## Frosh To Observe Rules Prescribed By Sophomores

The sophomores of Humboldt State have demanded that certain rules be observed by the freshmen during the initiation period which began yesterday and will continue through Thursday:

No "queening" on the campus, no sitting on either of the Senior benches, no wearing of cords; dinks must be worn on the campus, old clothes must be worn and the right mental attitude must be observed by all freshmen.

For infraction of the above rules, the following punishments shall be administered:

Paddling (but not in any general college meeting), ducking in the fish pond (but any student who has a cold or who is not wearing old clothes shall not be given this punishment), painting soph numbers on the face with mercuriochrome, wearing mock or foolish dress, and constructive punishments such as making the frosh build rally bonfires, weed the lawns, wash windows, etc.

Initiation will be held until noon tomorrow and will be followed by the brawl.

## Ski Club Plans For New Members

A membership committee to make plans for admitting new members was appointed at the first fall meeting of the Humboldt State Ski Club Wednesday noon. President Gene German named Bob Bryan chairman, and, to assist him, Betty Carlson and Channing Jenkins.

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## Status Changes For Dropped Work

Students often ask what their status is when they "drop a class."

During the first six weeks of any semester, a student in residence who drops a course with official approval will not have that course reported or charged against his record for that semester.

During the second six weeks of any semester, a student in residence may drop a course without prejudice to his record in case this is done with the approval of his instructor in consultation with the adviser, such approval to be based upon considerations of health, outside work, or other matters for which the student is not held culpable. Unless such approval is granted, the dropping of a course during this interval will be recorded as Failure.

During the final six weeks of any semester, the dropping of a course will result in a record of Failure or Incomplete, depending upon whether the work has been of failing or passing grade up to the time of withdrawal.

## CATALOG COMMITTEE URGES USE OF BOOK

The catalog committee of Humboldt State would like students in the future to consult the college catalog in making out their programs so that, at the time of registration, it will be necessary for the advisors only to check the students' actual program instead of making a program for them.

The catalog will be helpful in giving what is required, which is under the section of "Degrees, Credentials, and Curricular" on page 34 through 49. Some students, according to the committee, have gotten the two degrees, liberal arts and teaching, mixed. Humboldt State offers both degrees together or separately.

## Improvement Made In Scholarship, Report Discloses

Data issued by Mrs. Myrtle McKittrick registrar, on the results of the recent Humboldt College probation and disqualification rules seem to show an improvement in scholarship at the college.

The rule was adopted last fall by the faculty and went into effect at the end of the first semester of last year.

When statistics were compiled in the registrar's office, it was found that sixty-five students, or sixteen per cent of those enrolled, had made grades sufficiently low to be put on probation. However, when a check was made at the end of the second semester, it was found that a total of fifty students or only twelve per cent, had been disqualified or put on probation.

Some of the other facts discovered are as follows:

Thirty-eight per cent of those who were put on probation at the end of the fall semester 1939 got off probation in the Spring semester of 1940.

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## State "Pep" Band To Appear Friday

Humboldt State College's "pep" band, under the supervision of Edmund V. Jeffers of the music department, will make its first appearance at the football game on Friday, September 28.

The band has new uniforms which include trousers of white with a green stripe, caps and coats of green and gold, Humboldt's colors.

**ENROLLMENT INCREASES**

**NUMBER OF UNITS TELL CLASSIFICATION**

Students frequently ask just how they are classified; that is, when is one a sophomore, junior, or senior. Classification is based on the number of units completed as follows:

Freshmen, those with less than 30 units of credits.

Sophomores, those with from 30 to 59½ units.

Juniors, those with from 60 to 89½ units.

Seniors, those with 90 or more units.

Those who carry a load of six or more units are classified as regular students. Those who carry less than six are known as "limited" students.

**H. S. C. DRILL TEAM TO PERFORM AT GAME**

## THREE-YEAR COURSE OFFERED IN COMMERCE

Humboldt State College now offers three years in business education instead of the two years as in the past.

This curriculum is directed towards an A. B. degree with a major and Special Secondary Credential in Business Education. Programs are designed for students preparing to teach business subjects in high schools or colleges and for those interested in training for immediate employment in business.

Also, for the first time, Humboldt State is offering one full year of business law instead of one semester.

## High Index Needed For Extra Hours

Students often ask what is considered a "normal load" and if it is possible to carry more than the normal load.

Fifteen or sixteen units of work in addition to a half-unit in physical education constitute an average program for a semester. According to the definition of semester unit, this is supposed to entail forty-eight hours of actual work each week.

Students who have demonstrated their ability, measured in terms of the Scholarship Index, may be permitted to carry additional work according to the following scale:

Those with an index of from 1.25 to 1.74 for one semester may carry 17½ units the next semester.

Those with an index of 1.75 and above may carry 18½ units.

The approval of the Health Department is also required for students who register for more than the normal program.

In order to secure credit for their work students must have their programs approved by the faculty adviser.

Anderson has shown good form since he has been out for the Humboldt squad in both blocking and carrying the ball. He stands five feet, eight inches and tips the beams at 180 pounds.

He is taking a physical education major here at Humboldt State.

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## Refunds Are Made In Certain Cases If Students Withdraw From School

In certain cases of withdrawal from college shortly after the opening of school, students may have a portion of their fees refunded. Refunds of state fees are subject to regulations set forth by the state as follows:

The tuition fee charged a resident or non-resident student may be refunded if the student has not attended in excess of two weeks from the date of registration in any semester, provided that in the judgment of the president of the college, withdrawal of the student is the result of circumstances beyond the student's control, and provided further the amount of \$1.50 per semester shall be retained to cover the cost of registration.

In case a student is unable to continue his course because of a college regulation, the entire fee may be returned, but in each such case the circumstances concerning the application of such regulation must be stated on the application submitted to the State Director of Education.

When a student transfers from the classification of limited to regular, or from regular to limited, or reduces the number of units for which he is registered in a limited classification, fifty cents shall be withheld as a charge to defray the cost of book-keeping.

A late registration fee is not returnable.

When a student withdraws from the college or from any course, any unused portion of the service fees paid by the student may be refunded.

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A student entering any class in which a service fee is charged, shall pay the full fee irrespective of the time when the class is entered.

Student body fees are not refunded if a student has participated in any student body activity.

Twenty per cent of those who were put on probation at the end of the fall semester of 1939 were on a second probation during the spring semester of 1940.

These last are subject to disqualification at the end of this semester if they do not bring their average up to .50.

Thirteen students were disqualified in the spring of 1940.

Fifteen students on probation did not return in the spring of 1940.

Five students who were on probation during the spring of 1940 came to summer session. Of those, four students raised their indexes and got off probation; one student lowered his index and was disqualified.
