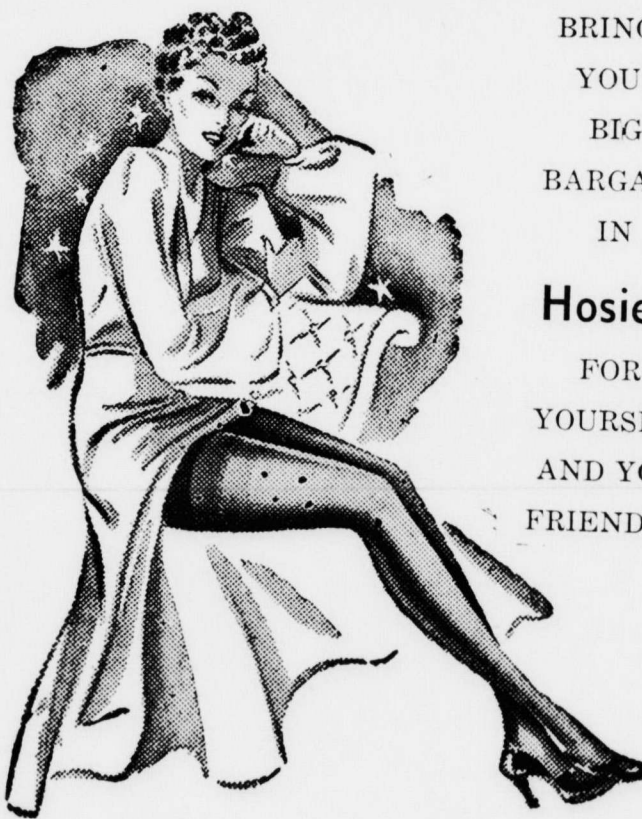

CLOWNS Vs. LUMBERJACKS TONIGHT IN EUREKA

State To Play In Unique Tournament

The Humboldt State College basketball team will travel to San Jose the last of this month to take part in the first annual State College tournament on Dec. 28, 29, 30. Other colleges participating will be Chico State, San Jose State, S. F. State, Fresno State, Santa Barbara State, and San Diego State.

The tournament will be a new innovation of basketball, its idea being to bring the colleges together in as non-competitive a tournament as is possible. Development of the game in State Colleges is the main object of the tournament.

Teams are limited to ten players and one coach, and each team will play two different teams each of the three nights. However, the games will not be full length, but will be twenty minute games. At the end of the tournament, when every team has played every other team, there will be no winner declared, but teams and individual players will be declared best in offense, defense, and sportsmanship. The team that scores the most points will be the best offensive team with the least points scored on it will be declared the best defensive team, the player who scores the most points will be judged the best offensive player and a committee of judges, officials, and spectators will determine the best defensive player and sportsman.

Every afternoon, all the coaches will convene to discuss all the aspects of basketball, in this way hoping to get a better understanding of different styles of play, rules and officiating.

LUMBERJACK QUINTET SWEEP SERIES WITH S. O. N. S. FIVE WITH VICTORIES OF 46-32, 40-19.

The Humboldt State Varsity basketball quintet captured the series with Southern Oregon Normal Wednesday night when they won 40-19. Humboldt also won Tuesday night by the score of 46-32.

In neither game was Humboldt seriously threatened. The Lumberjacks took the lead and held it easily in both games.

State put a fast breaking, accurate passing quintet on the floor in the persons of Franny Givins, Verne Thornton, Al Biondini, Frank Saunderson, and Lee Seidell. Wally Lozensky replaced Al Biondini in the second contest and played a whale of a game both defensively and offensively. He will be hard man to keep off

the starting lineups if he continues his Wednesday night's brand of play.

Franny Givins, true to pre-season predictions led the Lumberjacks in scoring with 16 tallies for Tuesday night and 15 for Wednesday night. Besides his spectacular offensive play Givins turned in a creditable defensive play with his guarding and recovering. Verne Thornton, lanky center, also played great ball for the Lumberjacks. Verne's recovery at both ends of the court was a deciding factor in both games. Lee Seidell turned in two great games at the guard position and he also tanked long shots to bring up the score. Frank Saunderson, ball handler de-luxe, proved to the fans that he is probably the best ball player ever to represent Humboldt. Frank, though small in stature, has amazing speed and deception. It was he who started most of Humboldt's plays, and also broke up most of Oregon's plays.

For Southern Oregon, Sether and Hoxie were outstanding.

The H. S. C. Jayvees won both of their games with Samoa and Fortuna heavyweights by the scores of 39-20 and 29-28.

COACH HART ATTENDS WESTERN CONFERENCE

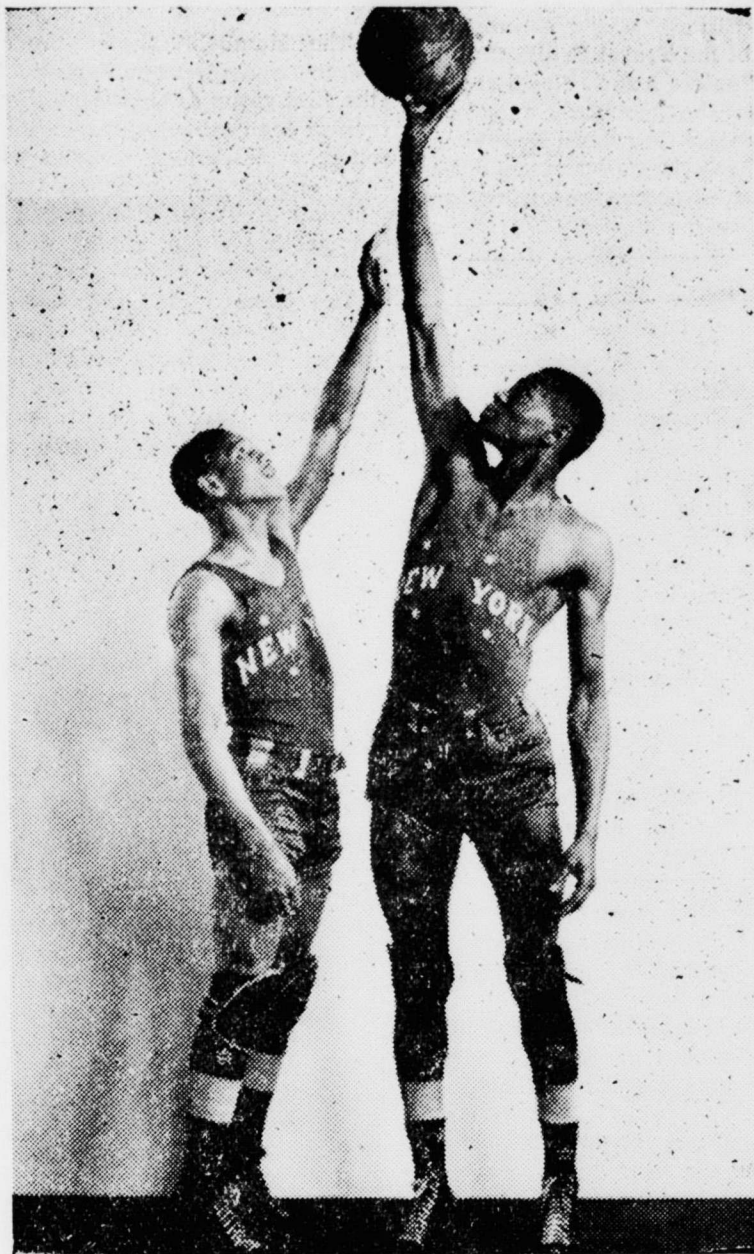

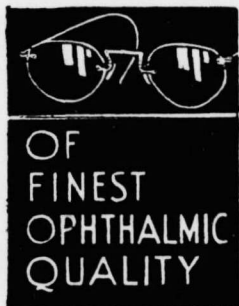

Strange Ways To Celebrate Xmas

In England during the Christmas season, the custom of kissing opposite sex if they walk under mistletoe is very popular according to Roger Battie, freshman student at Humboldt State College, who came from London, England 13 months ago.

The Christmas customs in England are somewhat different from those in America. There are two days observed in England; Christmas, and the day following which is known as "Boxing Day". During these two days football is at its peak. Almost everyone goes to see the many games. Football in England is either rugby or soccer.

The Christmas tree is the fir and no one uses electric lights on the tree. Use of candles is an old English custom.

People hang their stockings on the foot of the bed in hope that St. Nicholas will come.

Every business firm gives its employees Christmas gifts in the form of money. No one goes without some gift on Christmas.

One Christmas day almost everyone attends some church services and many of the children sing carols in the streets on Christmas Eve and on Christmas. Turkey is the chief item of Christmas dinner; however the only day when turkey is eaten are Christmas and Boxing Day. Plum pudding is the main dessert.

Christmas in Greece is not observed as a day of festivity, but it is a day of Religious ceremony similar to Easter, according to Dr. Homer P. Balabanis, vice-president of Humboldt State College, and a native of Greece.

The children do, however, get candy and fruit from their parents on this sacred day.

On New Years eve and New Years day cards and gifts are exchanged between the members of the family only. On New Years Eve carols are sung in honor and welcome of St. Basil who is the equivalent of our Santa Claus. People visit and play card games during the New Years Eve and their luck at the games supposedly foretells their fortune for the coming year.

Children who have been bad usually find a little box of sugar mixed with cinders in their Christmas stocking which hangs over the fireplace in Italy, according to Nick Barbieri, student body president who was born in Northern Italy.

In Italy the only Christmas trees are those in the churches the day before Christmas is usually a day of feasting. That evening people sing carols in front of the various statues of Saints and of Christ and the Mother Mary. These statues are along the various roads that lead to other towns. Should there be snow, the people go sleigh-riding.

At midnight everyone goes to mass for confession and communion. Each family brings an olive branch and a cake to the mass for blessing and they often leave gifts under the tree for the Christ Child.

During this service people drop pennies into a box at the foot of the statue of the Christ Child and then may kiss the statue.

On Christmas day presents are exchanged among the family and friends, but many years this is not done because they cannot afford it. Raviolas and chicken are the main food, it is on this day that the children hope that "Bufana" will come and bring them gifts. "Bufana" is similar to our Santa Claus.

Down in the old South during the holiday season you often hear people shooting "Fireworks! Fireworks! Buy your fireworks here!" according to Mike O'Donnell, Hum. Student coming from Mississippi. They never have fireworks on the 4th of July, but during Christmas everyone shoots them.

The long needle yellow pine and the American holly are used for Christmas trees in Mississippi. On Christmas Eve and night and early morning people go about singing carols.

A week before the holiday people begin making pies and cakes, and Christmas is really a jolly event and a friendly atmosphere prevails. They never have had snow on Christmas, in fact only about once each six years during the winter a light snow may fall. Christmas dinner is eaten at midday followed by a light supper shortly after dark.

Almost every Christmas there is snow around Monmouth, Illinois according to Coach Herb Hart. People go about singing carols and all the schools and churches have Christmas programs prior to the holiday. Usually if there is snow, skiing and bobsled parties are held. All the homes are decorated with holly and greens, and friendship and hospitality reigns.
