Lumberjacks Win Thriller Against Wildcats, 13-6

Continuing their victory march over a fighting but ineffective Wildcat team, Humboldt State's Lumberjacks defeated Chico State 13 to 6 at Chico Saturday afternoon.

Running up 226 yards on eight completed passes and 165 yards from scrimmage, Humboldt completely outclassed Chico after the Wildcats had taken an early 6-0 lead. Humboldt threw away several scoring opportunities on fumbles, but did manage to score touchdowns on two sustained drives. The Thunderbolts made 15 first downs to Chico's 2 and allowed the Wildcats to complete only one pass out of 19 attempts.

Earl Meneweather was the outstanding ground gainer for Humboldt, while Nick Barbieri, Jack Ellis, and Bill Lee took care of the very effective passing department.

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Lumberjacks Win

Humboldt drove to Chico's 4 yard line only to be pushed back to the 12 and held for downs. Chico capitalized on a break for their score, which came early in the second quarter—Earl Meneweather fumbled a punt and Chico recovered on Humboldt's 32 yard line. On the second play after this, Kollenborn, Chico full, ran 30 yards off tackle on a fake reverse for the first score of the game. John McGrath blocked Hoffman's attempted conversion.

Humboldt came back late in the same quarter to lead when Nick Barbieri passed to Keith Henderson, who made a beautiful run to put the ball on the Wildcat six yard stripe. Here Chico's defense stiffened and in three plays pushed Humboldt back to the 8 yard line. On the fourth down, Earl Meneweather ran around end for a touchdown. He was hit back on the five yard line but twisted away to score standing up. Vernon Thornton leaped high to take Barbieri's pass for the extra point.

The third quarter found Humboldt keeping the Wildcats well in check but unable to score because of fumbles. Humboldt missed scoring a safety against Chico when they were offside as the Chico center passed the ball beyond the end zone.

Midway in the fourth quarter, Humboldt put the game on ice when Bill Lee threw a 20 yard pass to Thornton, who made a beautiful catch while running full speed on the 2 yard line, and stepped across for the score. John McGrath's place kick for the extra point was low.

Herb Gomes, Humboldt's star guard, received a foot injury in the first quarter and was taken out for the rest of the game. Outstanding linemen for Humboldt were: John McGrath, Bill Farber, and Glenn Goble. In Chico's line Robinson, Kemp and Lewis stood out, while Hoffman was their chief backfield threat.

Humboldt's playing as a whole did not reach the peak displayed in the St. Marys' frosh game, but the team did come through pretty well considering the hard trip and the wet soggy field. Although no rain fell during the game, the field was wet from previous rains that day and the day before.

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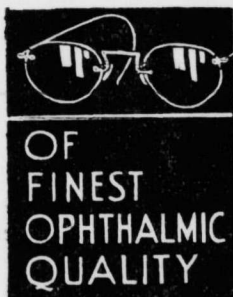
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Sigma Epsilon Rho Holds Dinner

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Balabanis Writes Book on Europe

Dr. Homer P. Balabanis, professor of social science, has written a book, "Travel Sketches of Europe," giving intimate glimpses of Europe to-day. It will be published about December 1st by the Times Publishing Company in Eureka.

The book does not discuss contemporary politics, but pictures the cultural, artistic, social and historical phases of life abroad.

Dr. Balabanis has both the experience and the training necessary to write such a book. Born abroad, he travelled extensively in Europe before he came to America in 1913. He returned to visit his mother at Athens in 1927 and again in 1933. On each of the trips he travelled not only in Greece, but in Italy, Switzerland, Germany, Holland, Belgium, France and England.

Not only has he visited the countries of which he writes, but also he has the background to appreciate and to interpret what he has seen on such occasions. He could speak to the people in their own language. He received his secondary education in a French school; and it has been said that with French and English one can be understood in any country in Europe. In addition to speaking Greek, French, and English, Dr. Balabanis has a reading knowledge of Italian, Spanish and German.

Reared in the Greek atmosphere where the art of ancient Greece was handed on a living thing and not merely as a beautiful tradition, he could appreciate the artistic life of the countries he visited. And finally, his training as a social scientist enabled him to grasp the significance of European civilization.

A chapter on practical hints for planning a European trip is included in the book. There are suggestions on how to prepare an itinerary, how to secure passports, how to estimate expenses, how to select proper transportation, etc. The author also discusses the mental attitude necessary for the tourist to understand and to enjoy life abroad.

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Two Football Men Run "Date" Bureau

John McGrath and Keith Henderson, Humboldt football players, are engaged in a novel business which not only aids them financially, but also helps to make better attendance at College functions.

They are the co-partners of a "date bureau."

The bureau is steadily growing in popularity among the students. Bashful young freshmen, or even upperclassmen, may escort the lady of their choice to the college dance all for the nominal fee of 10 cents. The two heads of the bureau arrange the dates for the various dances, and thereby create more enthusiasm among the students who otherwise would not have attended the dance without a partner.

The bureau operates in this manner. Any student who wishes a date for a dance or any forthcoming college entertainment, applies to one of the members of the bureau and asks him to arrange it. The applicant may specify one person if he wishes and he may also specify persons he does not wish to go with to the function. The bureau takes all of the names on the list and elects the one best fitted for the applicant, and thereby a date is made and everyone is satisfied. The person who applies for the date is charged 10 cents if the date is arranged.

The bureau can double its profit if it can arrange it so that two applicants, a boy and a girl, go together. Each person in this case, is charged 10 cents. Already this year approximately fifty students have asked aid of the bureau.

This bureau was originated last semester by Bud Villa, now a student at Hastings Law School in San Francisco, and Keith Henderson, who is still carrying on the good work.
