GUARD, TACKLE POSITIONS ARE HART PROBLEMS

A total of 26 candidates for Humboldt's 1938 football team reported during the first week of practice to Coach Herb Hart.

Coach Hart's chief problem appears to be the replacing of the guard and tackle spots and three backfield positions. However, while these spots were left vacant by the loss of last year's first stringers, several experienced players and quite a few freshmen have turned out for the positions, and at present, it looks like there will be no loss of strength on this year's team.

Hart's system is different from Charle Erb's in many ways, notably in that no shift is employed, and that all plays are run from a balance line formation.

Because of the small size of the squad, Coach Hart has had all the linemen with exception of the ends, and some of the backs learn two positions to facilitate substituting without weakening the team.

The most strongly fortified positions are the ends. Vernon Thorn-

Healthy Increase Shown This Year In Registration

Humboldt State College had an increase in both freshman and general enrollment at the end of the two-day registration last week.

The first day was freshman day newcomers took the entrance examination in English in the morning and registered in the afternoon. When registration closed at 5 p. m., thirty per cent more freshmen had enrolled than entered at the same period last fall.

Herb Hart Has Good Record As Athlete, Player

Herb L. Hart, head football coach at H. S. C., graduated from Purdue University, where he starred in football and basketball. Hart played guard, fullback, center and halfback during his three years on the varsity. He was awarded the Big Ten Conference medal for his scholastic and football ability. He played two years of basketball, being elected captain in his junior year.

After graduating from Purdue, Hart took over the coaching of Monmouth College, Illinois. Under Hart's leadership, Monmouth College won more than its share of victories in the conference. Hart also instituted a strong intra-mural and physical education plan for students not interested in inter-collegiate competition.

Hart is married and has two children, a girl and a boy. His daughter is ready for high school and the son is eight years old.

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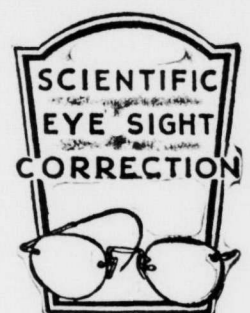

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Five Southern Cal. Frosh Appear To Be Splendid Athletes

Among the new freshmen at Humboldt this year are five men from Southern California who should prove valuable additions to the various athletic teams here. They are Art Keithley, Greg McDonald, Jerry Matthams, and Vic Lorenz, all of Santa Barbara, and Lee Flink of Compton.

All except Lorenz have already turned out for football, and all are backfield candidates.

However, their specialty is basketball. All five play basketball, and as a team they won the championship of the Tri-county independent league, which is composed of Santa Barbara, Ventura, and San Luis Obispo counties. At Santa Barbara High School, all except Flink played together for four years, and this team went to the finals of the Southern California C. I. F. league championships in 1937 in which 304 high schools competed.

Besides these sports, Keithley also plays baseball and is a sprinter and pole vaulter, Flink plays baseball, Matthams is a track man, and Lorenz shoots a good round of golf.

All the fellows are also good ping-pong players, Lorenz winning the Pacific Coast Junior Championship last year. Keithley was a semifinalist in this tournament.

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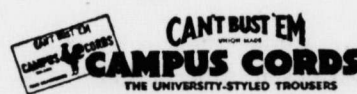
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
