WORK AT COLLEGE AIDS 161 STUDENTS

STATISTICS GIVEN OUT BY
FINANCIAL SECRETARY
FOR LAST YEAR

A hundred and sixty-one Humboldt students earned \$4,544.44 last year through work at the college itself, during the school year 1933-1934. This was revealed by a report released yesterday by Mrs. Jessie T. Woodcock, college financial secretary.

The bookstore furnished \$351.70 worth of work for eight students. Twenty-five students earned \$1,301.86 by work in the Commons. Work in connection with Sunset Hall, the girls' dormitory, gave employment to eight students, netting them a total of \$255.06.

The student body itself paid out \$100.30 to eleven students for work in connection with student activities.

The state of California furnished work to thirty-three students paying out \$1,320.52 to readers, student assistants of various sorts, and to student janitors.

The largest number of students to receive aid from any one source were the seventy-six who were paid for services of different kinds through federal aid, which totaled \$1,215.

In addition to the foregoing, Mrs. Woodcock throughout the year was continually supplying students for various odd jobs, such as house work, caring for children, housing wood, garden work, and clerking.

Dr. Puryear Begins Series of Lectures

BUDGET IS READY FOR STUDENT BODY

STUDENT ASSEMBLY WILL BE
HELD AT 10 A. M. FRIDAY
FOR FINAL ACTION

The budget for 1934-1935 for various activities sponsored by the student body of Humboldt College will be submitted to the student body for final approval at the assembly in the auditorium at 10 o'clock tomorrow (Friday) morning.

This budget has been prepared by the Executive Council of the student body, the council being composed of the student body officers and the student Board of Control, with Dr. Homer Balabanis, vice president of Humboldt College, as financial adviser.

The budget was prepared from estimates submitted by managers or sponsors of various activities. The committee worked for several meetings and then held a hearing for the activities concerned. As a result, some modifications were made and the budget to be submitted tomorrow is to some extent a revision.

It is estimated that \$4,368.41 will be available for this year. Of this \$551.16 is a balance from last year. The rest of the money comes, or is to come, from student body dues paid in for the first semester and estimated for the second, and from revenues that are expected from men's athletics, from the productions of the dramatics department, from concerts by music groups, from Lumberjack advertising, and

Dance Bids

Considerable difficulty was experienced at the "Freshman Reception" because of the lack of understanding of the college dance bid system by the students and their friends. Future dances will be checked strictly according to section 7 of the Student Body Constitution which all students should understand and explain to their friends. For the benefit of new students the section pertaining to Student Body dances is printed here.

Section 7. Those who are entitled to attend Student Body dances shall be Student Body members, all faculty members and families, holders of alumni cards and one guest per card holder, and holders of bids.

Dance Bids—Each Student Body member is entitled to one bid for a Student Body or class dance. The bid must be presented at the door and must bear the name of the guests and persons giving the bid.

If the holder of the bid accompanies the person whose name appears on the bid as the bidder, he shall be admitted free, if not, he shall pay fifty cents (50c) admission at the gate.

Requests for dance bids shall be in not later than 4:00 p. m. on the day preceding the dance.

Bids shall not be issued to anyone attending college who is not a member of the Student Body. Such persons may be admitted only by special permission of the Board of Control.

There shall be a Student Body member at the door at all times to enforce all rules governing dances and to collect any admissions.

They plan assembly programs, make rules for the safety of the school children, oversee the care of the building and discuss ways of making theirs a better school.

President's Column

PURPOSES OF HUMBOLDT

When we think of our isolation and of the desire of our students and of our community for the opportunities of higher education, we find several purposes served by Humboldt State Teachers College. In the first place, we are a state teacher-training institution. Students educated at Humboldt find positions near at home which serve as advantages to themselves as well as to the children and community. Nearly 70 per cent of last year's graduates have secured teaching positions. This is a splendid record when we consider the general unemployment of young people. Unfortunately, we have a surplus of trained persons in many fields. The General Motors Company is said to have a training school for makers of radios, training 100,000 persons for 75,000 positions.

Lower division students who wish to go elsewhere later, find Humboldt convenient financially. These students who later transfer to other institutions have found their Humboldt work well accepted. In the last five years 1,949½ semester units secured at Humboldt have been taken to the University of California for evaluation. 1,901¾ or nearly 98 per cent of these credits were allowed at the State University. The 2 per cent rejected units included typing, orchestra, physical education, and dramatics activities. The students expected no credit upon work in these fields because of the university regulations. These records place Humboldt on the same basis with the leading institutions of the country. It is a common experience for Humboldt students to receive full credit at the University for their work here.

The cultural opportunities of Humboldt are also of infinite value to the people here.

The cost of providing educational opportunities in the State Teachers Colleges of California may be summarized as follows:

1. \$200 per year per student in California; \$300 throughout the United States; \$360 at Humboldt.

2. Less than one-tenth of one per cent of the total appropriations of our state legislature comes to our college.

3. The annual expense to each citizen of California for the education provided the 13,225 students in our Teachers Colleges is 27 cents.

4. The annual per capita cost of the C. C. C. camps is approximately \$750 or three times the cost of maintaining each student in a Teachers College.

College education is an economical way of providing educational opportunities for our youth until industry can use them.

In general form it is practically the same as the previous edition, except that the obsolete and less used words which formerly occupied the lower quarter of each page in small type are now limited to about one-tenth of the page, some of them being dropped and others incorporated in the main text.

The funds have been allotted as follows:

Men's athletics, total appropriation \$1,120, distributed as follows: Football, \$520 (equipment \$270, guarantee, \$250). Basketball, \$375 (equipment \$125, guarantee \$250). Baseball, \$175 (equipment \$75, guarantee \$100). Tennis, \$50.

Women's Athletics, total appropriation \$185, distributed as follows: Playdays, rallies, \$135; Delegates to convention, \$50.

Student Body Awards, \$45 (\$15 each for women's honor sweaters, for men's honor sweaters and for letters and stars).

Men's Association, appropriation for bonfire cost, \$10.

The Lumberjack, the student paper, total appropriation \$426.

Dramatics Department, total appropriation \$1,092, distributed as follows: Capital equipment, such as drapes, flats, electrical equipment, \$200. Running expenses, which include expenses for make-up equipment, advertising, royalties on plays, theatre rental, and various expenses connected with production of modern plays, \$892.

Music Department, total appropriation \$527.75. Of this amount, \$179.75 is budgeted for the A Cappella Choir trip for 31 people; \$150 for orchestral instruments; \$40 for music stands and freight, and the balance for various expenses which arise in connection with the public concerts to be given by the various organizations.

For various miscellaneous expenses connected with the student body there was budgeted a total of \$962.66, distributed as follows: Bookkeeping expenses of financial secretary, \$60. Expense of student body office, \$43.20. Office supplies, \$10. Moving picture film, \$17. Commencement programs, \$15. Dance fund, \$320. Hospitalization fund, \$111. Hospitality functions, \$35. Reserve for contingencies, \$250. General expense account, \$101.46.
