ONE OF THE BIGGEST ELECTIONS IN HSC HISTORY EXPECTED

Parties are formed and publicity is under way for what is expected to be the biggest election in the history of Humboldt State College.

Elections take place next Wednesday and Thursday, May 1 and 2. On Wednesday, the booth will be placed in the main hall of the Administration Building. On Thursday it will be moved to the Wildlife

Building and the Coop.

There are three complete tickets running. They are the Hilltoppers Party (HP), Octagon Volunteers (OV) and the Senate Party (SP).

The candidates are as follows: President, Harman Bonniksen (HP), Chip Brodie (SP) and Dale Callihan (OV); Vice-President, Roberta Johnson (OV), Jon Mitts (HP) and Nick Zupo (SP); Secretary, JoAnne DeFino (HP), Pat Hodges (SP) and Diane Johnson (OV); Treasurer, Jim Ely (HP), Jim Knox (SP) and Donald "Snuffy" Smith (OV); Activities Commissioner, Joe Chappelle (OV) and Jay Eshelman (SP); Assemblies Commissioner, Mike Berker (HP), Dick Fauerbach (OV) and Larry Westlake (SP); Awards Commissioner, Warren Baker (SP), Ralph Mayo (OV) and Paul Williams (HP); Publications Commissioner, Sid Fauerbach (SP), Joe Romero (OV) and Tony Vasquez (HP); Rally Commissioner, Ben Crabb (HP), Gary Mead (SP) and Sandi Wahlund (OV).

This year every student who is regularly enrolled at HSC is eligible to vote. This can very easily be one of the biggest elections HSC has ever experienced if everyone will get out and vote on May 1 and 2.

The Constitution reads that "any student who will be absent during the elections period and who desires to vote, will register with a member of the Executive Council not less than four school days before the election. It will be the duty of the Executive Council to draw up special absentee ballots and distribute them to the registered absentee voters. The absentee ballot will be essentially the same as the regular

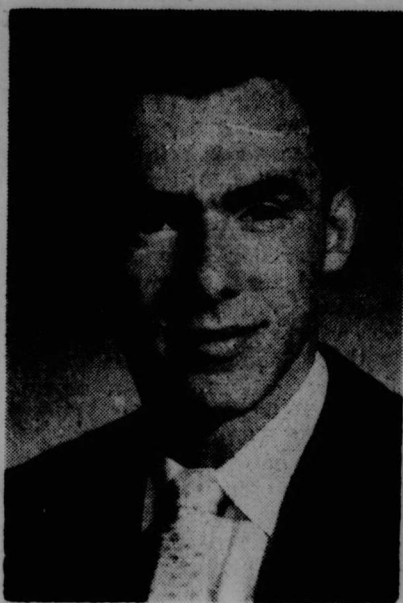
Four Performances For 'Playboy'

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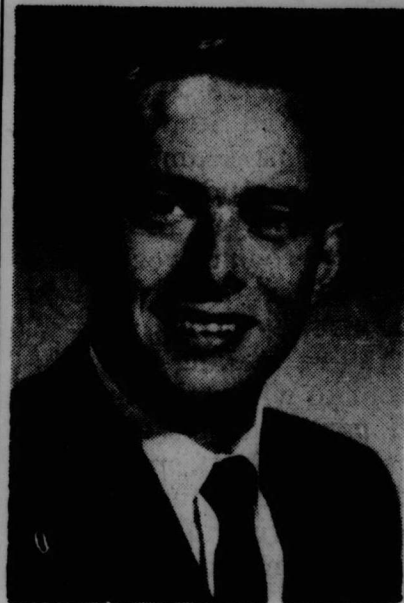

The minutes were approved as submitted.

OLD BUSINESS

A note is to be sent to Nelson Hall, Theta House, Redwood Hall and Alpha House informing them that the problem of parking is now in the hands of the Administration.

It was decided to orientate the new council at the retreat concerning organization of the Freshman Class next year. In this way the council feels that the Freshman Class will be better prepared to sponsor the Sweetheart Ball.

On Jan. 10 it was decided by the council that a booklet be put out explaining the duties of the Student Executive Council and ICS. It was decided to recommend that this booklet be published by next year's council. It was also suggested that Dr. Karshner contact Miss Buchanan and see if it would be advisable to publish this information in the Student Policies Handbook.

It was reported that the Principals of this area are in favor of having HSC host another High School Leadership Conference on Monday, Nov. 11. It was moved, seconded and passed to adopt the policy of hosting the Humboldt-Del Norte High Leadership Conference.

NEW BUSINESS

It was moved, seconded and passed that the Council recommend that the AWS Election not be held on the same day as the ASB Student Body and Constitution Election.

The council members are to prepare a yearly report on their office for the newly elected officers and are to get together with these new officers after election and acquaint them with their duties.

COMMITTEE REPORTS

It was moved, seconded and passed that the 1957 ASB Retreat be held at Clear Lake Lodge and the approximate cost will be \$8 per person and the total expense will be \$320.

The ICS Co-op Furniture Committee tried to find used furniture for the room downstairs in the Co-op. Money raising projects will be used to secure furniture for the Co-op.

Election Committee reported on the run-off date for the elections.

ASB Constitution Changes Necessitated Joint Concert In Gymnasium Sunday

Constitution changes are in order because of the new two card system. There are also certain sections which must be clarified and simplified.

First to change will be Article 1, which are the ASB membership privileges. The present

constitutional privileges are outmoded because of the new two card system. Under the new system the privileges have been split between those holding a membership card and those who hold both a membership and activity card.

Under the new constitution members of the ASB without an activity card are allowed privileges four through ten. They are as follows:

- To vote as provided hereinafter;
- To be admitted to assemblies and other events sponsored by the Association according to the provisions laid down by the executive council.
- To membership in organizations chartered by the association according to membership rules and regulations of such organization.
- To a free subscription to the college newspaper.
- To limited use of the health services and other special services of the administration;
- To any other privileges which may arise under the action of the executive council.
- To purchase a student activity card which will entitle him to the following: Members of the ASB who have purchased an activity card are eligible for the privileges mentioned above plus items ten through 16. They are as follows:
 - To hold office if eligible as provided in this constitution.
 - To represent Humboldt State College in intercollegiate competition if eligible;
 - To participate in any student body financed activity such as dramatics, forensics, journalism, radio, band, choir and student government;
 - To be admitted to all activities sponsored by the association; according to the provisions laid down by the Executive Council for such things as games, dances, concerts, plays and "All School Picnics".
 - To receive any benefits, awards or emblems given by the association;
 - To receive a discount on the yearbook.

ARTICLE 2

Article 2—Elective officers — section 94 gives the Organizations and Activities Commissioner the

right to issue writs of mandamus and writs of injunctions to the Board of Control with a two-thirds majority vote of ICS. This is a new addition to the constitution.

These two writs are aimed at getting the person or organization against whom they were directed into action. Therefore if action is pending and they are holding up progress they can be ordered to take immediate action.

This gives ICS a little power. ICS has no constitutional power now. On most campuses ICS is the legislative body. This is the beginning of a move to give ICS more responsibility. It is inevitable that ICS should get this power since they are more representative of the student body than is the executive council. The executive council legislates now.

Article 8, Board of Control, section 314 has had a closing sentence added to it. It reads as follows: "The Board of Control can be called into session by any member of the ASB. They must render a decision 5 days after being called into session." This forces the Board of Control to take action within 5 days. As it stands now there is no time limit and the Board of Control can block action if it does not act.

SPEED UP ELECTIONS

This will speed up elections as explained by the amendment to 320 under the Board of Control. The Board of Control must judge a contested election either legal or illegal within five days. If it is judged illegal a new election must be held five days after the decision. This cuts the time element down to a compulsory ten days where formerly it was unlimited.

Section 405 of the by-laws has been changed to clarify the election of the representatives-at-large. Hereafter they shall be elected on a plurality basis. Under the old constitution this is not explicit and a question was raised in the last election as to how the victors were to be determined. This is now made clear.

Guest piano soloist will be Mrs. Beverly Owens who will play a Passacaglia and Fugue composed for piano and orchestra by her husband, Fred Owens. Mr. and Mrs. Owens are members of the college music faculty.

Admission to the program is free.

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HORSEHIDERS PLAY TWO FWC TILTS IN DAVIS; THINCLADS IN ASHLAND

The always-busy Lumberjack baseball team continues its active schedule this weekend while the Humboldt State track squad gets back into the swing of things tomorrow after a three week layoff.

Coach Ced Kinzer's horsehiders enter their second Far Western Conference fracas in Davis tomorrow as they tangle with the Cal Aggies in a pair of seven inning league tilts starting at 11 a. m.

Meanwhile Coach Bob Doornink's thinclads will be in Ashland to participate in a three way meet with the Oregon Tech Owls and the host Southern Oregon Red Raiders.

The defending co-champion Lumberjack nine now hold a 2-0 mark in loop play and the 14-man travelling squad will be out to maintain its spotless FWC record and to improve upon its 14-4 season effort.

STARTING HURLERS NAMED

Jim Richardson, who has yet to lose a game in league play in two seasons, and Gary Mauney, the other half of Humboldt's big two, are slated to gain the starting nod for the games. The dependable duo have started every conference series during the past two years.

Only two changes from the original lineup 18 games ago will be made for the games with the Aggies. They will find Ike Peterson at third base and Jack Evans in right field. All other positions

are manned by lettermen.

Al Schrader will be catcher, Al Deniz at first base, Dick Dudley at second, Peterson at third, captain Bob Lawson at shortstop, Ralph Mayo in left field, Jesse Washington in center and Evans in right. Bill Matson will make the trip as a utility man. Other hurlers on hand will be Gerry Carlson, Bill Wilbur and Jack Maze.

Three more games have been added to the already busy schedule of the Jacks. They will meet the Crescent City amateurs in Arcata next Tuesday and in Crescent City on May 7. Humboldt will play a return tilt with the Hamilton Field Flyers Tuesday, May 14.

TRACKSTERS IMPROVE

Still preparing for the Conference meet, the HSC track squad will consist of 19 performers for tomorrow's practice affair in Ashland. Most of the travellers are those who have been winning points in the five previous meets.

Coach Doornink emphasized that, although they have not had a meet for three weeks, the tracksters have been working out every day and improving steadily.

Harman Bonniksen, a consistent scorer in the dashes for the Jacks, may run the 440 this week. As lead man on the relay team he has clocked a time of 51 seconds flat.

Larry Amos, who has been hobbled by illness, will run in the 880 this week after good showings in time trials.

Golfers In Two Weekend Matches, Top Cal Aggies

Coach Phil Sarboe's HSC golf team hits the road again this weekend for a pair of matches. This afternoon the Jacks tee off against Southern Oregon at 1:00 p. m. in Crescent City. Sunday the hilltop golfers will be in a return match with Benbow Country Club of Garberville. The match with Benbow is scheduled for 1:30 p. m. at Benbow.

Last weekend in Ukiah the HSC golfers palyed host in a four-way affair against Chico State, San Francisco State and Cal Aggies. The Jacks defeated Cal Aggies 13½ to 1½ but were beaten both by Chico and San Francisco ½ to 14½. San Francisco's George Starns was medalist with a 72. Bob Bestor recorded the top score for Humboldt as he toured the Ukiah course in 77. Rod Sandretto and Bestor picked up the lone ½ points from Chico and San Francisco.

Other scores for Humboldt were Alan Hendrickson 84, Bob Archibald 84, Sandretto 87, and Captain Bob Rice 88.

The lineup for matches this week will put Alan Hendrickson in the No. 1 position followed by Bob Bestor No. 2, Bob Archibald No. 3, Captain Rice No. 4, Rod Sandretto No. 5 and Sunday at Benbow the Jacks will use their No. 6 man Jim Knox.

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Faculty Show To Be 'Kickoff' For Picnic May 15

The annual Faculty Show, which since 1950 has been the kickoff for the All School Picnic, is scheduled May 15, for its two performances in the Humboldt State College auditorium.

Admission price to the show, which this year is under the direction of Mr. Paul Johnsen, assistant professor of music, is 25 cents.

The Faculty Show has been presented to the students of HSC by their faculty for over 20 years and was admission free prior to the 1950 performance.

The reason charging admission dates back to 1949 when a student who was self supporting, was hospitalized for an extended time.

The faculty sensing that a need was present and gladly took up a collection among the students and assisted the student with expenses.

It was then seen by the faculty that if a regular fund was set up for such student emergencies it would render a service to HSC students.

MONEY-MAKER

In searching for a means of financing such a fund the annual Faculty Show was hit upon as the best available money-making instrument that the faculty had at its command. So the faculty instituted the policy of charging 10 cents admission to its annual show of foolishness. However, as time passed, and as the show grew in size and merit, the price was advanced to 25 cents. This increase in the price allowed for a larger amount to students in need.

The stated purpose of the fund is to give financial aid to students who meet with emergencies or obligations not foreseen.

This is then reported to HSC's President Dr. Cornelius Siemens and a faculty committee is assembled to investigate the need, and to recommend whether or not a loan is to be granted. This student emergency fund exists separate from other loan funds and students may ask for aid from the fund.

To date eight students have been given assistance with the amounts given ranging from ten to \$100.

The fund exists separate from other loan funds and no student may ask for aid from the fund.

The show itself can only be described as humorous foolishness with tom-foolery and side splitting antics permeating the verse of the show, with the sun yet to rise on the day when the faculty gives two identical performances.

The second performance of the show is the "Command Performance" which is the prelude to the car caravan to Camp Bauer for a day full of picnic festivities.

Preparation for the picnic is doing satisfactorily under the chairmanship of Chip Brodie and Dick Fauerbach.

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HSC Choir To Present 18 Programs On Busy Six-Day Concert Tour

Monday the HSC Choir will leave for a six-day concert tour between Arcata and San Francisco. Traveling by chartered Greyhound bus, the 36 voice choral group will sing some 18 programs for as many high school, junior college, civic groups and church audiences.

First stop will be in the Fortuna-Ferndale area, with concerts at both high schools in the morning, followed by an afternoon concert at South Fork and an evening program for the Garberville Civic Club. FINAL DAY'S EFFORTS

Friday the Choir will offer its final day's efforts in St. Helena and Napa, followed by a short visit to San Francisco. It's homeward bound on Saturday, and the Annual Spring Concert on the same day, at 3:30 p. m. in the First Baptist Church of Arcata, where the Hilltop choristers will present a full and varied program for local concert-goers.

The Choir selections range from the fifteenth and sixteenth century sacred choral literature of the Netherlands, Italy and Germany through the romantic period of Schubert and Mendelssohn to the contemporary compositions of Noble Cain, Norman Lockwood and the Czech composer, Martinu. The program will contain a lib-

eral sprinkling of music in a light and humorous vein, including a variety of folk-songs and new arrangements of two Negro spirituals, "Freedom", and the rollicking "Who'll be a Witness for my Lord" by Director Leon Wagner.

Special feature of the HSC Choir is the ten-voice Madrigal Singers, who present themselves seated around a large table and sing a group of unique selections particularly suited to small ensembles of this type.

The defending co-champion Humboldt State Lumberjack baseball team started out its 1957 Far Western Conference season by taking two games from the San Francisco Golden Gators last Thursday in the Bay Area.

The Jacks romped to a 10-1 win in the opener, then had to turn on the pressure to win the second game 3-2.

Jim Richardson, Humboldt's ace righthander, went all the way in the first game, and kept clean his record of never having lost a conference game while he has been pitching for HSC.

Richardson scattered five hits, while the Jacks were getting eight safeties of two Gator hurlers. Humboldt did all of its scoring in the first five innings. They tallied two runs in the first, and that was enough, as the Gators got their lone run in the second.

Jesse Washington singled with the bases loaded in the first frame to drive in the initial two runs. One more was added in the second when Allan Schrader singled home Richardson.

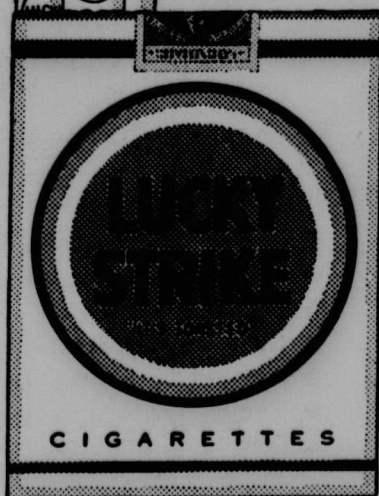
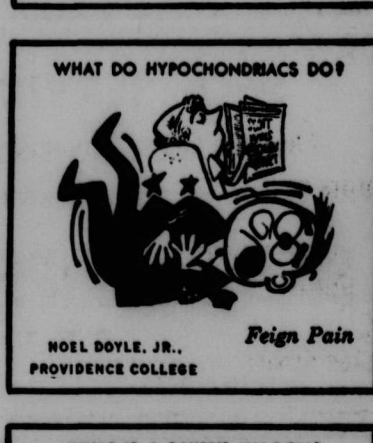
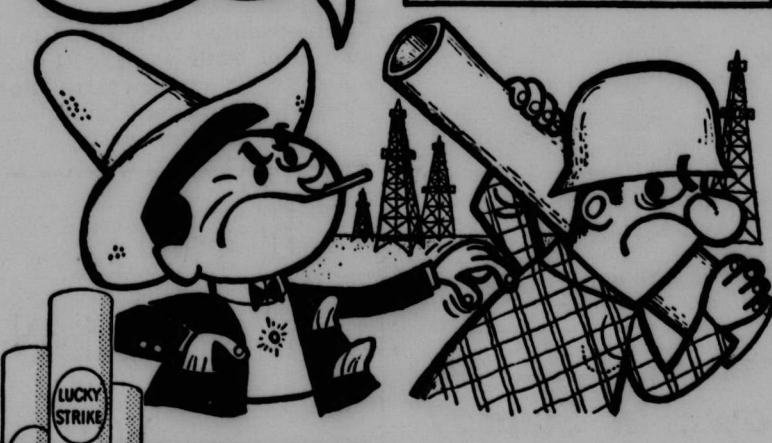
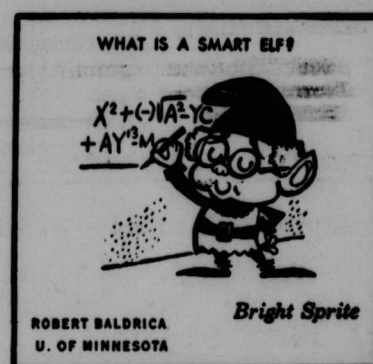
The Lumberjacks lone run came in the top of the fourth when Dick Dudley singled, Allan Schader walked and Bob Lawson singled in the run.

CIPA CAPITOL REPORT

SACRAMENTO — (CIP) — Proposed new residence halls for state colleges are nearing reality following approval by the budget cutting Assembly Ways and Means committee.

The economy-minded group gave its approval to a \$16 million budget item April 11 calling for dormitories on all state college campuses with available land.

Approval came over the opposition of A. Alan Post, legislative auditor. Post contended the money, which was part of the funds approved by the voters as Proposition Number Three, could be used either for residence halls or for new state colleges.

The legislature is considering bills establishing 10 new colleges, and Post is faced with the problem of finding funds with which to pay for them.

"It might be better to put colleges within commuting distance of the students," Post said, rather than build new dormitories.

"I recognize the desirability of having residence halls," the auditor said, "but we also need new colleges."

However, the committee approved the item by a unanimous voice vote.

The same committee also shouted through an \$11 million residence hall budget for the University of California.

SACRAMENTO — (CIP) — Finance committee of the state Senate set what observers called a major precedent recently when it approved a \$631,000 budget item for construction of a Student Activities building at San Jose State College.

The item already has been approved by the Assembly Ways and Means committee, which is the budget-cutting group of the lower house.

Approval of the item constituted a new legislative policy of providing Student Activities buildings at all state colleges needing them.
