## Richard Litfin To Speak at P-R Club Dinner

Richard Litfin of The United Press San Francisco Bureau will be the featured speaker May 20 when Humboldt State's Press-Radio club will hold its first annual Press-Radio banquet in the Big Four Inn. The banquet will be held in conjunction with the observance of Journalism Day on the college campus.

Litfin, a widely known expert in his field, will highlight a full program to be emceed by Ron Goble, newly-elected president of the club.

Also to be announced are the editors and directors for KHSC, the Sempervirens and the Lumberjack next year; winners of awards for outstanding participation in mass communications; and winners of scholarships for students in the field.

High school students from throughout the Redwood Empire will attend the Journalism Day activities, sponsored jointly by Humboldt State and the Eureka Newspapers, Inc.

Guest speaker at the luncheon for the students will be John B. Long, general manager of the California Newspaper Publishers Association. He will be accompanied by five other outstanding newsmen, including Litfin, Al Gilbert, San Francisco CNPA manager; Walter Kane, president of the CNPA; and Ross Marshall, San Francisco Hearst Newspaper official.

Long will be one of the outstanding newsmen to attend the first Journalism Day to be held on the Humboldt State campus. Newspapermen from as far away as Gold Beach, Oregon, and Ukiah are expected to attend the meeting, in addition to the CNPA officials and Bay Area newsmen who will accompany Long.

## Referendum Movement Dies as Goble And Backers Support ASB Council

The move to contest the controversial ASB runoff election of April 29 subsided this week when backers of Ron Goble threw their support to Executive Council efforts to revise the ASB constitution.

The decision to work with council members toward a better constitution was taken after a council meeting with members of the protesting groups had decided that no reversal of the election was possible.

Acting on the advice of Dr. John W. Baker, assistant professor of political science, the council found that no provision was made in the present constitution for a contested election. The petitions were also found to be wide of the mark, one calling for an illegal move, and the other being too vague for the election desired.

The sincerity and enthusiasm of the backers of Ron Goble in the recent student election has contributed directly to needed revisions in the student body constitution as well as to over all student interest in our college election. It is a pleasure to commend this group for their good sportsmanship as expressed in the following statement. With such spirit as this Humboldt State will make excellent strides forward during the coming years.

Benbow Inn was the site of the Third Annual Student Executive Council Retreat last Saturday and Sunday. Recommendations directed toward next year's government were brought up and discussed by approximately 40 students and faculty members in the sunshine in front of the Inn Sunday afternoon.

Individual committees met Saturday evening after an afternoon of recreation for the purpose of formulating recommendations and policies to be presented the next day to the entire group.

The constitutional revision was brought up by the executive committee which announced that after a great deal of work to revise the constitution in time for a student body vote, not enough days remained in the semester to allow for the minimum time for the constitution to be studied by the student body. The election on the revised constitution therefore will not take place until next fall.

The recommendations as approved by the council came under several headings:

1. **Executive:**  
Permanent record of actions taken by the Executive Council be taken by the secretary. The book-store to carry stencils to be sold individually, and available to the Executive Council at cost.  
Title of Coordinator of Student Affairs be changed to Graduate Manager.  
Present executive council accounts be divided into two accounts, with a separate account for the ASB president.
2. **Finance:**  
Clubs, organizations and activities to turn in lists of membership, that possession of a student body card can be verified. Forms to be drawn up for this purpose.
3. **Publications and Publicity:**  
1. Publications Commissioner recommended for membership on the Public Relations Committee in addition to the regular student appointee.  
Revisions in publications policies and duties of publications commissioner in the ASB Handbook. Editor of the Lumberjack to be an automatic member of ICS. Awards to be made for merit in work on Lumberjack and Sempervirens.
4. **Organizations and Activities:**  
Rally Commissioner and Organizations and Activities Commissioner to be made ex-officio, non-voting member of Assembly committee.  
Addition to be made to duties of Organizations and Activities Commissioner: Notify ICS that scheduling of all events must be cleared and submitted by first week in April. To promote co-operation among clubs through activities of all-school picnic.
5. **Awards:**  
Awards committee to meet twice a year, preceding all and spring awards assembly. Awards system be studied by the Commissioner and a committee chosen by him.
6. **General:**  
Each commissioner to draw up a progress report at the end of each year as a guide for the future commissioners. That the Handbook drawn up by former ASB president Earl Rumble be known as the ASB Handbook.

## Readings Will Be Assembly Feature Today

A former child actor in the movies who blossomed into a radio actor and professor of drama will give a program of dramatic readings at today's assembly.

Dr. Charles Gaupp, assistant professor of drama at Portland State College, Portland, Ore., will read selections from Shakespeare, Dickens' Tale of Two Cities, George Bernard Shaw's St. Joan, Mark Twain's Huckleberry Finn, the Psalms, Jane Austen's Pride and Prejudice and Nathan's Sir Henry.

Dr. Gaupp was assistant professor of drama at Reed College three years. He has directed 12 major productions, two operettas and many one-act plays there. He also is the founder of the Savoyards, a local amateur group that does Gilbert and Sullivan, and has aided many little theatre groups.

As a child actor in films he appeared with John Gilbert and Marion Davies and other early screen notables. He has appeared with Orson Welles on radio.

He has his master's degree from Cornell and master's and doctor's degree from the State University of Iowa.

Dr. Gaupp's appearance here was arranged by the assembly committee, headed by John Van Duzer, associate professor of speech. The appearance here will be one of the major events on the assembly calendar which has featured such speakers as John Dos Passos and Robert Scalapino.

HSC currently can confer the master of arts degree in education or in social sciences, and only to those holding teaching credentials or completing the requirements for teaching credentials.

With the completion of the new wildlife building and its auxiliary areas, Humboldt State College will have unexcelled facilities for the graduate and undergraduate programs in wildlife management and fisheries. The new building is the only specialized one of the kind known among the colleges and universities of the United States.

## Council Hears Petition Move

Referendum petitions regarding the run-off election of two weeks ago were the main business investigated at last week's Student Executive Council. It was pointed out that the first petition was too vague to be effective and the second had an illegal portion with regards to counting the write-in ballots from the run-off election.

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## Organ Classes Held by Mearns

Two classes in organ technique, begun last semester, will continue to be available in the fall, it was recently announced by Assistant Professor of Music James T. Mearns, instructor of the classes.

The four students enrolled in Music 74A, the beginner's section, meet Thursday at 10 a. m. at the Arcata Methodist Church. The advanced students, three in number, meet there each Friday at 1 p. m. The courses are elective and give one unit each.

The classes have been and will continue to be restricted to five students each because of lack of facilities. Two hours free practice per week, however, is allowed each student on the Methodist Church organ.

Several organizations in the area, among them the Eureka Elks Club, have organs, and often need organists.

Calls for substitute organists come in, he mentioned, at the rate of from one to three a week. Many are needed from time to time for church or social activities, and at present it is impossible to fill these calls.

The organization of this new group brings to five the number of clubs founded at HSC this school-year. The four other approved college organizations are the International Relations club, Press-Radio club, Circle K and the Veterans club.

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## Striking Ability Seen in 'Angel Street' Performers

In last Friday's opening performance of Patrick Hamilton's drama, "Angel Street," Pat Hammond exhibited striking ability and depth in her rounding out of the role of the distraught Bella Manningham.

Her interpretations of the wife who was virtually a prisoner in the old Victorian mansion was credible and creditable to the Humboldt stage.

Bill Busch, the sinister and dominating Manningham, bent on driving his wife to an asylum, took chilling advantage of each nuance of the role.

The tension between these two became almost unbearable and suffocating before a ray of hope emerged in the person of the elderly detective, Sergeant Rough, Frank Bettendorf. Bettendorf gave full play to the comedy-relief aspects of his role, managing, at the same time, to be a pillar of strength and source of comfort, not only to Mrs. Manningham but to the audience.

He added a welcome touch of

sanity and brightness to the dark oppression that seemed to cling to the drama until his arrival.

Pat Magnuson's treatment of the part of the loyal, observant housekeeper, Elizabeth, provided excellent contrast to the impudent Cockney maid, Nancy, a role which Kathy Chapman played with guttury ruthlessness.

The set, designed by John Van Duzer, combined general authenticity with practicability. The customary clutter and lack of taste of the period was missing to a great extent, but the mood of the period was preserved.

Lyn Pauley's costumes were, as always, beautifully suitable.

In directing the drama, Dr. John F. Pauley coordinated the inter-action and timing to good effect in most of the scenes, although

act one might, in parts, have been faster.

Two more performances of "Angel Street" will be given tonight and Saturday evening.

For those who enjoy a drama in which the web of terror draws tighter with each chilling moment, "Angel Street" will be the goose-pimpling ultimate.

### Kinzer's Diamond Rompers Face SOCE, Crabs Next

The Lumberjack baseballers will have the tiger by the tail tonight and tomorrow as they set out to avenge two of their only six losses of the season when the Southern Oregon College Red Raiders invade the Arcata ballpark.

Smoke and dust will rise from Albee stadium in Eureka next Tuesday when Humboldt State clashes with their traditional rivals, the Humboldt Crabs.

Tonight at 8 p. m. the Hilltoppers face the Raiders in a single

affair with a double header taking place tomorrow beginning at 6 p. m.

In games played earlier this season, SOCE, handed the locals a twin setback, 5-2 and 3-2, in games that saw plenty of action. Coach Ced Kinzer of the Lumberjacks label the Raiders as "one of the best teams we have faced and probably the best in Southern Oregon College history."

Kinzer will use Righthanders Al Gray and Jim Richardson and Lefty Ben Henke for the three game SOCE series and will keep Tom Retzlaff in reserve in case one of the big three falters.

The Crab-Lumberjack game is scheduled to start at 8 p. m. Tuesday and is expected to draw a sizeable crowd since both are the local favorites. Many one time Humboldt State stars booster the Crab lineup with such recent college athletes as Rudy Diaz, rightfield; Dave Dana, catcher; Eddie Oliveira, third base; Ken Dunaway, centerfield, and Bob Keszeley, pitcher.

It was just one of those nights for the Humboldters. The Hornets greeted Lumberjack starter Ben Henke with a barrage of base hits sandwiched around walks for a 12-run first inning. Jim Richardson fared little better in relief and it took Tom Retzlaff's junk-ball formula to stop the Hornets.

Humboldt peeked away for ten hits, against only twelve for Sacramento, but a total of eleven walks and five errors kept the margin wide throughout the game.

Al Gray hurled a three-hitter and allowed only one earned run in the second game, but shaky support cost him the game. Lumberjack hitters got to Hornet ace J. C. Masters for two runs in the first, but could do little more with the soft lobs served up by the lanky Sacramentan.

Ralph Mayo led the Lumberjack hitters with three hits in seven trips to the plate in the two seven-inning games.

Track Coach Bob Doornink has picked nine men to make the trip to Chico on the basis that they should make the best showing. They are: Paul Williams, 440, broad jump and relay; Justin Crosby, mile and two mile; Hank Cooper, javelin; Earl Barnum, high jump, broad jump and relay; Harman Bonnicksen, 100, 220 and relay; Ozzie Gooden, 100, 200 and relay; Warren Smith, half mile; Dave Sturdyvin, 200 low hurdles, and Eric Hughes, two mile.

Only 3 tennis players can compete in the conference run-off, and Coach Franny Givins has picked Bob Agnew, No. 2 netter most of the season, to play the lone singles

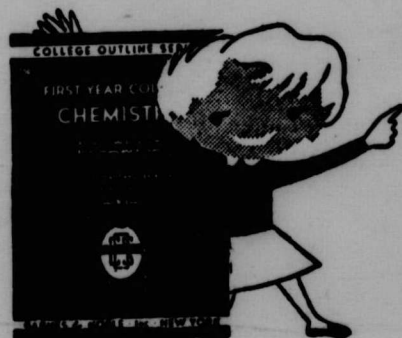
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
