## Aeronautics Course Offered at H. S. C. Has Ten Students

The aeronautics class of Humboldt State, under the sponsorship of the Civil Aeronautics Authority of Washington, D. C., has ten students who passed their physical examinations and are working for their private pilots license. They are David Williams, Walter Carr, Allan Lowry, Clarence Edsall, Glenn Lissner, James Moore, Norman Moore, Jack Morton, Harold Walton and Clare Ostrander.

The class is to receive twenty-four hours of instruction in air navigation from Homer L. Arnold, professor of mathematics and philosophy; twenty-four hours of meteorology from Dr. Harry MacGinitie of the physical science department; and twenty-four hours, at the airport, of general theory of flight and air regulations from Lester Pierce.

The students, after having the instruction as listed above and fifty hours of actual flying, are eligible for their examinations, to be given from December 15 to January 15.

Licenses were issued to Casper Torp, Bud Villa, Herbert Gomes, Darrel Wing, Glenn Goble, and Louis Walton in the fall of 1939. Summer school graduates were Julius Hooen, James Hutcheson, George Lowry, Dan McClure, Donald Turner, and Edwin Speier. Clare Ostrander passed the ground school examination, and is doing her flying now.

## Arkansas Eleven Has Tricky Plays With Many Passes

The Humboldt Lumberjacks, battered after their 20-0 defeat by the Cal Aggies, will meet the Arkansas A & M Boll Weevils tonight in Albee Stadium in the first intersectional game ever played in this area.

Out of tonight's game will be Bill Lee, Marshall Rousseau, Frank Crichton, Monty Montgomery, and Len Longholm, with injuries suffered in the disastrous Cal Aggies contest.

However, the invaders, while boasting the trickiest offense in the nation, are not expected to be too tough in view of their 78-0 defeat by Nevada Saturday. The Boll Weevils from Monticello, Arkansas, are the "Passingest" team in the country, as eighty per cent of their plays are pass plays.

They use the "swinging gate" formation as their basic lineup, but have as many as thirty formations, plus more when the boys make up plays in the huddle, as they do very often.

The visitors and their coach, Stewart Ferguson, are out for a good time in football admittedly, and use everything in the book in having a good time on the gridiron. They completed forty-two passes in one game without scoring.

Called "The Marx Brothers of Football" and "A Circus Without Fleas," the Arkansas team will undoubtedly be one of the outstanding football attractions of any year in this section.

## Lumberjack Assistant Grid Coach Made Colorful Debut in Athletics

All Humboldt College knows, of course, that "Snooky" Edsall this season is assisting Coach Herbert Hart in drilling the college football team. Many saw him when he was playing with the team. But there are probably many new students who may not be aware of Edsall's colorful entrance into Humboldt athletics.

Edsall first came to Humboldt State in the fall of 1936. Charles Erb was coach at that time; and Edsall, who had read about Erb and his career on University of California "Wonder Team," had come to Humboldt to play under Erb.

When Edsall arrived as a freshman in Arcata, he was five feet, seven and one-half inches tall. He actually weighed 136 pounds, but he looked as if he weighed about 110 pounds.

Humboldt had some unusually big men that fall. So, naturally, when Edsall first turned out, he looked still smaller than he actually was.

Coach Erb took one look at him and said, "Too small."

That would have ended it for anybody else, but not for Snooky. He could not practice with the squad, but he at least wanted to be near them. So he volunteered for the job of water-boy—and he made that. He devoted his time to carrying the water bucket for the more fortunate students on the team.

Then followed what would have been regarded as too improbable for belief had it been told in a short story.

In the first game of that fall, which was with the freshman team of St. Mary's College, one of the available men for one of the backfield position on the Lumberjack team was hurt. There was no substitute, seemingly, who could fill his shoes. Then it was remembered that the water boy Edsall, while "totting" his bucket had in addition learned all the plays and signals. Edsall was rushed into the fray.

He proceeded to run the St. Mary's team ragged. No one in the bleachers knew who he was. An excited faculty member shouted

to the players' bench for information. A player, as excited as his questioner, could only yell back, "The water boy."

Humboldt won 18 to 7, and Edsall became a fixture on the first team. The story of Edsall's debut was carried by the press association and gained Edsall and the team wide publicity.

Edsall started his athletic career at San Ramon High School in Danville, California, where he played four years as first-string halfback in football; he also ran the middle distances in track for four years and played basketball for two years as a guard.

Besides playing football in Humboldt State, Edsall ran the 440-yard dash for two seasons and also played two seasons with the Humboldt Jayvee basketball team. He has another year of competition in track at Humboldt State.

"Snooky," who incidentally was christened Clarence, is majoring in physical education. From the way he is handling the Lumberjack gridders this season his fellow students think he should be a "natural" when he goes out to coach.

He has increased in height and weight since he came to Humboldt. He now weighs 160 pounds, and is five feet, eight and a half inches tall; twenty-four pounds heavier, and one inch taller than he was on the day he first appeared on the Humboldt College athletic field.

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
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## Clare Ostrander Only Woman Flyer

Last fall, to Clare Ostrander, flying was the farthest thing from her mind. In fact, when some of the men students of Humboldt State signed up for the course, Miss Ostrander thought they were foolish to leave the ground. After talking with some of the students and going to the airport with them, she began thinking differently about flying. Her ideas changed so entirely that the next time applications for the course were being taken, she signed up.

Miss Ostrander, the only woman student at Humboldt State taking the Civil Aeronautics Authority course, came from San Diego and is a junior, taking a general elementary and junior high school pre-secondary course with a major in social science.

Miss Ostrander, after having passed her physical examination, went to summer school to take her ground school course and passed the test.

She goes up in the ship every day for a half hour and has ground school for a half hour. After fifty hours of dual and solo flying, she will be ready to take her examination for a private pilot's license.

She plans to go into flying commercially, if, she said, she proves good enough; but right now she is doing it as a hobby. Miss Ostrander is so enthusiastic that she is even looking ahead to owning her own ship.

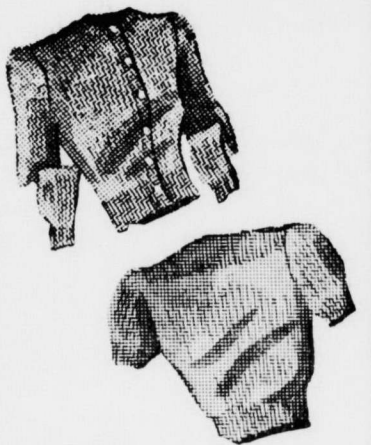
