Stanford Professor
Discusses Arabs

Many interesting bits of knowledge of life in French North Africa were told by Edward M. Hulme, professor in Mineral History at Stanford University in his lecture to the students of the college last Friday morning.

"The Arabs are interesting, but they are not an easy race to understand," the speaker declared. Continuing, he said in part:

They are incomprehensible, like the great land they live in. From dawn until dusk, the constant, pitiless light of the sun searches out life and kills. The desert is lacking in human interest for the Arab and with nothing to think about, his mind is left idle and hard. The Arab has never learned, therefore, to think constructively and slowly without which civilization has not been built. The race lacks national feeling and unity, for they have not the imagination for building civilization. Their land has made them thus. It is a savage, inhospitable desert, a land of fear which impresses its strength and weakness upon its people.

"There is a difference of 80 degrees to 100 degrees temperature between day and night during the month of March. Fierce winds throw sand against rocks, cracking them with crashes like artillery sounds. It is the Sahara, enormous engine of destruction, at work. And the history of the Arabs is like that. They are a warring people although peace prevails, now, since the French have control over them. The Arabs live exactly like their forefathers, moving from place to place with their cattle, camels and tents. These noisy migrations cover the same route, year after year.

"The desert is not like the scene portrayed in the late Rudolph Valentino's moving picture which were taken on a stretch of sand near Hollywood. The Sahara desert has great mountains, valleys, and high plateaus swept by powerful winds. It has valleys, and lakes.

"The oases of the desert are now feeling the influence of modern science. Machinery, moving pictures, old Fords have made their appearance. Even the harnesses are being changed with the

coming of the radio. The women have even adopted distinctly transparent veils.

"Arabs are a cunning, untrustworthy, warring people accustomed to great hardship. They ask God for nothing. Humility and self-sacrifice are not known in the land of the Arab. Those of the purest Arabian blood are men of great dignity, attractive, gracious, often handsome. But that they they should not hurt you, never occurs to them.

"The Arab is never happy away from his land. He has grown to the mysteriousness of the desert."

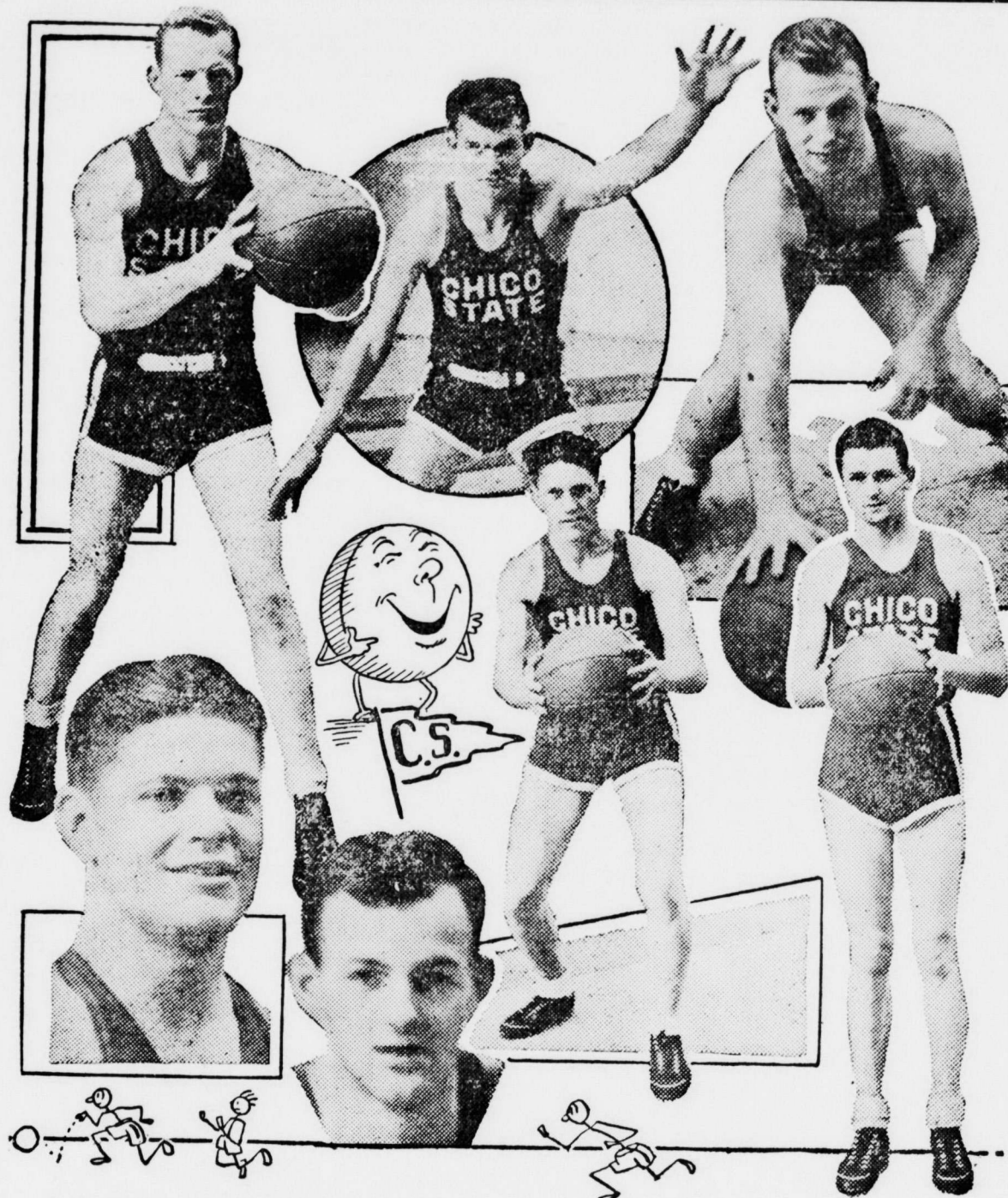
