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## Tuberculin Tests Taken by Students

The number of students taking the tuberculin test at Humboldt State College this year totaled seventy-seven, it was announced recently by the health office.

Of this number some were reactors. These students will be x-rayed at the office of Dr. Woolford in Eureka.

With the exception of the cafeteria workers, who must be tested annually, all students who had not taken the test within two years were required to do so.

The Wolf Tuberculin Test was used. This test differs from the Mantoux test in that a serum is not injected in the skin, but is placed on the outside and covered with adhesive tape.

A list concerning the students requiring an x-ray will be placed on the bulletin board soon.

## J. Lawyer To Enter Naval Aviation

Jack Lawyer of Eureka, student at Humboldt State College last year, will leave about November 1 for the United States naval aviation station at Pensacola, Florida, for training which will lead to a commission as a naval flyer.

Lawyer has recently successfully completed an intensive preliminary course at the naval reserve aviation base at Oakland. The course consisted of ground-school instruction in the morning and of flying in the afternoon.

The course at Pensacola is seven months. Those completing the course come out with the rank of ensign and serve four years in naval aviation. At the end of this time they may obtain a permanent commission, because, Lawyer was told, there now are nearly four hundred openings a year in the regular service.

Many Pensacola graduates who do not enter the service obtain places as pilots in commercial lines.

## VISUAL EDUCATION PROGRESSING AT CES

Films are being secured from the office of the Humboldt County superintendent of schools, and are being shown in classrooms and in the auditorium at assemblies. ## Orientation Class 'Proving Ground'

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**Fisher Discusses German Revolution**

Dr. Raymond Fisher, associate professor of history at Humboldt College, spoke on "The German Revolution" at the Masonic dinner held in Eureka, October 8.

Basis of Dr. Fisher's talk was the following quotation by Dorothy Thompson, American writer and lecturer: "Hitler is winning the war because he has been fighting it with industrial and engineering economy, while the democracies have been fighting it with money, or financial economy."

"That statement," Dr. Fisher said, points to the essential character of the revolution; a revolution that was not created by Hitler but was begun by others before him and has been utilized by him and the Nazis for purposes of acquiring world power. The revolution essentially destroys the importance of profit making and of money for the sake of money."

"If it can be done with such remarkable results in military objectives," continued Fisher, "why can't it also be done for peaceful and socially beneficial objectives? Whether we like it or not, the days of the old profit system are disappearing."

"The experience of France and Great Britain demonstrate this fact. It behoves us a democracy to see that this new technique is democratically controlled and utilized to socially worthy objectives."
