THAD DOUARIN GIVES SAFETY TALK; HUMBOLDT STUDENTS DO WELL IN QUIZ

In conjunction with a safety program being promoted by the students of Humboldt State College, another safety assembly was held last Friday morning at 11 o'clock in the college auditorium, at which Thad Douarin of the state highway patrol spoke on safe driving.

traffic laws and practices as follows:

Right of way at intersection at the same time the car on the left must give way to the one on the right, but if the driver on the left reaches the intersection first he has the right of way.

Procedure in passing: the person passing must sound horn and be sure there is plenty of room to pass. A car traveling fifty miles an hour wishing to pass a car traveling forty miles an hour, must have at least 900 feet of clear road ahead of it.

Persons between the ages of eighteen and twenty-four cause more accidents than those of any other six-year age period; Sergeant Douarin said a person's eyes focus on the road 1270 feet ahead of him at forty-five miles an hour; 1430 feet at fifty miles an hour; 1800 feet at sixty miles an hour; and 2,000 feet at sixty-five miles an hour. The fact that a driver is so intent upon a spot considerably ahead of him causes him to be unaware of the objects or of road defects at shorter distances; it also renders him oblivious of the sides of the road and of cars approaching from intersections.

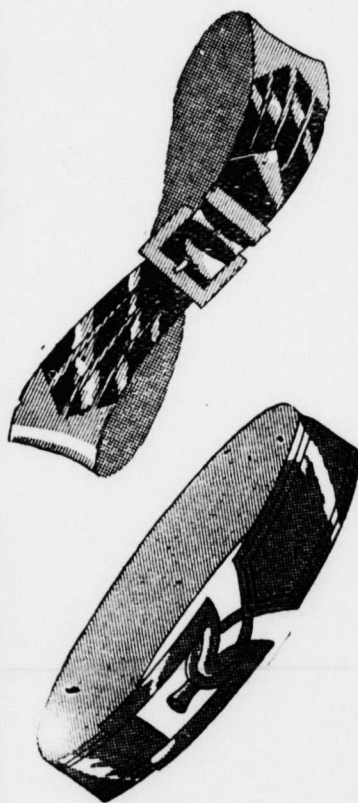

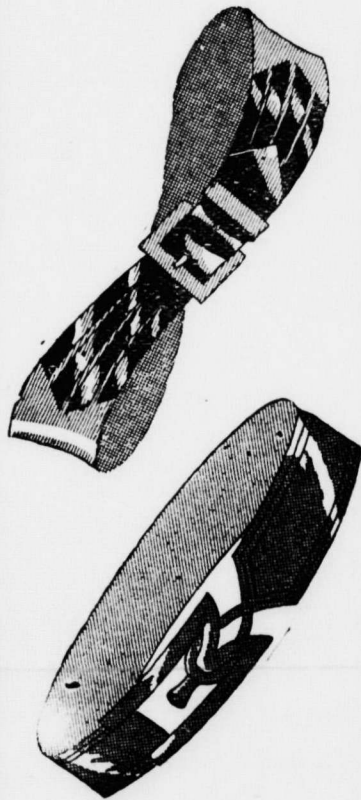

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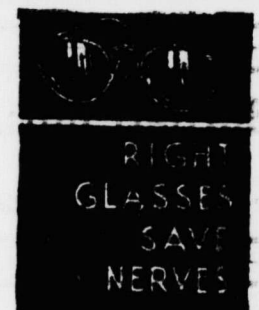
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
