

CHANCELLOR ORDERS SPENDING HALT

Reagan's Fiscal Moratorium Prompts Clamp on Spending

Following the moratorium issued last week by Governor Ronald Reagan to State College Chancellor Glenn Dumke, the following orders were in turn issued to all of the California State Colleges:

1. All faculty recruitment for anticipated replacements and present vacancies is to be halted.
2. All State College out-of-state travel is to be halted.
3. Hiring to fill vacancies for this semester is also to be halted except in the cases of vacancies due to present leaves of absence.
4. No items of office equipment or motor vehicles are to be purchased except those items already on order or by special request in the case of emergency conditions.

The Chancellor has also asked each of the College's Presidents to test the effect of college proposals under the following assumptions:

1. Imposition of a \$200 tuition charge
2. Reductions on next year's budget of up to ten percent.
3. Elimination from the 1967-68 budget of any new or improved programs (including provisions for sabbatical leaves, research, libraries, graduate teaching loadsk etc.) and,
4. The limiting of faculty salary increases to the 5% already appropriated by the last legislature.

Under these assumptions it is roughly estimated that at least 300 qualified students could not be accommodated by existing facilities at HSC next fall. Only the present figure of 3,400 students could be maintained, stated college president Cornelius Siemens.

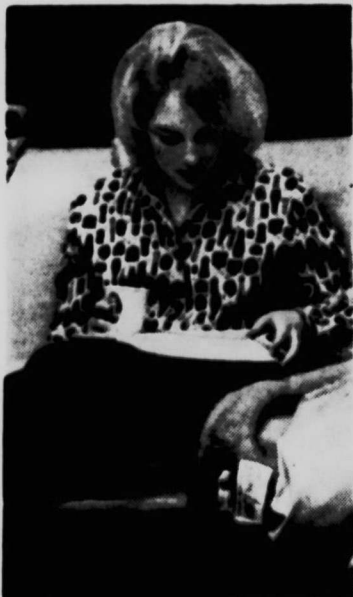
Rubin Selected Lumberjack Editor

Don Rubin, a 22 year-old senior history major from San Diego, has been selected editor of the *Lumberjack* for the Spring, 1967 semester, it was announced Tuesday by *Lumberjack* faculty advisor Harold Knox.

Rubin is a relative newcomer to the *Lumberjack* staff, having joined it just this fall as a staff writer.

His appointment was confirmed by Student Legislative Council at their brief dead week meeting Tuesday afternoon.

The outgoing editor, Al Brewer, is graduating at the end of this term. Brewer has held the editorship for one year, having been the only editor in recent years to serve two consecutive one-semester terms, said Knox.



Siemens also said that he had been asked to estimate how many qualified lower division students would have to go to Junior Colleges, and to indicate the order of priority to be used to determine which of the qualified students would be admitted. Siemens mentioned possible priority problems: Jr. College transfers who have no where else to go; specialty majors (such as forestry, game management, etc.) admitting local students only; or admitting only on the first-come, first-served basis.

If the tuition were to be imposed, Siemens said that the presidents had suggested adding it to the colleges' budgets, thereby making up the ten percent cut, and admitting all the qualified new students.

The question still remains, however, as to where the tuition would be applied.

The presidents were given assurance that most of the uncertainties from Reagan's office would be resolved by January 31. The budget would then be handed over to the legislature. Siemens added that under the new state constitution, Proposition 1A provides for legislative over-ride on the governor's actions if the legislature can produce a two-thirds majority.

Graff, Eggert, Hanley, Jackson Elected Reps

Mike Graff, Jeff Eggert, Dick Hanley and Terry Jackson were elected to student council representative-at-large positions in this week's ASB balloting.

The four new reps were selected from a field of thirteen candidates, by the 568 students who cast ballots in Monday and Tuesday's voting. The number of students voting was barely one-sixth the total enrollment of the college.

The representatives-elect will serve one year terms, commencing in February, on Student Legislative Council, the law-making and fund-allocating branch of student government.

Jerry Broyles, AS Elections Commissioner, reported that of three voting precincts, the cafeteria was the most active with 287 ballots cast there. The ballot box in the CAC collected 189 votes, while the one in the Forestry Building polled 92.

Broyles released vote results from each precinct that showed the totals received by each candidate. Graff, who finished first with 197 votes, led the cafeteria balloting with 96. Hanley, who third with 161 votes led the CAC with 75.

Jackson, a forestry major and past Forestry Club lobbyist to student council, collected 143 votes for fourth place, of which 74 were from the Forestry Building. At that precinct, Graff pulled only 34 votes and Hanley 12.

Jeff Eggert, the second place

candidate, collected 187 votes, his strength being fairly well scattered between the three precincts.

Complete election results are available in the ASB office, East Wing, Nelson Hall.

New staff members are needed for the *Lumberjack* this spring--no experience necessary.

Staff members can receive one or two units of credit by registering for either Journalism 37 or 127, with no tests, term papers, textbook, or work during dead week or finals week.

Prospective staffers can be of any major, and do not need to have had any previous journalism instruction. Staff work includes reporting, copy editing, layout, and production.

Registration Lines to Start In Field House for Spring

Registration for the spring semester will begin in the Field House instead of the womens gym, according to Mr. Thomas Price, Registrar.

Students will line up and enter at the east entrance (ample parking is provided behind the field house) of the Field House, and will receive permits to register inside.

From here the student is routed through the mens gym for class cards and advisors signatures, then out through the womens gym.

The new system is designed to remedy the congested lines somewhat, and to afford protection to the students in the event of rain, said Price.

Price urged that students promptly pay all out-standing fines, library or otherwise, so that individual permits to register will not be denied.

A one day workshop of interest to school counselors, probation officers, social and other professional workers will be co-sponsored on Saturday, January 21, by the HSC Division of Education-Psychology and the Humboldt-Del Norte Mental Health Association.

Titled a Workshop on Reality Therapy, the study will be conducted by William Glasser, M.D.

Dr. Pearce Granted Research Position

Dr. Jack Pearce, Assistant Professor of Zoology, has been granted a research position to direct a program in benthic ecology at Sandy Hook Marine Laboratory in New Jersey.

Though Sandy Hook is a federal marine laboratory, Pearce has been appointed to introduce academic material into the lab. In addition to this program in benthic ecology, he has also been offered the opportunity of introducing marine ecology in Columbia and Rutgers Universities.

Pearce's project will concern how benthic organisms determine the population of fish, and the effects of pollution on benthic organisms. Besides problems on the benthic population and pollution studies, he will be involved in the development of artificial reefs to bring other fish into the area.

Reader Dissents With LJ Policy

Editor:

Many of us disagree with the war in Vietnam or Governor Reagan's budgetary proposals or fundamental religionists on many grounds—some sociological, some religious, some political, some economic. Whether or not these criticisms are justified is not my concern in this letter. But I am concerned with the Lumberjack's editorial policy with regard to the presentations of such dissent. At the present time that policy reflects neither an understanding of the reading public nor a maturity of reporting.

If a columnist expects to be persuasive he should be fully aware of the concerns, biases and convictions of his readers. To do this he must look past the self-satisfaction of self-expression for its own sake; he must be dynamic, adaptable, and willing to constantly seek an increase in knowledge which may or may not reinforce his personal convictions, but which will always assure him that he is being honest with his public. This is the only way the columnist can win the respect of his readers; the only way he can ever be truly persuasive; if he is willing to admit that he, too, is still seeking the answers to the myriad of

problems which confront us. He can then share a mutual understanding with his public, which the present columnist lacks.

He also shows an immaturity of reporting in his willingness to lower his world-view to the level of cheap analogies and outdated student-protest-stereotypes. Current events are not quite as ridiculous as Mr. Linn would have us believe, though they may be as confusing as I find his reporting of them to be.

When the writer is able to reach a deeper and more meaningful level of reporting, perhaps then he will find respect for his work. Till then he will continue to be ridiculed and resented.

Just one consolation: At least his self-expressed name is well-known.

What Student Owes Taxpayer

People have no cultural right to be students in a public institution. The only thing that any person has a right to is his own property. A person would therefore have a right to be a student if he were to pay his own way, but having no right to

the property of another he would have no right to be a student if it involved using the property of another without the willing approval of the donor.

But you say "Taxes support educational institutions, and surely everyone is in favor of higher education." Maybe this is so, but given the alternative, would they have felt it of more value than some other project?

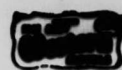
Isn't it more likely they would rather have that new car or television than pay for the education of a person they don't even know? And isn't that their right if they choose to do so, even though it is being infringed upon today?

Taxpayers support educational institutions for two reasons 1. They have been convinced by political demagogues that they have no alternative, and (2) taxes to support educational institutions are not given willingly and freely, but only because the force of the state is able to demand it.

With this in mind, then, an education becomes a privilege granted by the state, the student having to meet certain standards in order to be able to continue to be a student. This includes G.P.A., student conduct and dress among other things.

Though the state is the actual organ that supports the institutions, it still must respect the wishes of the electorate, and the taxpayers, because if the state went too strongly against the will of the people, they would simply stop paying taxes and "the devil be hanged."

Realizing that the ability to obtain an education is a privilege the student will be more cautious in what he does; his education becomes more valuable to him when he sees it as something which can be withdrawn at any moment should the circumstances warrant it.
