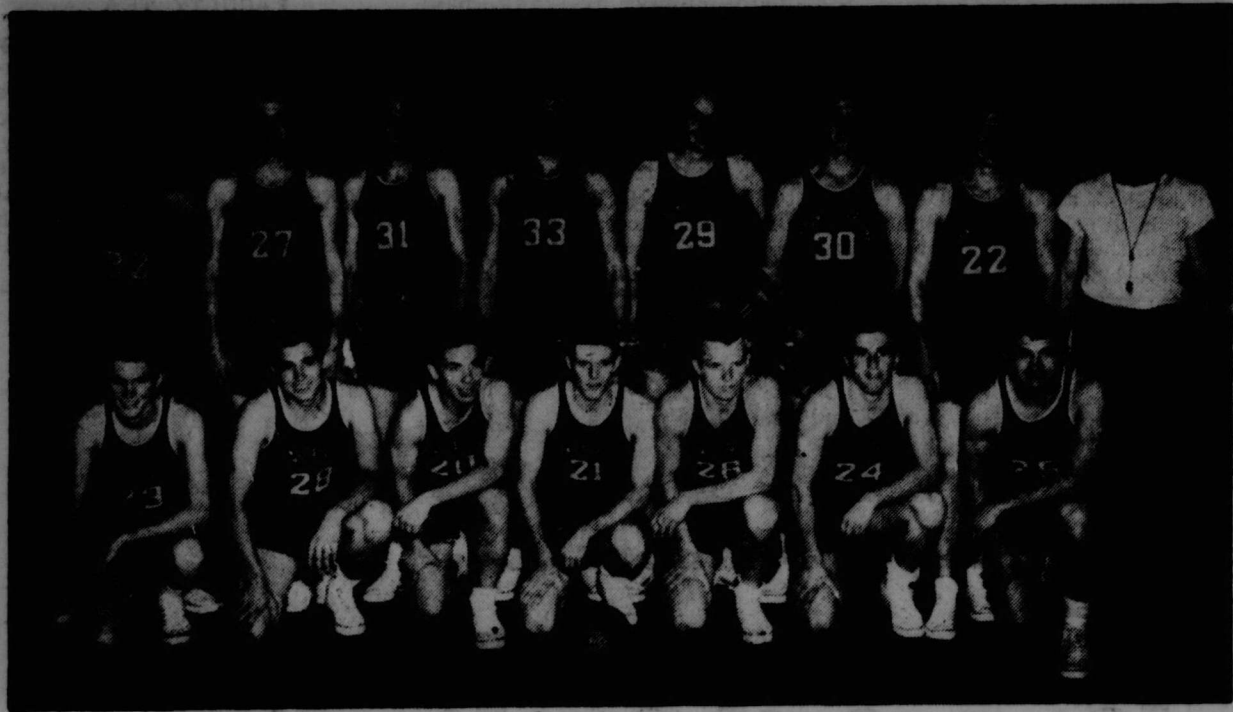
