1957 Sempervirens To Be Distributed Wednesday; Loaded With Pictures, Color

The 1957 Sempervirens will be distributed Wednesday. A 164-page volume loaded with pictures and color, the book covers the major events and personalities of the 1956-57 year at Humboldt State. It is the largest book in number of pages and pictures ever produced by Humboldt students.

Students may get their books all day Wednesday at the window of the business office and thereafter in the Sempervirens office upstairs in the Coop.

All students with a full-year ASB card or both spring and fall semester cards are entitled to a book at no extra cost. Students with a one-semester card pay \$4. Students with no card pay \$6. Faculty members pay \$4 with or without card.

At no additional charge, this year's book contains a 45 rpm vinyl record as a "bonus" page. The record, entitled "Moments to Remember," was produced for the Sempervirens by the staff of radio KHSC. It captures many of the highlights of the year in sound, including the Homecoming address in which Governor Goodwin J. Knight exhorted Humboldt to beat Chico on the gridiron.

A durable plastic cover designed to give a lifetime of protection to the book will be on sale at the business office windows during the distribution period. A limited number was ordered, and

the Sempervirens staff urged all students to by the cover early. Cost is 50 cents.

A limited number of the records also will be on sale for 50 cents apiece.

The annual employs a theme that captures the essence of this year on campus, said co-editors Sandra Aycock and Kay Price. Among other features of the book is a section that pictures the campus beauty queens in bronze sepiatone.

'NEWS PICTURES OF YEAR' EXHIBIT IN HSC GALLERIES ENDS TODAY

The Encyclopedia Britannica's "News Pictures of the Year," on exhibit in both the art and audio-visual galleries, ends today. This exhibit organized and judged each year by the photo-journalism fraternity of the University of Missouri, brings together the best work of the nation's working news and magazine photographers.

Photography is the recording of an idea on film through the use of a camera. The technical operation of taking a picture and producing a printable negative is something everyone can learn by following simple procedures. To produce a picture which has meaning is another matter. Unlike fine artists who work subjectively, photo-journalists strive to present a clear cut message for public view. They attempt to record things for others in such a precise way that no additional

explanation is necessary. To explain something within a two-dimensional rectangle is difficult. As an example the photographs in your family album would be meaningless to a stranger without written or verbal explanation.

The majority of the photographs hung in the art gallery stand by themselves without need of captions. The photo-journalists are telling us of something they have seen and have reacted to with one simple statement on a piece of photographic paper.

In the exhibit, the subjects of the camera are either doing something which we, the viewers are reacting to or the subject is himself expressing an emotion which is caught by the photographer.

The emotional impact we receive from viewing the photograph entitled "Rescue Squad," for example, of a man being pulled through the windshield of a wrecked car is more descriptive and personal to us than is the written work if it has been seen for us creatively by the individual who takes the photograph.

An emergency meeting was held on Thursday, May 2. A quorum was present. It was recommended by Mr. Givins that an athletic pass be awarded upon graduation with the following stipulations: two year letterman, two year pass; three year letterman, 3 year pass; four year letterman, 4 year pass. The rights of this pass are to be non-transferable. It was moved, seconded and passed to accept the preceding recommendations. It was moved, seconded and passed to transfer \$45 Unallocated to Student Executive Council.

OLD BUSINESS

It was moved, seconded and defeated to accept Sid Fauerbach and Jean Sylva for the Board of Control members for the year 1957-1958. There was much discussion and it seems that there are five other people taking the test for the Board of Control on Monday, May 13. The decision as to the new Board of Control members will be made by the Student Council on Tuesday, May 14.

Jim Callison reported on the reread to be held on May 18-19 at Clear Lake Lodge.

Joyce Weaver and Sandi Wahlund are to work with Dr. Karshner on the explanation of what the Student Council does. This article will be put in the handbook being published by the AWS.

Jon Mitts reported that he had secured information concerning a billboard publicizing Humboldt State College. It was stated that the proposed sign would cost too much money. It was suggested by the council that Jon investigate other alternative signs.

NEW BUSINESS

There was much discussion about HSC endorsing the new tax continuation bill in the Arcata

High School District. This bill would extend \$1.25 for every \$100 of the tax rate for the Arcata High School District. It was moved, seconded and defeated that HSC endorse the Arcata High School Tax Extension. It was moved, seconded and passed that we allow the Arcata Citizen Committee use the Plaza Sign for a positive statement on the tax issue through May 13-17.

It was reported that bids for the concessions next year will be given out in the near future. A notice will also be put in the bulletin.

There will be an Awards Assembly on Friday, May 17, at 11 a.m.

It was moved, seconded and passed to change the regular council meeting from Thursday, May 16, to Tuesday, May 14.

COMMITTEE REPORTS

Rejuvenation of the Coop: A committee of Joe Chappelle and Don Peterson will submit the recommendations for the changes to be made in the Coop and Howard Goodwin will take action.

Joe Chappelle reported that it will be impossible for a Pep Band to receive units for the coming year. This committee will be disbanded.

COMMISSIONER REPORTS

Activities Commissioner reported that ICS has been discussing better participation in club organizations. A possible solution might be to set aside two hours during the week for meetings during which time no classes would be held. Jim Barnes and Jon Mitts were appointed as a committee to see Dr. Balabanis.

Rally Commissioner reported that Song Queen tryouts will be held on Tuesday, May 21, for the selecting of one song queen.

Board of Finance: It was moved, seconded and passed to accept Dennis McGillivray and Jack Geary as the new Board of Finance members for the year 1957-1957.

CIPA CAPITOL REPORT

The Assembly Education committee has passed bills establishing four more state colleges.

The committee gave its approval Monday (May 6) to bills setting up new campuses in Alameda, Orange and Imperial counties. Wednesday (May 8) the committee approved a college in San Mateo county.

It was a second life for the Alameda bill which the committee apparently killed several weeks ago. The measure was the only one to fail to gain approval from Assembly Education and its revival gives the committee a perfect record of passage.

All four bills were sent to the ways and means committee where they join numerous other state college bills which were introduced on the Assembly side.

The measures will probably get their first critical hearing before the economy-minded ways and means group.

Similar proposals on the Senate side are awaiting action before the Senate Finance committee.

State college cafeterias will have to continue paying local property taxes because Gov. Goodwin J. Knight has vetoed a bill giving them an exemption.

The measure, authored by Assemblyman Ernest R. Geddes (R-Claremont), would have granted tax relief to cafeterias, book-stores, and other privately operated facilities on state college campuses.

Knight said he had an opinion from Attorney General Edmund G. Brown's office which said the bill was unconstitutional. He vetoed the proposal Tuesday (May 7).

The governor said Geddes agreed to change the bill to remove the constitutional objection and try again.

An Assembly committee has approved a bill which would allow state college residents to waive "out-of-state tuition fees" for as many as 10 foreign students each year.

The measure, authored by Assemblyman Sheridan Hegland (D-La Mesa), won approval of the Education committee Monday (May 6) and was passed to the floor of the lower house.

Hegland explained that the bill was designed to give a less expensive tuition rate to two Hungarian refugees now attending San Diego State. A delegation from that college spoke in favor of the bill.

Proponents pointed out that if each college took advantage of the bill's provisions to the fullest extent, only 100 tuition reductions would be granted.

College Y Elects Vasquez President

Last week the College Y elected an entire new group of officers for the Fall semester. New officers are Tony Vasquez, president; Pat Rouse, vice president; Merle McCormick, secretary; Mona Armstrong, treasurer; and Susie Ratcliff, ICS representative. These students will take office in the Fall.

The College Y is one of the religious organizations on campus. It is a branch of the YMCA. Dr. Charles Parke and Mr. John Black are the advisers of the group.

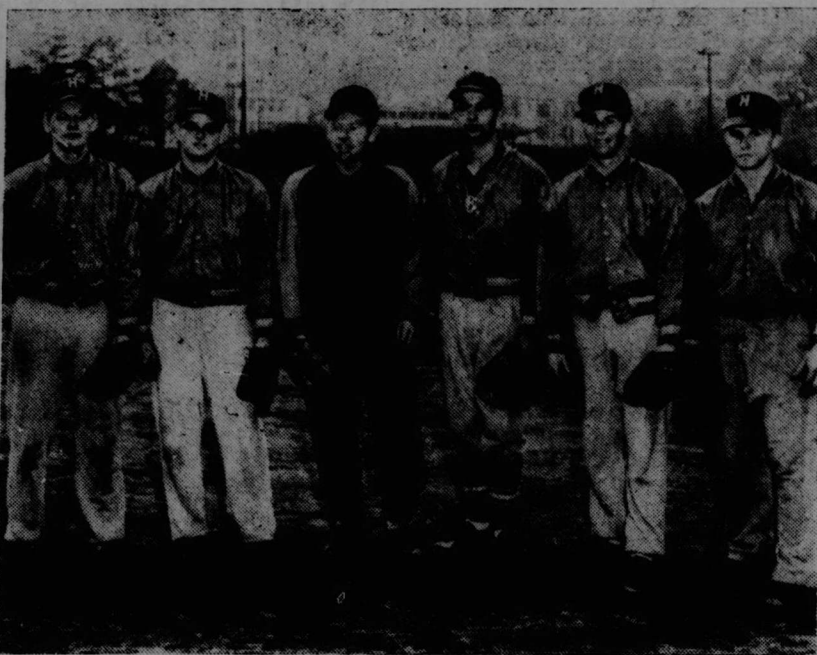

Sports at Humboldt State College for the 1956-57 school year come to a close tomorrow afternoon as the Lumberjack baseball team hosts the Chico State Wildcats in a Far Western Conference twin bill starting at 11 a. m. at the Arcata Ball Park.

Disappointment has reigned over the diamond nine during the past two weeks as the Jacks, once rated co-favorites with the Sacramento State Hornets for league laurels, have slipped into a batting slump and dropped four conference games in a row to give them a 3-5 FWC record.

GOOD RECORD

Nonetheless the current season is the second most successful in the history of the school and the team going into tomorrow's wind-up double-header possesses

a fine 17-9 season mark. Opponents have ranged from such major college powers as the University of California and the University of San Francisco Dons to small amateur clubs.

Top Lumberjack hurler Jim Richardson looms as a question-mark for the double-header due to the knee injury he suffered last Saturday in a game against Sacramento. PROPOSE NEW SCHEDULE

As this year's baseball season draws to a close Coach Kinzer and Athletic Director Phil Sarboe are talking of plans for a 20-game Far Western Conference baseball schedule in which each team will play a pair of home and home double-headers with the other schools in the loop.

Such an arrangement of a round-robin schedule will add a great deal of interest and flavor to the championship race, giving schools a fairer and more equitable chance over the long haul instead of the 10-game schedule that now exists.

The proposed measure is expected to be presented at the conference meeting next December at Humboldt State and Sarboe and Kinzer both expressed strong hopes that it will win approval.

If an enlarged league slate is adopted Humboldt will find it necessary to trim its practice schedule accordingly. Kinzer noted that the change would not be an additional strain on the athletic budget as the Jacks played 18 games on the road this season.

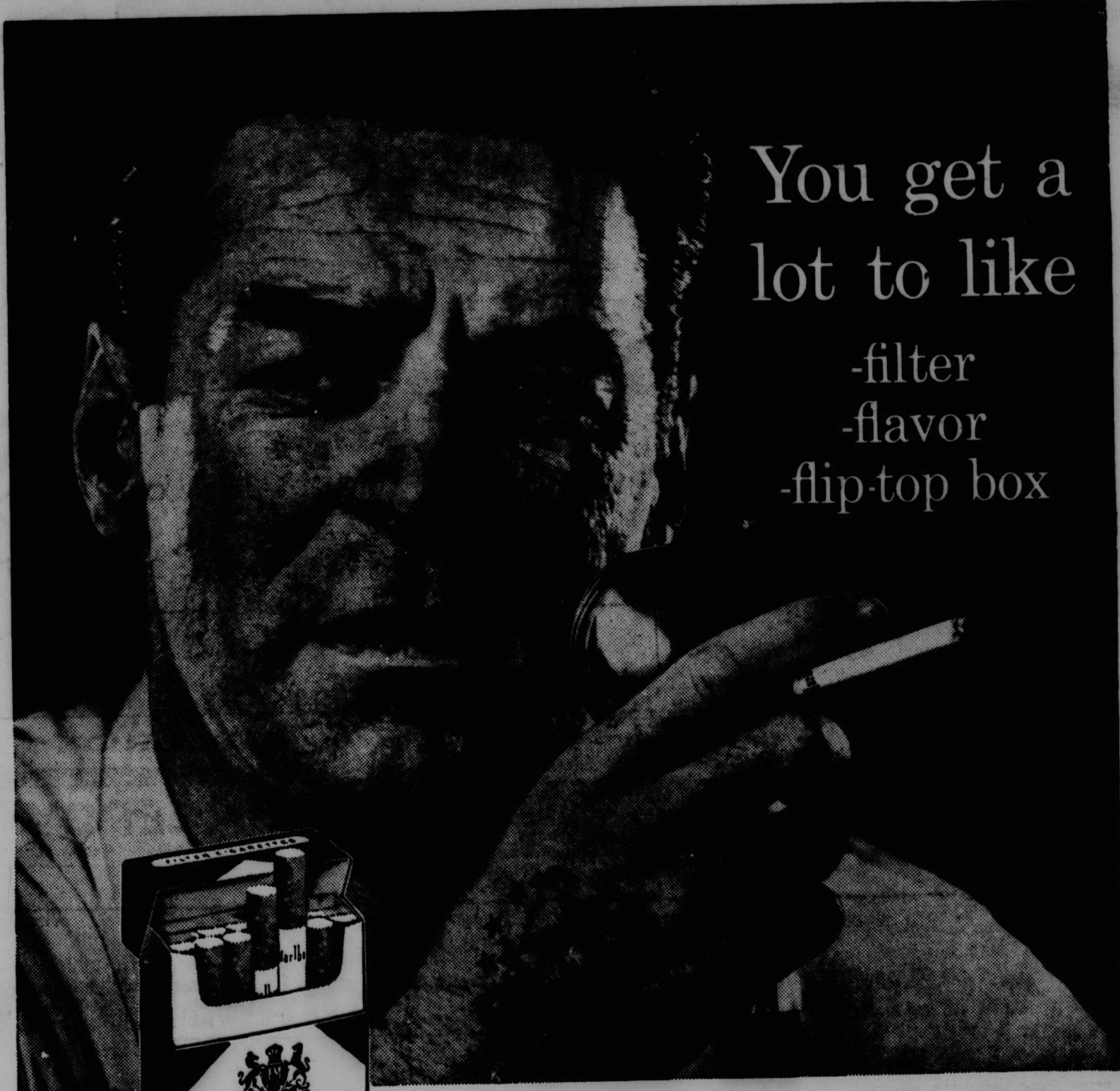
