Cal-Poly Scores In Last Minute To Win, 13-6

With two quick scoring thrusts in the final quarter—one in the final seconds of the game, California Polytechnic came from behind to defeat Humboldt State Saturday afternoon at Albee Stadium 13-6.

With only three seconds left to play, the Mustangs completed a 28 yard pass from Hess to Solway that climaxed a 65 yard drive to the Humboldt goal. The following kick-off was the last play of the game.

Humboldt outclassed Cal. Poly throughout the scoreless first half and during the third quarter, when the Thunderbolts scored. However, the last quarter developed into a complete reversal with the Mustangs riding rough-shod over the Humboldt defense. In the first quarter, Humboldt drove to the Cal. Poly eleven yard line, only

'Handed 'Em Game on Platter' Says the Sports Commentator

Well, as Coach Hart put it, Humboldt handed Cal. Poly the game on a platter, and that about sums it up. Humboldt lapsed badly twice and the Mustangs were quick to step in and take advantage of these miscues. Cal Poly had an impressive yardage total, but about half of this total was made during the last quarter when the Thunderbolts gave them their two touchdowns. One thing about the game was that the boys feel that they gained some invaluable experience both in playing the game and in learning how to lose a tough one.

You've just got hand it Bill Farber—limping through most of the game with a bum ankle, Bill played a whale of a game; blocking punts, recovering fumbles, making great tackles, and doing everything a good end should do. Besides all this, Bill was called upon to call the plays, and did a good job considering that it is tough for an end to realize where the holes are being opened etc.

As a matter of fact, all of Humboldt's ends played a bang-up game, and left little to be desired.

Probably the most talked-of man by the grandstand coaches was little Bill Lee. People marvelled at the way he tackled and blocked; he really has those two fundamentals down to a science. Time after time, he would come up fast and make clean, hard tackles when the ball carrier had gotten past the line. He only weighs around 135 pounds, but he sure throws all of that weight into every play. It's going to plenty hard to keep him out of that first-string backfield from now on.

The officials in the game had a pretty tough time. The field judge, who was keeping time, forgot to start his watch after stopping it once in the first quarter, and when the players thought it was about time for the quarter to end, they asked him how much time there was left—he answered "Eleven minutes," so the officials compromised and said there would be one more play left in the quarter. This wasn't all—oh no! Walf Oglesby, who was standing a couple of yards outside the sidelines, caught an angling Mustang punt, and when the official ran it down, he took the ball out

directly opposite where Walf was standing—depriving Humboldt of about five yards. And on that blocked kick of Jack Ellis' in the first quarter—that wasn't even funny when the umpire gave the ball to Cal. Poly after one of their men who had tried to catch it, fumbled it. And did Minnie's knee touch the ground on that intercepted pass?

However, disregarding the officials, Humboldt could have, and should have won the game. The players just can't relax for an instant during the game, as Jack Ellis did on the long run to a touchdown. Jack would have been responsible for another score if that Cal. Poly end hadn't dropped a touchdown pass that was right in his mitts. The two things that really beat Humboldt were sloppy tackling and poor pass defense. Coach Hart has a right to be disgusted with the team, for they had the game in the well-known satchel and tossed it away.

Humboldt has a coming center in Cap Torp. Cap only learned the position during last week, and showed up very well when he replaced the injured Bob Madsen in the second half. Cap certainly has the weight and the strength to become a fine player and he already has a good offensive charge after passing the ball back. About all he lacks now is experience.

Don't think Humboldt hasn't a chance to defeat the St. Mary's frosh—remember that we lost two games last year and it was still considered a successful season. The only thing was that Humboldt didn't play San Jose until the last game of the season. The Santa Clara frosh game of last year is comparable to this game, and Humboldt came back fine the next week to polish off the St. Mary's freshmen 21-6.

Midway in the fourth quarter, Hess reversed to Solway who, aided by fine blocking, ran down the sideline 66 yards to a touchdown. The reverse fooled the Humboldt secondary defense, and Solway had a comparatively easy run for the score. Saenz failed to convert for Cal. Poly.

A few minutes later, the Mustangs again made a scoring threat when Saenz attempted an unsuccessful 25 yard field goal. Humboldt then warded off the Cal. Poly attack and made a scoring threat themselves which ended on the 20 yard line when Meneweather's pass was intercepted by Stombaugh. At this point, Cal. Poly started their successful scoring march which was completed with the pass from Hess to Solway.

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Humboldt Students Members of Slav Tamburiza Orchestra

Two Humboldt State College students, Barbara Crnich and Louis Hibser, are members of an unusual musical group: a Slavonian tamburiza orchestra (pronounced "tam-bu-ritza"). The group has made over fifty public appearances, one of the most recent being a concert at Orleans.

The group was organized, according to Hibser, to acquaint the public with the customs and ideals of the Slavonian people in Eureka.

"Since music is universally accepted as a means of exemplifying ideals," Hibser said yesterday, "we decided to form an orchestra which would use Slav instruments and play Slav songs and dances. We had access to a set of instruments, and with the aid of a local tamburiza player, we organized. Later we purchased a set of new instruments.

"Like all beginners, we spent a great deal of our time at first in playing scales and in finger-exercises. We also practiced group singing, emphasizing Slav songs. Our first appearances were at small club social functions. Later we received requests to play over the radio, and before lodges, service clubs, and at many public gatherings.

"Our instruments, being of Slavonian origin, were comparatively unknown in this section. The names of our instruments are as follows: First Brach, Bisernica, and Kontracica, in the melody group; the Bisernica and the Kontracica are much smaller than the First Brach and are tuned an octave higher; then there are the Second Brach, the Third Brach, the Bugaria, and the Bass, in the counter-melody group. The instruments belong to the mandolin family with the exception of the Bugaria which resembles a guitar, and the Bass which is similar to the string-bass used in the United States. However our Bass is played with a pick, as are all our other instruments in the orchestra."

Native costumes have been ordered from abroad. These will consist for the boys of brightly embroidered bolero over a shirt, decorated in gold braid, baggy knee trousers, a bright-colored sash wound around the waist a number of times, cloth leggings, and a small turban-like cap of heavy wool.

For the girls will be a full blouse and bolero, a very full skirt gathered at the waist, a richly embroidered apron, a wide sash around the waist, and a head scarf.

Members of the tamburiza orchestra, besides Barbara Crnich and Louis Hibser of the college, are Sadie Crnich, Victor Hibser, Lloyd Poscic, Oriel Poscic, and Joe Stemach, the latter being the director.
