Humboldt Defeats Alhambra In First Game by 7-6 Score

Humboldt State won their first game of the year by the score of 7 to 6 last Saturday night against the Alhambra gridders in a very close and hard fought contest. The game, which was held in Albee Stadium, was marked by wide open offensive threats on the part of both teams.

Len Lengholm of Humboldt was probably the outstanding backfield man of the game. He carried the ball for a number of long gains and also threw two passes for good gains.

Humboldt State scored first in the game when Frank Sanderson carried the ball over from the five-yard line, following a march of sixty-eight yards featured by Longholm's sensational running. Bill Lee converted for Humboldt's score.

The Alhambra team was one of the most colorful teams that has ever played here, playing wide open football and throwing passes all over the field. Alhambra's lone touchdown came when Shelby completed a 25-yard pass to Van Raam, who caught the ball on the dead run in the end zone.

Other minor injuries hit the team, but most of the boys that incurred them will be ready for Saturday's contest.

Failure To 'Drop' May Mean Failure

Can a student be in a class and still not be there?

That sounds like Foolish Question No. 473, but the answer to that question may prove unfortunate at the end of the semester in some cases.

The fact is, a student is technically a member of the class as long as his class card remains "in custody" of the instructor. Some students have ceased attending certain courses but have neglected to obtain their course cards. Others may have "signed up" for the courses on registration day but never attended the courses. Their course cards were, however, sent to their instructors, who still have them.

To withdraw from a course, a student must obtain his course card from his instructor, have this card signed by his advisor, and take this card to the registrar's office. In addition, he must pay any prescribed fees. Failure to follow these steps will result in a course being recorded as a failure.

New W. P. A. Work Will Start Soon At Humboldt State

Work on the new W. P. A. projects in connection with campus improvement at Humboldt State College will probably begin in about ten days according to President Arthur S. Gist of the college.

President Gist received official notification yesterday of the approval of the application for the projects. The plans have been returned to the Eureka office for final perusal for ultimate construction.

The projects included in this new grant, which totals \$80,000 provides for the landscaping of the grounds at the new dormitory, Nelson Hall; the construction of cement sidewalks around the building; and hard surfacing for the parking area at the rear.

The other major portion of the fund will be devoted to the completion of the college athletic field. This means installation of an adequate drainage system, sodding the field, construction of a 220 yard straight-away track, bleachers, a fence for the entire field, and the levelling and surfacing of a parking area adjacent to the stadium.

For several years work has been going forward in filling and grading the field which when completed will be one of the most beautiful and one of the most complete athletic parks in northern California.
