HUMBOLDT COLLEGE REQUIREMENTS HIGH

**STANDARDS COMPARABLE TO
THOSE OF OTHER STATE
TEACHERS COLLEGES**

Humboldt College has the same entrance requirements as other California teachers colleges. Humboldt's scholarship standards are comparable to those of the other teachers colleges. Humboldt students, both who have transferred to other institutions and those who have been trained here as teachers, have been successful.

This is the substance of a statement made yesterday by President Arthur S. Gist of Humboldt in response to a request by "The Lumberjack" for such information to publish for the benefit of new students at this college. President Gist's statement in full follows:

"Humboldt's requirements for admission are the same as those in vogue in the other State Teachers Colleges of California. The following are admitted: (1) High school graduates; (2) Teachers holding valid teaching credentials; (3) Persons over 21 years of age; (4) Transfers with advanced standing, Miss Imogene

Important items toward making the college career successful include: Arranging a study program, studying three hours a day for four days a week at home, using the dictionary and analyzing words, being able to pick out principal part of lectures, preparing for examinations, keeping in physical and mental health, developing mental initiative to further the understanding of what instructors say.

Platt, registrar, is a member of the Pacific Coast Association of Registrars. She attends their meetings and uses the general practices in evaluating credits of students transferring from other institutions.

"Humboldt's scholarship standings are comparable to those in other teachers colleges. Scholarship requirements are: (1) "C" average for graduation. (2) "C" average in both minors for the General Junior High School curriculum. (3) "C" average before teacher-training is begun. (4) "C" or better in student teaching in every field for which a credential is granted.

"Humboldt students transferring to other institutions have been successful there. 98 per cent of all credits transferred to the University of California in the last five years have been allowed full credit. Three graduates of the College of Physicians and Surgeons in San Francisco this year received a full year's credit for their work at Humboldt. After entering the University, Humboldt students have maintained practically the same relative standings secured at Humboldt. The majority of these transferred students have secured their A. B. degree at the University.

"All Humboldt students graduating here and entering the University for their senior high school teaching credentials have been successful in securing these credentials. Several Humboldt graduates have secured advanced degrees at Stanford and Columbia universities in the minimum time allowed any student from any institution in the United States.

"Three students who took their pre-med work at Humboldt are now successfully working in some of the leading medical colleges of the country.

"Teachers trained at Humboldt have made good. There have been practically no failures by our graduates in teaching positions. Our college has the confidence of all city and county superintendents using our graduates. Many superintendents have informed the Administration at Humboldt that the College will be notified whenever vacancies exist."

AWARD IS OFFERED IN ESSAY CONTEST

President and Mrs. Arthur S. Gist announce that their awards of ten dollars for the Humboldt student who shows special ability in writing will be offered again this year. They hope that this award will stimulate the students, interested in creative writing.

The English department has charge of the details of the award, the rules for which will be the same as last year.

The writing must be an essay, formal or informal, not to exceed 2500 words. The subject is selected by the student. The essays, which are to be typed if possible, are to be unsigned, the title serving as identification.
