YMCA BOYS HEAR V. P. AT MEETING

"Use your head more, think clearly, don't act before you think," were pointers given by Dr. Homer P. Balabanis in his speech, "TO THINK WITHOUT CONFUSION CONCERNING PROPAGANDA" at the Annual Humboldt County YMCA Older Boy's Conference at Humboldt College recently.

Dr. Balabanis stated that propaganda is the technique of deliberately designed action toward the predetermined end. In propaganda one begins with a certain end in sight.

According to Dr. Balabanis, the ways of promoting propaganda are:

To give some activity a bad name and dispose of it; to enlist the league activities with a fine sounding name; to quote a single line of what some great man has said in favor of the activity; to try to humanize the name of the article; to say that everybody has the activity so why shouldn't we have it.

Dr. Balabanis gave three reasons why propaganda is successful; People are emotional; they are too lazy to think; they don't use their heads enough.

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Boil It In Oil

Perhaps it's the fifty-five inches of rain, perhaps it's the fact that I've just turned twenty-one or perhaps it's because my girl put the big double cross on me...what ever it is, I've decided to join the "What's-Wrong-With-Humboldt-State-Club."

The above mentioned club received its charter with the laying of the cornerstone. For, lo, these many years we have been listening to complaints of what was wrong with Humboldt State. But no one has ever done anything to correct what was wrong and that's just what is wrong. The moment some one comes along with something new, the "mossbacks" mutter in to their beards: radical, communist, and other terms of "endearment."

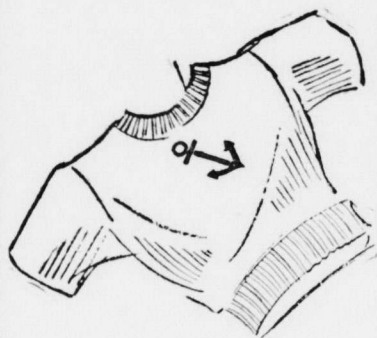
Lozensky's Volley Ballers In Victory
